JANUARY 24th MEETING

Our speaker, Mr. Maxime Chouinard gave a presentation "The Doctor Will See You – Early Medicine in Canada", an overview of medicine as it was practiced prior to the 20th century.

He explored the different approaches to the field of medicine which were introduced to Canada in the 18th and 19th centuries. What was the rationale behind certain treatments and how individual discoveries helped to change our perception of disease.

The late Dr. James Low had started a collection of medical memorabilia in 1988. By 1991, the collection had grown and became known. In fact, the Academy of Medicine in Toronto donated most of their collection to the Health Care Museum Kingston. Now it is the largest in Canada. Dental, nursing artifacts, and other strange instruments soon added up to 40,000 artifacts – many are in storage.

Early skills working with limited knowledge in medieval times focused on the four fluids of the body – blood, phlegm, choler, and black bile. Later, red and white barber poles were displayed as a symbol of the "bleeders' trade" and rags were used to stop the bleeding and to clean up afterwards.

Consumption, tuberculosis, cholera, gangrene – all were attended by surgeons who used cutters with ivory or ebony handles. Dr. James Douglas, Sr., was the best surgeon in the country – he amputated in a minute!

The American President, James Garfield, was shot; a surgeon removed the bullet, but Garfield died the next day.

Louis Pasteur made discoveries in immunology, microbiology and rabies.

PERMANENT LIBRARY COLLECTION

The Kingston and District Branch of the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada is delighted to announce an agreement to place their collection of about 170 history books on permanent loan at the Central Branch of Kingston Frontenac Public Library.

Kingston and District Branch's fine collection of general and family Loyalist histories has been built over the past thirty-odd years by purchases and donations under the leadership of long-time branch librarian John Chard (died 2013). John Chard's abiding passion was for educating all Canadians about the role of the Loyalists in the establishment and growth of this country. He would have been pleased that we are now able to share this collection on a non-circulating reference basis with anyone who wishes to use it – genealogists, students, and anyone interested in Canadian history. UEL volumes will be added to the KFPL catalogue with the identifier "UELAC".

The United Empire Loyalists were generally those who had been settled in the thirteen colonies at the outbreak of the American Revolution, who remained loyal to and took up the Royal Standard, and who settled in what is now Canada at the end of the war. Perhaps one Canadian in ten has at least one Loyalist ancestor. This library collection covers not only those United Empire Loyalists who settled in eastern Ontario but also Loyalists who went to the Maritimes and other parts of Ontario, as well as source materials to help trace their lives in New York and New England prior to the Revolution. (It is now on shelves across the room from Kingston Branch OGS's collection.)

The UEL Association of Canada was formed in 1914 as an organization dedicated to enriching the lives of Canadians through knowledge of the past, in particular the history of the United Empire Loyalists and their contribution to the development of Canada. Kingston and District Branch, one of 27 across the country, was established in 1978. Some of the founding members descended from Michael Grass and the Associated Loyalists who were the first to arrive to settle Kingston in June 1784.
