#### PACK UP YOUR HOUSE AND SAIL! Continued from page 1:

When the Maine/Nova Scotia boundary was finalized after the Treaty of Paris (1783), it turned out that the town of Castine was to remain in the State of Maine, instead of the Province of Nova Scotia. (New Brunswick had not yet been carved out of Nova Scotia: that came in 1784.) This decision came despite petitions from the citizens of Castine to the government in London: they even paid to send a small delegation to plead their case, that the Penobscot River should be the natural boundary between Maine and Nova Scotia, rather than the St. Croix River. Fort George, the British fort at Castine, was the last fort ceded to the USA in 1784, when the 74<sup>th</sup> Highland Regiment abandoned it.

About 40 Loyalist families from Castine who absolutely refused to remain in the USA carefully took apart their wooden houses, laid the walls and roofs onto barges, and floated them down the Penobscot River, eastward along the coast to Passamaquoddy Bay, and then to the peninsula where St. Andrew's took shape.



Dr. Smith was able to show photographs of several buildings still existing in St. Andrews which originated in Castine. He pointed out that these were not log cabins, but were houses built of horizontal planks of wood, so it was easier to take down each side of the house as a unit. As one member of the audience pointed out, based on the construction methods of the times, they would have been held together with wooden pegs rather than nails, so tapping out the dowels was probably easier than removing nails would have been. All glass was carefully removed from the windows and packed for transport. Leigh's photos of the re-assembled houses showed that the windows frequently consisted of about a dozen small panes rather than one large pane, as glass window panes were difficult to make and thus very expensive.



Given the tides in the Bay of Fundy, safely moving the barges and their loads behind a sailing boat was probably the hardest part of the enterprise.

This was a very interesting story of Loyalists from another part of the country, which most of us had never heard before. Dean Taylor, who introduced Leigh as speaker, has a special knowledge of the area, since he descends from a Castine Loyalist – and he'll speak about them in September.



### OUR DISAPPEARING HERITAGE

Isaac Ferriss - Veteran of War of 1812 & son of Loyalist Joseph Ferriss



At our November 2018 meeting, speaker Ruth Nicholson showed her Loyalist certificate through Joseph Ferriss UEL and her War of 1812 certificate based on Isaac Ferriss's service. This raised a question from an audience member: was there a connection to the Ferris Loyalist family from Cataraqui?

Member John Lynn Bell has frequently shown us photo displays that he has compiled: his female ancestors, photos of children in clothing from 150 years ago, an assembly of his ancestors' signatures

compiled from various documents, and others. He recalled that in 1990 he took a photo of the Ferris house, then standing abandoned and windowless just before the stone building that housed a family of Loyalists was demolished to make way for a tire store and service centre.

# LOYALIST TRAVEL ROUTES

The following item is reprinted with permission from Ontario Genealogical Society Kingston Branch Newsletter, Vol. 13, No. 3, May/June 1986, pp. 28-29.

The Lorne Pierce Collection at Queen's library contains many rare local histories and Canadian books of use to genealogists. Dorothy Stewart passes on the following hint from one such book: Do you know the route your Loyalist ancestors took to travel from New York state to Ontario? Perhaps they made stops along the way -- living here or there for a few weeks or months. Perhaps at one of those stops there was a death and burial, or birth and baptism.

According to Estelle Clark Watson in her book, *Loyalist Clarks, Badgleys, and Allied Families* (in the Lorne Pierce Collection, Douglas Library), Loyalists usually took one of the following seven routes:

1. By way of the Hudson to Albany, thence up the Mohawk, Wood Creek, Lake Oneida, and the Oswego to Lake Ontario.

2. Up the Hudson, Mohawk, W. Canada Creek, and Black River to Sackett's Harbor on Lake Ontario (this was a favourite route).

3. Up the Hudson, across the Mohegan Mts, down the Moose and Black Rivers to Sackett's Harbor or down the Oswegatchie to Ogdensburg.

- 4. Up the Hudson, over the mountains, and down the Racket River to the St. Lawrence.
- 5. Up the Hudson, down Lake George, Lake Champlain & Sorel River to Montreal.
- 6. By way of the Atlantic and the St. Lawrence.

#### 7. Across western N.Y.

"Sometimes whole neighborhoods united to make the journey in winter by sleighs.... There was a military highway from Oswego to Ogdensburg, and some took this for the last lap of the long journey if they had chosen the Oswego route; others crossed the lake from there by schooner. It was a long and difficult journey to reach their place of exile, no matter how they went. It took a month even by ship to reach Quebec from New York City, and after arriving at Sorel, which is up the St. Lawrence from Quebec, many had to spend the cold Canadian winter there in canvas tents" (p. 144).
