LOYALIST DAY IN KINGSTON - June 12, 2016

As usual, a fife and drum unit from the Fort Henry Guard were on hand to add sound and colour to the flag-raising. Some of us arrived in 1776-era attire: Donald Roy made his own shirt and the costume for his wife Loralee Martin. Nancy Cutway wove her linsey-woolsey overdress in 1984 and made the rest to accompany it. Anne Redish dressed in an 1812-era gown.

The Guardsmen led the assembled Loyalists and Deputy Mayor Richard Allen across Ontario Street to the City flagpole in Confederation Park. The City of Kingston flag was removed for the day, and the Loyalist flag (George III flag) was raised. Branch President Peter Milliken read the official Proclamation of Loyalist Day in Kingston, and as the Loyalist flag rose the fife and drum led us in the singing of God Save the Queen.

The flag reached the top of the pole just as the first drops of rain began to fall from the dark cloud overhead. Despite the raindrops, Deputy Mayor Richard Allen brought greetings from the City and acknowledged the contributions of the Loyalists in the founding of this city. Councillor Allen said he believes he too is descended from a United Empire Loyalist, as are about 10% of the Canadian population.

Loyalists, Lighthouses and Lobsters, U.E.L.A.C. Annual Dominion Conference, Summerside, P.E.I., July 7 to 10, 2016 – report by Anne Redish



The Atlantic Region branches joined together to create the wonderful 2016 Annual Conference, held in Summerside, P.E.I., this past July. Having the events in early July made it possible for some folks to extend their Atlantic visit to include extended family, historic sites, and other maritime adventures.

Our hosts were Peter Van Iderstine, President, Abegweit Branch, P.E.I., Jim MacKenzie UE, Atlantic Regional Vice President and Treasurer New Brunswick Branch, Carol Harding UE, Atlantic Regional Councillor, Nova Scotia Branch, Dave Laskey UE, Dominion Treasurer and Membership Chair New Brunswick Branch and Christine Manzer UE, Second Vice-President, Secretary and Director, Vancouver Branch.

In the Conference Guide, we received welcome greetings from the Honorable H. Frank Lewis, the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, Wade MacLauchlan, Premier of Prince Edward Island, and Mayor Bill Martin of Summerside. Similarly our President Barbara J Andrew UE welcomed everyone and encouraged us to embrace the opportunities to connect with those from other areas, with pride in our shared heritage.

My focus for this conference was preparation for the Genealogist Meeting on Thursday July 7, at 1:00 pm. The 84th Regiment of Foot Second Battalion Regimental Association Parade and Inspection was held indoors at the official opening of the Conference on Thursday Evening. Across from this is the Bedeque Area Historical Museum and its amazing range of wonderfully exhibited antiques and artifacts from the area, from a wide span of time. Buses carried the 2016 Loyalists to Green Gables and other regional sites.

PLANNING YOUR GRAVESTONE?? - by Lorraine Sherren, UE, Branch Membership Chair

Last year, when my husband and I were making arrangements for our eventual burial at Glenhaven Memorial Gardens in Kingston, I asked if I could have the UELAC emblem on our stone. We were told that, unfortunately, the casting did not exist in their database. Our Family Services Director did admit that he found it unusual, given that they have the emblem for the DAR, yet here in Loyalist country they did not have permission to use the UELAC emblem (unless, of course, you purchased it at a substantial extra cost).

Well, it appears that Dan brought this anomaly to the executive of Arbor Memorial Inc. and they petitioned Dominion. The result is that the UELAC Cypher is now available at no extra charge for use on gravestones or plaques in any cemetery in Ontario affiliated with the Arbor Memorial Inc., including Glenhaven Memorial Gardens, Kingston. The actual size of the casting is 3 ½" x 3 ½" and is in brass. For those who are not familiar with the cypher, this is what it looks like.



If you are considering making your Cemetery Arrangements, have your U.E. Certificate, and are interested in having this cypher on your stone, Dan Zemba, Family Services Director at Glenhaven Memorial Gardens, has offered to give you a 10% discount on your purchase (products & services), and a discount on your Funeral needs as well. Right: 1884 Monument. The new plaque says, *This monument is the oldest monument dedicated to the Loyalist in all of Canada, erected in 1884 during the Celebrations to mark the 100th Anniversary of the arrival of the Loyalists in Ontario.*

The monument and cemetery were refurbished in 1956 when the Ontario Provincial Government, under Premier Leslie Frost, established a Provincial Park here dedicated to the Loyalists.

The monument was restored during 2015 by Campbell Monument and rededicated on May 24, 2015 to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the UEL Association of Ontario.

Look at the above wording carefully, taken from the photo of the plaque on the next page. Can you see what is wrong???



Do you see the error on the wording of the plaque?

There is no such organization as the "UEL Association of Ontario". That body did exist in the past, but only from 1896 to 1913. On 27 May 1914, an Act of the Dominion Parliament created the "United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada". Perhaps it could have said: ".....to celebrate the recent 100th anniversary of what began as the UEL Association of Ontario." Wording makes a difference.

It's a cautionary lesson for us all, not to believe every statement found on a plaque or tombstone ... remember to check any family history facts from as many different sources as are available, preferably from original sources rather than derivative ones. After all, the classic error is a tombstone in St. Mary Magdalene Church cemetery in Picton that reports someone died on "February 31"!

And remember to re-check your facts when you write up your family history, so you don't end up perpetuating errors handed down through the family!
