The War of Independence which broke out in America in 1775 found the Dennis families in the English colonies there divided. Such men as Captain John and Ensign Ezekiel Dennis of New Jersey and Lieutenant Daniel Dennis of Pennsylvania fought valiantly with the rebels. Others remained on the side of Britain, sometimes not out of any particular loyalty to the Crown but rather to their religious beliefs. Two who refused to enter the revolt because fighting violated their Quaker creed were Henry Dennis, then 55, a wealthy Delaware and Pennsylvania landowner and iron works proprietor, and his 18-year-old son, John. They probably were descendants of Quaker Joseph Dennis from Woodbridge, New Jersey, who had become a pioneer settler at Quakertown, Pennsylvanian some 60 to 70 years before. Father and son took refuge within the British lines at New York and were never to see their estates again. Henry died a few years later while encamped with others on Staten Island. John took up arms with the British and joined an expedition against the French at St. Lucia. Following the Peace of Paris in 1783, he and his bride, Martha McLaney, widow of a Royal Navy surgeon lost at sea, joined the trek of 25,000 displaced United Empire Loyalists to Nova Scotia, where he attempted to re-establish himself as a shipbuilder. His first attempt was at "Beaver Harbour". He tried again at Pennfield in what was to become the separate colony of New Brunswick. But, unable to make a living in what he described as a "barren, inhospitable place", John and Martha found their way back to New York and then to Virginia where John offered his services as a skilled shipwright. But, as British subjects, they were given a cool reception back in the land of John's birth. They then decided to return to life under the Union Jack, this time at York, the capital of Upper Canada and later to become Toronto, the capital of Ontario. With them went their three surviving children, Joseph (who had been born at Pennfield), Hannah and Rebecca. Another daughter had died i

John drew land on the banks of the Humber, a few miles from the then tiny settlement of Weston, where, as a son-in-law, Rev. James Richardson, later recalled, he had to "grub and toil and suffer the privations of the wilderness". But this time he decided to stick it out as a Loyalist. He turned to building vessels again. His first ship, the schooner "Toronto", which he put to work in carrying passengers across the Humber, pleased the governor of the colony so much that in 1802 John was readily appointed Master Builder at the King's Dockyard at Kingston. He was in charge of the yard, with son Joseph as his assistant, when the War of 1812 broke out. Desperately in need of ships to fight the Americans on the Great Lakes, the authorities ordered father and son back to York to construct a formidable man-of-war. Working around the clock, they almost had it completed the following year when the shipyard fell into the hands of the enemy who burned the vessel in its stocks.

When the war ended John returned to his holdings at Weston, which by then was becoming a thriving community, and from there he ventured into real estate. By 1815 he had acquired for 500 pounds two acres of land on the north-east corner of Yonge and King Streets, now a principal area of the Toronto business district. It was sold by his grandsons to settle their father's estate in 1887 for more than \$200,000. Today it would be valued in the millions.

Introduction

In the years following the close of the American Revolutionary War, the Loyalists who settled in Ontario were given land grants in partial recognition of their losses and services during that conflict. In addition, a provision was made that each of their children in turn were eligible for land grants free of fees as they came of age or married. As these sons and daughters of Loyalists petitioned for the lands they were entitled to, a notation was made of the authorization for each grant in the records of the Council of Upper Canada. Essentially what Mr. Reid did was to extract from the Orders-in-Council thousands of references to the land grants made to the sons and daughters of the Loyalists and arrange them systematically under the name of the Loyalist parent. What evolved, then, is a great collection of family group records. While not all the family groups are complete, most are.

The references in the Orders-in-Council (O.C.) generally provide, in the case of sons, only the name of the petitioner, his place of residence, and the name of his father – the Loyalist through whom he claimed the land grant. In the case of daughters, the reference states the name of her husband, their place of residence and the name of her father.

ALL OTHER INFORMATION IS EXTRANEOUS to this basic record and consists of data found by Mr. Reid in other sources. It should be clearly grasped that not all the information provided in this compilation comes from the basic source, the Orders in Council. Only the data as outlined in the preceding paragraph comes from that source. As an example, marriage dates do not come from the Orders-in-Council but were added to the basic record by Mr. Reid from other sources.

DENNIS, **JOHN**, shipbuilder; b. 1758 in Pennsylvania, son of Henry Dennis and Martha Lynn; m. 1781 Martha McLaney, a widow, in New York City, and they had five children; d. 25 Aug. 1832 in York (Toronto), Upper Canada.

The Dennises were a prosperous family of Philadelphia Quakers. During the American revolution Henry Dennis, a shipbuilder, sided with the British. Consequently, when the British evacuated Philadelphia in June 1778, the family fled to New York City where Henry and John Dennis found work refitting and re-equipping British ships. Dennis quickly tired, as he later put it, of "his Father's peaceable employment" and joined the British army. He saw action at the taking of St Lucia in December 1778, contracting a fever there which left him with a game left leg and thus rendered him "incapable of Hard service." He returned to New York and shipbuilding.

After his father's death in 1782, Dennis emigrated with his young family, eventually settling in New Brunswick. In 1795, when fire destroyed their property, Dennis moved to Alexandria, Va. The following year he was back in British territory, attracted to Upper Canada by Lieutenant Governor John Graves Simcoe, who wanted him to build gunboats. Just west of York, at the mouth of the Humber River, Dennis established his stocks and turned out ships, among them the government schooner *Toronto*, which the *Upper Canada Gazette* deemed in 1799 "one of the handsomest vessels, of her size, that ever swam upon the Ontario."

Dennis's evident talents won him the position of master shipbuilder at the government dockyards in Kingston. Receiving the appointment in January 1803, he filled it for some ten years and, during his tenure, he built a number of naval vessels. In the summer of 1812, after war had broken out with the United States, he was transferred back to York to complete a ship under construction there. When the Americans seized the provincial capital in April 1813, they destroyed the ship. The Provincial Marine decided to close the vulnerable York yard and offered Dennis a post back at Kingston. He refused, however, because he did not wish to be subordinate to recently arrived Royal Navy personnel. He was dismissed from service.

Undeniably, Dennis's work had given satisfaction, but his talents were not of such a high order that he could dictate his rank. In fact, he had some blemishes on his record. Though he described himself as a "naturally diffident" person, he had had several confrontations with colleagues. In 1806, during an unseemly affair at Kingston involving missing material, he was criticized by a panel of inquiry for eagerly making unfounded charges against others. Later, at York, his bickering with a draftsman reached the ear of the commander-in-chief, Sir George Prevost*, who determined to "get rid" of him. Having been persuaded that Dennis was not at fault, Prevost relented in September 1813. Still, by this time, the builder had proven himself a difficult fellow, and there could not have been much hesitation among officials in releasing him. Dennis felt hard done by, and must have relished the opportunity soon afforded of reminding his ungrateful former employers of the value of his work. In 1814 the military approached Dennis, the only competent person available, to build gunboats at Penetanguishene. Though unemployed at the time, he declined the offer, explaining that skilled workmen would not be available there.

John Dennis spent the rest of his life at York, where he had acquired property. He continued building ships – out of financial necessity, he said in 1826. He took an active interest in local and provincial politics, aligning himself with the reformers and voting for Robert Baldwin in the election of 1830. His long and useful life came to a close in the summer of 1832 when he fell victim to the cholera epidemic then ravaging the province. His grandson, John Stoughton Dennis, was Canada's first surveyor general.

"THE TELEGRAM" CORNER

The Buildings that have Stood at and Near the Corner of King and Bay Streets.

The land on which *The Telegram* building stands was patented to William SMITH on 20th May, 1808, and by him sold on 28th June, 1808, to Quetton ST. GEORGE, and by him sold on the 19th November, 1813, to John DENNIS. Mr. DENNIS made a will, but owing to the property not being sufficiently described, it was necessary to have a petitioned deed between the heirs of John DENNIS, whereby the property on the south-west corner of King and Bay streets, became the property of Rebecca RICHARDSON, the wife of the late Bishop RICHARDSON, and daughter of the late John DENNIS. Through her it became the property of the late Mrs. M. I. ROAF, and is now owned by William ROAF. Mr. DENNIS, in his life-time, conveyed 40 ft. on the west side of Bay street, commencing 57 ft. 9 inches south of King street, to one McPHAIL, who erected a chapel on said property, which stood there for many years. The property subsequently passed into the hands of Mr. DICKSON, who erected the present building.

The National Club building came from Mr. DENNIS to Martha BRYANT, who sold it to the late Bishop RICHARDSON, and this also became the property of the late Mrs. ROAF.

The property on the south side of King street west, as far as STOVEL's building, belong to Messrs. William and James R. ROAF. The land on which STOVEL's building stands belongs to Thomas JOHNSTON, whose mother was a daughter of the late John DENNIS.

The property from the south-west corner of King and Bay street to the south line of the National Club is owned by Wm. ROAF.

Old Colonel DENNIS, the father of that well-known family, told Mr. Thomas WALMSLEY a short time before his death that he remembered sixty years ago the little one-storey frame or roughcast dwelling, which stood on the site now occupied by *The Telegram*, and that from the corner of Bay and Kingdown to Market street (Wellington), and west along King street to the Rossin House, was one large garden of fruit trees. Indeed, west of STOVEL's building on King street to York street, the trees in 1818 were so thick that it was with great difficulty that paths were cut through the woods.

CHAPTER CVIII.

THE DENNIS COTTAGE

The Buildings ad the North-east Corner of King and Yonge streets, Afterwards the Warehouse of the RIDOUTs.

At the north-east angle made by the intersection of the two greatest thoroughfares of Toronto, King and Yonge streets, there was for a long time in the early part of the century but one solitary house. This building, which is shown in the sketch, was a rather long, respectable-looking wooden cottage of one storey, painted white, with a paling in front and shaded by large willow trees. It was the home of Mr. John DENNIS, formerly superintendant of the dock-yard at Kingston. Mr. DENNIS was one of the United Empire Loyalist refugees, and received a grant of land on the Humber, near the site of the modern village of Weston. To the eastward of Mr. DENNIS' house stood at an early period a little frame building of the most ordinary kind, worth of note simply as having been temporarily the District Grammar School before the erection of the large school-house on the Grammar School lot. Mr. DENNIS was one of the signers of an address presented to Lieutenant-Governor Francis GORE on his return to York in 1815. Joseph, the son of Mr. John DENNIS, owned and commanded a vessel on Lake Ontario in 1812. When the war with the United States broke out he and his ship were attached to the provincial marine. His vessel was captured by the Americans, and he himself was made a prisoner of war, in which state he remained for fifteen months, or half the entire length of time from the beginning to the conclusion of hostilities. He afterward commanded the Princess Charlotte, an early steamboat on Lake Ontario. As early as 1799 Joseph DENNIS was engaged in ship building. The *Gazette* of September 14th of that year made the following announcement:- "The Toronto yacht, Capt. Baker, will, in the course of a few days be ready to make her first trip. She is one of the

handsomest vessels of her size that ever swam upon the Ontario, and if we are permitted to judge from her appearance, and to do her justice we must say she bids fair to be one of the swiftest sailing vessels. She is admirably calculated for the reception of passengers, and can with propriety boast of the most experienced officers and men. Her master builder was Mr. DENNIS, an American, on whom she reflects great honour." The boat was built a little way up the Humber from its mouth. In 1826 Mr. DENNIS was still engaged in the boat building business. The *Loyalist* of June 3rd, 1826, speaks of a new steamer built by Mr. DENNIS. It says : "The new steamer Canada was towed into port this week by the Toronto from the mouth of the Rouge where she was built during the last winter. She will be shortly fitted up for her intended route white we understand will be from York and Niagara around the head of the lake and will add another to the increasing facilities of conveyance in Upper Canada. Six steamboats now navigate the St Lawrence and Lake Ontario in this province besides the Canada and a boat nearly ready for launching at Brockville." The same paper of August 12th, 1826, thus announces the first trip of the Canada across from York to Niagara. "The new steamboat Canada, Capt. RICHARDSON, made her first trip to Niagara on Monday last and went out of the harbour in fine style. Her appearance reflects much credit on her builder, Mr. Joseph DENNIS, and the machinery, manufactured by Messrs. WARDS of Montreal, is a specimen of superior workmanship. The combined excellence of the model and machinery of this boat is such as will render what is usually termed 'a fast boat." The trip to Niagara was made in a few minutes over four hours. Somewhere about 1830 the house of Mr. John DENNIS, at the corner of King and Yonge streets, was torn down and on its site was erected the four storey hipped roof red brick building, standing there to-day. Since its erection this building has been seen with little alteration of external aspect.

In 1799, the Governor of Upper Canada gave Mr. John Dennis the contract for building the *Toronto* yacht; he was to supply all labor and the Government was to furnish the material. The amount paid Mr. Dennis was £305 12s 6d, and the cost of material supplied by the Government £675 9s 4d, making the total cost of the *Toronto* yacht £981 1s 10d. Towards the end of June, Captain Baker was put in charge to superintend her completion and get the necessary stores on board, in relation to which the following letter, dated York, 6th July, 1799, from Hon. Peter Russell, Administrator of the Government, to Hon. John McGill, is of interest: "Capt. Baker represents to me that he wishes to have the stores belonging to the vessel brought down here that they may be on hand to be used when wanted – to obviate the time likely to be lost by sending occasionally to the Garrison for them. If you think therefore that his reasons are satisfactory and that they can be deposited here in safety you will be pleased to apply to the Commandant for Batteaux and Party to remove them.


"Captain Baker having remained behind by my order to superintend the finishing of the Vessel, you will be pleased to enter him upon your Books as Commander of the Government Yacht *Toronto*, from the 25th of June last inclusive, on which day he is to be considered as commencing Wages and Provisions.

"I am sorry to hear from him that the *Toronto*'s boat is not yet built. No more money should therefore be given to Mr. Dennis until this part of his contract is completed, and he should be spurred on to the finishing of the Boat last the Vessel should be detained in harbour for want of one."

The *Toronto* Yacht was built on the Humber River and made her first trip in the latter part of September, 1799. *The Gazette*, in its issue of September 14th, 1799, announces: "The *Toronto* Yacht, Capt. Baker, will in the course of a few days be ready to make her first trip. She is one of the handsomest vessels of her size that ever swam upon Lake Ontario; and if we are permitted to judge from her appearance, and to do her justice, we must say she bids fair to be one of the swiftest sailing vessels. She is admirably calculated for the reception of passengers, and can with propriety boast of the most experienced officers and men." She was wrecked on Gibraltar Point on June 2nd, 1817 in 1799.

I. II. Martha¹ BROWN UE was born circa 1749 in the Province of Pennsylvania, British America and the British West Indies.¹ She married firstly Dr Andrew MCLANEY RN.² She married secondly John DENNIS UE, son of Henry DENNIS and Martha LYNN, in 1781 at New York City, New York County, New York, USA.⁴

She wrote to Peter Russell, administrator of Upper Canada, on 10 February 1798; Upper Canada Land Petitions (1763-1865), Volume 151, Bundle D 4, Petition 61, Microfilm C-1743, Reference RG 1 L 3

Your petitioner therefore prays Your Honor to Grant herself 200 Acres and 200 Acres for her Eldest Dau^r By Doctor MLANEY [sic] her former husband & your petitioner as in Duty bound shall ever pray Martha DENNIS

As of 24 February 1798, she was also known as Martha DENNIS UE.¹³

She was named as Executrix in the will of John DENNIS UE on 28 February 1832¹⁵

That her said husband owned property to the value of five pounds in two or three Districts of this Province.

That Your petitioner in consequence of her advanced age is desirous that her son Joseph Dennis, James Richardson the Younger and William P. Patrick should be appointed to administer to the Estate with the Will annexed or Should be associated with her for that purpose.

Wherefore she prays that letters of administration be granted to her son in Law The Reverend James Richardson Jr, her son Joseph Dennis and to William P. Patrick with the Will, of her deceased husband the said John Dennis, annexed, or that they should be associated with her in administering under the said Will, as to Your Excellency may seem most proper

And as in duty bound Your Petitioner Shall ever pray

double stove I now possess, and Iron pot, also the and irons. – To my Son Joseph Dennis I give his dear Father's bed, bedding and bedstead – also a little white table – the prints or pictures in the parlour – the small drawers, and the stove which last year stood in an office at that time occupied by George Ridout Esquire – To my said [struck through] late daughter Elizabeth Sanders' children, Elizabeth and Mary Ann, I give the Franklin Street half a dozen of chairs (and all my other personal property not otherwise disposed of by this my will) [all struck through and initialled in margin: A.G.] – To my daughter Hannah Johnston I give the large chest of Drawers, a cherry breakfast table – and half a Dozen of Windsor arm chairs – a half round table – and a Carriestic[?], also the large Brass Kettle – To my daughter Rebecca Richardson, I give my small bed, with the bed and bedding thereof a Cavenistic[?], the Small stove, looking glass, five silver table spoons and sofa, to my Granddaughter Martha Richardson, five silver tea spoons, (as a Small token of remembrance) – And the black walnut chest with the few articles of clothing therein to my granddaughter Martha McLaney – out of the Pictures above given to my Son Joseph Dennis I reserve that of Trinidad for my daughter Rebecca – After the payment of my late husband's just debts and my own and funeral expenses, out of any surplus, arising from the rents of the Estate my dear husband John Dennis, left at my disposal and Control, for life, I give and my will further is that my executor, hereinafter named, do pay or cause to be paid unto, my Grandson Andrew McLaney of Pelham in the said Niagara District, the sum of Twenty five pounds Currency – and the remainder or residue thereof to be equally divided between my four children, John McLaney, Joseph Dennis, Rebecca Richardson and Hannah Johnston, share and share alike.

I do hereby nominate and appoint The Reverend James Richardson of the City of Toronto, Clerk (my son in law) Executor of this My Last Will and Testament – hereby revoking all former wills by me made, In Witness Whereof, I have to this my last Will and testament, contained in three pages of paper set my hand and seal this Twenty ninth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand Eight hundred and thirty five.

Now these are to certify whom it may concern that for the full accomplishing their said intentions this eleventh day of the twelveth [sic] month in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred & Five the said John McLaney & Elizabeth Taylor appeared in a public meeting of the said people at Pelham aforesaid and the said John McLaney taking the said Elizabeth Taylor by the hand did on this solemn occasion openly declare that he took her the said Elizabeth Taylor to his wife promising with the Lords afsistance to be unto her a loving & faithfull husband until death should separate them. And then in the same afsembly the said Elizabeth Taylor did in like manner declare that she took the said John McLaney to be her husband promising with the Lords afsistance to be until death should separate them and moreover they the said John McLaney & Elizabeth Taylor she according to the custom of Marriage afsuming the name of her husband as a further confirmation there did then and there to these presents Set their Hands and we whose names are also hereunto subscribed being present at the solemnization of the said marriage and subscription have as witnefses thereunto set our hands the Day and Year above written.²²

He and Elizabeth TAYLOR applied for a certificate to Yonge Street Monthly Meeting on 6 July 1808 at Pelham Township, Niagara District, Upper Canada, British North America:

"Application being made to this Meeting for a certificate for John Mc claney & his wife Elizabeth and their minor daughter Martha to youngstreet Monthly Meeting".²³

On 3 August 1808 at Pelham Township, Niagara District, Upper Canada, British North America it was noted that: "The friends appointed to prepare a certificate for John Mc claney produced one which not being approved they are continued to prepare another and produce it to next Meeting".²³

On 5 December 1810 at the Pelham Monthly Meeting, Pelham Township, Niagara District, Upper Canada, British North America it was minuted that:

"The friends Appointed to prepare A testification Against Benjamin Canby, Reports, the Service is not perform^{td} and Elijah Shotwell is Releas^{td}, & John M Laney is Appointed in his room & they are Continued to Report next Month.

"The Friends Appointed to prepare A testification Against Andre Moore, produc'd one, which was Read & with some alteration Approv'd. and signed by the Clerk, John M Laney and Lewis Willson, are Appointed to hand him A Coppy therof inform of his Right to Appeal and Report next Month –

"The friends Appointed to Draw A testification Against John Hill produc, d one to this Meeting which was read Approved and Signed by the Clerk, George Bradshaw and John M Laney are Appointed to hand him A Coppy thereof Inform him of his Right to Appeal & Report next Month".²³

- On 2 October 1811 at the Pelham Monthly Meeting, Pelham Township, Niagara District, Upper Canada, British North America it was minuted that: "Jesse Willson & John McLaney are appointed to revise the Minutes now in Isaac Willson's hands and report next Month".²³

I John McLaney of the Township of Pelham in the County of Welland in the District of Niagara and Province of Canada, yeoman, do make and declare this my last Will and testament in manner and form following

First, I resign my Soul into the hands of Almighty God hoping and believing in a remission of my Sins by the merits and Mediation of Jesus Christ, And my Body I commit to the Earth to be buried at the discretion of my Executors hereinafter named. And my worldly Estate I give and devise as follows –

First, I give and devise to my Daughter Hannah Crosier McLaney all that my whole messuage and Tenement, situate, lying and being in the Township of Pelham County, District, and Province aforesaid, which Messuage and tenement is composed of the south parts of Lots numbers four and five in the tenth Concession of the said Township of Pelham containing forty Acres be the same more or less; which forty Acres of Land are thus described, that is to say, Beginning at the southeast Angle of said lot number four, then North Eleven Chains fifty links; thence North Eighty one degrees West twenty nine Chains, fifty links; then South sixteen Chains ten Links; thence East twenty nine Chains to the place of Beginning and containing Forty Acres Exclusive of the allowances for Highways To have and to hold to my said Daughter Hannah Crosier McLaney her Heirs Executors and Assigns Forever, Nevertheless, if my said Daughter Hannah Crosier McLaney in the event of his taking up his residence in some other place, Then I give and devise unto my hereinafter named Executors, or any of them in trust, or the Survivors of them in trust, the said Messuage and tenements, for them, either to rent, the proceeds of which shall by them paid over annually to my said Daughter or to sell Alien Transfer and convey by Deed in Fee Simple to the best possible advantage the Said Messuage and tenement, the proceeds of which Sale shall be applied to the benefit and support of my said Daughter Hannah Crosier McLaney, who shall pay over the interest of the proceeds of the sale annually unto my said Daughter or if her circumstances should require it; such portion of the principal together as shall be deemed necessary to render her comfortable. I Also give and bequeath unto my said Daughter Hannah Crosier McLaney all my Household Furniture.

Secondly I give and bequeath unto my son Andrew McLaney my span of horses with all my Farming utensils, which he shall keep upon my said Messuage and Tenement, for the purpose of tilling it, so long as my said Daughter or my Executors shall deem advantageous to my surviving Family.

Third, I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Hannah Crosier McLaney all my cows, sheep and hogs.

Fourth, I give and Devise unto my son Andrew McLaney two hundred Acres of Land, being Lot number two in the fourth Concession of the Township of York West of Young Street, for the description of which reference is made to my Deed for the said Lot to have and hold unto my said son Andrew McLaney and to his Heirs Lawfully begotten Forever.

Fifth I Give and Devise unto my Grandson Jacob Crosier Ray Two hundred Acres of Land, being Lot number seven in the third concession of the Township of York West of Young Street, for the description of which reference is made to my Deed for the said Lot, to have and to hold unto my said Grandson Jacob Crosier Ray, and to his Heirs Lawfully begotten, Forever.

Sixth, I also Give and devise unto my said Grandson Jacob Crosier Ray two hundred Acres of Land being Lot number nineteen in the second concession of the Township of York East of Young street for the description of which reference is made to my Deed for the said Lot, to have and to hold unto my Said Grandson Jacob Crosier Ray and to his Heirs Lawfully begotten Forever.

Seventh, I Give and bequeath unto my Executors or the survivors of them in trust Lot number nineteen in the second Concession of the Township of York East of Young Street, for them to rent to the best possible advantage, and the proceeds they shall apply to the support, maintenance and Education of my Said Grandson Jacob Crosier Ray, and if the proceeds of the rent of that Lot shall be found insufficient for the purpose of affording him my said Grandson a comfortable maintenance and for affording the means of giving him a good English Education, which shall consist at Least in a good knowledge of Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Grammar, Geography and Land Surveying then I hereby authorize and empower my Executors to take and apply so much of the proceeds of my personal Estate as will be necessary to enable them to afford my said Grandson Jacob Crosier Ray the Maintenance and Education above described.

Eighth, In the event of any of the above named Devisees Hannah Crosier McLaney, Andrew McLaney or Jacob Crosier Ray dying before they have (or without) a Lawful Heir, then his or her or their devise or property given them by this Will shall be equally divided among the survivors or survivor of them. But if they shall <u>all</u> die without a Lawful Heir then their property given them by this Will shall be equally divided among my sister Elizabeth Sanders' Children.

In addition to the Branches which my Grand Son Jacob Crosier Ray shall be taught, I direct that he shall be taught Book-keeping. Ninth, I have sold two hundred Acres of Land in the Township of Darlington County of Durham, District of Newcastle, and Province of Canada unto John E Whitteker, or to his Heirs and Assigns and to him or to whoever shall hold the Bond which I gave to him binding myself to make him a Deed when the amount which he was to pay me for the Land was fully paid which was to be finally paid up and finished on the first day of May one thousand Eight hundred and forty Eight. This Lot of Land was allocated by my Mother Martha Dennis and was willed by her to me. I was to give a Deed to John E Whitteker for one hundred and twenty five Acres of the said Lot and I was to give a Deed to Richard Demera for the remaining seventy five Acres of the said Lot of Land, when the payments should have been made as above mentioned.

In order to faithfully fulfil my agreement with the said John E Whitteker and Richard Demera, I Will and order that the Executors of this my last Will and Testament or their Executor or Executors, for and towards the performance of my said Will and Testament shall have full Power and authority to Grant Alien bargain and sell and convey and assure the said Lot of Land unto them or their Heirs Executors or assigns Forever in Fee Simply by all Lawful ways and means in the Law as to my said Executors or their Executors or to his or their Counsil learned in the Law shall seem fit or necessary.

Tenth, All my funeral Expenses and and [sic] all my Just and Lawful debts shall be paid by my Executors out of Moneys which I have now on hand

Eleventh, If the above named John E Whitteker and Richard Demera, or their Heirs and assigns shall fail to make out their payments at the precise time mentioned in the Obligations My Executors shall allow them a further reasonable time to make out sayd payments, and after that reasonable time shall have Expired the Lott shall as the Bonds specify revert to my Estate.

Twelfth. Whatever amount of my monies arising from the monies on hand and from the Bonds and obligations now in my possession shall after the Maintainance and Education of my Grandson Jacob Crosier Roy (shall have) have been completely effected and accomplished be Equally divided between my two children and Grandchild, viz Hannah Crosier McLaney, Andrew McLaney and Jacob Crosier Ray.

Lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint my Friends John Brown OReilly and David Palmer Brown – The said John Brown OReilly of Wainfleet and the said David Palmer Brown of Crowland to be Executors of this my Last Will and testament hereby revoking all former Wills by me made. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this second day of September in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty five.

From a plaque outside 54 Cricklewood Crescent, Thornhill, Ontario and from the diary of the Rev. Isaac Fidler:

Cricklewood

East of this location surrounded by Townhouses, stands an imposing Georgian house known locally as Cricklewood, although until 1956 the house and surrounding property were called Brooklands. Part of this house was built by Matthias Sanders before 1813. He married the original crown grantee, Elizabeth Denis, daughter of John Denis, a boat-builder and U.E.L. Matthias Sanders was killed in the War of 1812 defending York., and Elizabeth remarried an American adventurer, to her subsequent regret. An early resident at Cricklewood, the Rev. Isaac Fidler, rector of Holy Trinity Church wrote in his diary in 1832:

There is no Anglican rectory and the accommodation available proved far from comfortable. It consisted of half a house, 2 rooms downstairs and 3 above. The upper rooms being lathed, but not plastered, could be seen into from the outside....With two small children and a new baby to care for, Agnes Fidler longed for accustomed amenities. Had the inside of our residence corresponded with the outside, it might have counted among the beauties of Canada. It was delightfully situated on the summit of a hill, not far from the church, and above a pleasant bend of the valley. A perennial stream sufficient at all times to give motion to a grist and saw mill ran through the grounds a little below. In front, but a distance of 300 yards, were the expanded waters of a mill pond....Behind this sheet of water was a thick grove of lofty pines standing on a steep acclivity. The view from the house was extensive and commanded a sight of Yonge St. for a considerable distance on both sides. The village of Thornhill, a thriving and increasing place was surrounded on all sides by families of great respectability....

The manner in which we lived was not very splendid....The house had no oven. One had been built which had fallen into decay. We could sometimes have bread from York....It was not always possible to obtain joints of fresh meat....as there were no butchers or stalls....Our usual drink was tea into which a little whiskey or brandy was infused, sometimes a little wine and water. Mrs. Fidler occasionally procured ale for herself at 8 pence per quart.⁵⁶

From the diary of Rev. Isaac Fidler, quoted in part on the plaque cited above:

Our landlady was a widow, and had come originally from New York. She was one of the United States Loyalists, and the second or third person who settled at Thornhill. This was at a time when Yonge Street was no better than a continuous forest, and a foot-path, or at most a horse-path, was their only road. At that period, their wheat had to be carried through forests, or by water, fifty or sixty miles, before it could be converted into flour; and letters might remain for six months in the Post Office at York, before they could be forwarded to the proper persons. Our landlady sometimes alluded to the changes she had witnessed in the removal of forests, the cultivation of lands, and inconveniencies of all kinds. But she deplored these changes; since people from England of some capital, who generally prefer to purchase farms partially cleared rather than seclude themselves within almost impervious forests, were hereby induced to take up their residence along the road, and to buy out the original settlers. She had witnessed the departure or death of most of her co-temporary settlers; and began to feel herself among a strange people of another generation, with whom she had little intercourse and less sympathy.

The former husband of our landlady had left her with a family of sons and daughters, with a highly improved farm, with flocks of sheep and herds of cattle, and with five hundred pounds in money. American republicans have been frequently found prowling up and down Canada, in search of something which they might be able to convert into their own profit, regardless of the character or welfare of their dupes. Our landlady, a handsome widow with a handsome fortune, was not likely to continue undiscovered. One of them, a physician by profession, learned her history, was introduced, gained her heart, and married her. He obtained possession also of her cattle and her money; but not of her land, for this was a grant from government originally conveyed to herself, and she would never part with it. This American, after living with her for some time, and obtaining all she possessed but her farm, found his way back into the States, where he had another wife. The cattle and money obtained by our landlady had previously disappeared.

This is by no means a solitary instance of such tricks. During the year we were there, an American, I was told, found his way to the affections of a young and beautiful Canadian, and to the purse of her father. He married her, and secured her fortune, and then vanished for ever, from the confines of her country.

Americans boast of their skill in money-making; and as it is the only standard of dignity, and nobility, and worth, in that country, they endeavour to obtain it by every possible means. A person in Canada informed me, that he and another gentleman, once overheard two American fathers, arranging a marriage between a son and a daughter. The bridegroom's father had but little fortune to bestow, and the father of the bride would not give his consent to such a degrading union. The other hereupon assured him, that his son was deserving of the wealthiest lady in America, and then recounted numerous instances of successful and clever villany, of which his boy had been guilty, and which the young lady's father admitted as equivalent to a fortune. I heard so many instances of well-accredited cunning and knavery practised by Americans on Canadians, that a volume might be filled with such incidents. Some of the tales are false, no doubt, or at least exaggerated. Yet too many are sufficiently authenticated, and have been accompanied by so much notoriety, as to prevent the imputation of falsehood or enlargement. [sic]⁷¹

B. An Order-in-Council was made at the Council of Upper Canada on 14 February 1798 that Elizabeth DENNIS had petitioned for the lands she was entitled to as the daughter of a Loyalist. Sons and daughters could apply when they came of age or were married.⁶² As of 24 February 1798, she was also known as Elizabeth SANDERS UE.⁶³

She and Matthias SANDERS lived in 1801 at near the River Humber, York, York Township, York County, Home District, Upper Canada, British North America;

OBITUARY.

October 28, 1886. JAMES R. JOHNSON, Aged 70 years.

By the death of James R. JOHNSON this community loses one of its best and truest citizens, and the Methodist church one of its most faithful and useful members.

The late Mr. JOHNSON was born at York Mills, near Toronto, 1816, and was a nephew of the late Bishop RICHARDSON of the M.E. Church. In politics he was a conscientious and lifelong Reformer. With a Puritan abhorrence of wrong and love for free institutions, he sided warmly with the patriot cause in the stormy days preceding 1837, when to be a Reformer meant political and almost social ostracism. When the so-called "rebellion" broke out, he cast in his lot with the patriot cause. As to the details of this interesting part of his life history we are without information, except that he was taken and remained a prisoner in Toronto for about three months. In 1842, he married Miss KILMAN, of Stamford, and in 1850, removed from York Mills to that township. In 1855 he located in the vicinity of Dunnville, where with his family he remained seven years. From there he removed to Thorold Township, subsequently to Stamford, and in 1874 he gave up farming and located in the town of Welland, entering into the planing mill business with Mr. Adam K. VAN WYCK, and subsequently in sawmilling and building operations with Mr. George ELLSWORTH, in which he continued up to his last illness. His beloved wife died about 15 years ago. Of their union there were seven children. The eldest son died in infancy, and a few years ago the second son, Wm. O. JOHNSON, remembered by many of our readers as for some years in the lumber business at Port Colborne, departed this life. One son and four daughters survive, - one of the latter being Mrs. W.E. TESKEY of this town. Mr. JOHNSON also leaves one brother and three sisters – Thos. Clarke JOHNSON and Mrs. Jas. PINNICK of Toronto, Mrs. Thos. LACKIE of Willowdale and Mrs. Clark B. RIDGELAND [sic] of Downsview.

Deceased was taken ill at Pelham fair. Up to that time he had been in usual health. A week previously he had accidentally injured his hand slightly on a saw – a mere scratch. Possibly this slight wound was inflamed by handshaking with the many friends met at the Fair. At all events, erysipelas set in that day, beginning in the hand which had been injured, and from that time until his death deceased was extremely ill, and more or less delirious. At the last, when the attending physician hoped the attack had been got the better of, congestion of the lungs occurred, with speedy and fatal result.

The funeral took place on Saturday – just three weeks from the beginning of illness – and was very largely attended. Interment was made at Fonthill. A memorial service was held in the Methodist church on Sabbath evening. The altar, pulpit and choir rails, were deeply draped in mourning. Rev. Mr. COLLING preached a timely and impressive sermon from St. Luke, xii., 35, 36, 37: - "Let your loins be girded about and your lights burning; and ye yourselves like unto men that wait for their lord, when he will return from the wedding; that when he cometh and knocketh they may open unto him immediately. Blessed are those servants whom the lord when he cometh shall find watching: verily I say unto you that he shall gird himself, and make them to sit down to meat, and will come forth and serve them." In closing, the Reverend speaker referred warmly to the Christian humility, constancy and reverence of the deceased; and to his pure, affectionate, true home life; assuring those bereaved of the heartfelt sympathy of all friends. In all the relations of life he was a model and his death leaves a void that will long be felt. He has gone to his reward with an unsullied name and the r[illegible] legacy of a well spent life:

A noble spirit wings its heavenward way,

Whilst riven hearts their last sad tributes pay!

Life's labours cease - the Master's work done -

The battle fought – the last great conflict won!

The Cross, with me[illegible] submission he lays down,

And from his Saviour takes the Victor's Crown.²⁷⁰

Thomas R. JOHNSON.

Thomas R. JOHNSON, a native of Toronto, and one of New York city's foremost architects, passed away in New York on Tuesday last, in his 41st year. He was a son of the late Thos. B. JOHNSON, and commenced his architectural studies after leaving the School of Science, Toronto, with Mr. E. J. LENNOX, the prominent Toronto architect. He later went to New York, where he soon achieved a remarkable and sudden success, and at the time of his death was a partner in the firm of Cass Gilbert. He obtained the highest distinction as an architectural designer and rendered, and among the famous buildings designed by him were the Detroit Public Library, the University of Minnesota buildings at Minneapolis, and, more recently, the Woolworth Building of New York. Quoting the Brickbuilder, it is said of him that "probably no more beautiful renderings of elevation have ever been produced either here or abroad than his". Again, "he was one of the most finished draftsmen in New York, and was also famous as a caricaturist, being more able in that art than many who make their livelihood from it." The late Mr. JOHNSON is survived by his widow and three children, his mother, Mrs. Agnes JOHNSON, of Toronto, his sisters, Mrs. Harry WRIGHT and Mrs. Thompson CHRISTIE, of Toronto, Mrs. George FERRIS of New York, and a younger brother, Eaton J. JOHNSON, of Vancouver. His untimely death will be mourned by his many friends and admirers both in Canada and the United States.³¹⁰

Joseph Dennis, only son of John, settled and died on a part of the old homestead. He had a family of four sons and five daughters: Jane, deceased, was the wife of H. Mulkins; Maria, deceased, was the wife of J. W. Bridgeland, a land surveyor of York; Martha, deceased, was the wife of William Gentle, of Weston; Joseph, Mary and Christine died young; Stoughton married a Miss Oliver of Kingston, and they settled in Weston, later removing to Ottawa, where he was employed by the Government as a surveyor until his death, his wife surviving him; Henry; and John, who was a prominent business man of County York, owning a woollen mill in Weston, where he resided for some years, died at Parkdale in 1895, leaving a widow, formerly Letitia Deacon, of Canada, and she lives with her family at Parkdale.²⁴⁶ He was Indiv Note When the war ended John returned to his holdings at Weston, which by then was becoming a thriving community, and from there he ventured into real estate. By 1815 he had acquired for 500 pounds two acres of land on the north-east corner of Yonge and King Streets, now a principal area of the Toronto business district. It was sold by his grandsons to settle their father's estate in 1887 for more than \$200,000. Today it would be valued in the millions.

But that was only the beginning of the Dennis (sometimes also recorded as "Denny") property acquisitions in and around Toronto. Son Joseph, who had married, first, Mary Stoughton of York and, after her death, the widowed Margaret (Deacon) Richardson, assembled 104 additional acres on the west side of Yonge Street plus much more in other areas of the thriving colony capital. The numerous properties, bequeathed to his widow and three sons when he died of cholera 1867, read in his will like a city assessment roll.³²²

"Mr. Dennis was born in New Brunswick in 1789, his father, the late John Dennis, having settled there after being driven out of the United States as a U. E. Loyalist. **The family removed to Canada some three years later**, Mr. John Dennis receiving a grant of land for his services and losses as a Loyalist...." This comment from The History of the Settlement of Upper Canada, is a direct quote from Joseph Dennis' obituary in The Daily Globe, Toronto, 19 June 1867.⁹

F. Joseph² DENNIS was born in 1789 at Pennfield, Charlotte County, New Brunswick Colony, British North America.³²³

In 1812 he was engaged by General Isaac BROCK as a ship's carpenter in the Provincial Marine to convey troops and stores between York and Niagara on Lake Ontario aboard DENNIS' Schooner *Lady Gore*. That your petitioner now for the second, and he trusts the last, time prefers the Claim – with the firm conviction that both as a favour and at the same time as an act of justice, and while he would be grateful for it as the first he would most humbly and respectfully submit to your Excellency that it would be only consistent with the latter, the Government can have no object in, or desire towards, withholding from a faithful and confiding servant a consideration which may serve as a fair remuneration for personal services and suffering as well as a just due for losses actually sustained by him in its defence

He is the eldest son of Joseph Dennis and Mary Stoughton, his wife, and grandson of John Dennis, a United Empire Loyalist, who, living in Philadelphia at the time of the American rebellion, cast his fortunes in with the Crown. He was John Stoughton Dennis, a land surveyor by profession but by preference a soldier-adventurer with the rank of colonel in the militia. It was a choice that was to get him and others associated with him into difficulties on at least two occasions.

The first involved the Fenian Brotherhood which had been organized in the United States to support the striving of their fellow Irish for Home Rule. In 1866 they staged a surprise invasion of Canada with a force of 2,000 men and occupied Fort Erie. Consternation struck the

authorities at York. The Queen's Own Rifles were called out to march to Colborne a few miles along the shores of Lake Erie from where the Fenians had established their foothold. Their orders were to drive them back across the border. Dennis saw this as a chance for the military adventure and glory he had been thirsting for. He arranged through appropriate channels, said to have led right up to Prime Minister John A. Macdonald, to have the regular officer commanding the unit relieved and replaced by himself. Another unit was dispatched from Hamilton, and it was under the command of a more senior officer. When the order came through for the two forces to combine, Dennis, knowing he could not be number one, chose to undertake an operation of his own. He commandeered a tug, loaded it with some 100 artillerymen, armed only with rifles, and struck out down the lake to cut off the Fenians should they try to flee from counter-attacking forces. When they reached Fort Erie he sent his men ashore to take up positions in the centre of the open town. They had barely moved in when the 2,000 Fenians started to sweep through in retreat. After a brief clash of arms, Colonel Dennis panicked, ordered every man of his heavily outnumbered force to force for himself, and he fled for cover. He was subsequently court-martialled on charges of cowardice and incompetence but, surprisingly, acquitted on both counts. Rumour had it that John A. Macdonald had personally intervened to save him.

In 1869 he was in the eye of another hurricane, this time helping to stir up the wrath of Louis Riel and his 6,000 French-speaking Métis in the Canadian North-West. The Canadian Government had been negotiating with the Hudson's Bay Company in England to acquire from it for 300,000 pounds the region beyond the Ontario boundary known as Rupert's Land. In preparation for the approaching signing of the agreement, a group under Colonel Dennis was quietly sent to the Red River by Public Works Minister William McDougall to start surveys for purposes of future settlement. The Métis half-breeds had already laid out properties for themselves along the river in the traditional Quebec pattern of narrow lots stretching back from the waterway with a common use "hay privilege" prairie beyond. Dennis proceeded to conduct his survey over these lands to divide the area into square townships. He quickly sensed the apprehension and anger of the Métis and warned his minister back in Ottawa. McDougall thought so little of it he didn't even bother to pass the information along to the Prime Minister. A few months later McDougall himself was on his way to Rupert's Land through the United States with an appointment as Lieutenant Governor of the territory, to take effect upon the official turn-over, then scheduled for December 1st. With him was a retinue carrying 300 rifles in their baggage. When Riel heard of this he exploded in fury. He rushed one force toward the border to stop McDougall and, with another, took over for Garry, the Hudson's Bay Company's main establishment in the region. The turn of events alarmed Prime Minister Macdonald. He sent off a message to McDougall with a blunt warning about Dennis and others of his kind in the area: "You must bridle these gentlemen or they will be a continual source of disquiet to you." Until the official take-over, he reminded the frontier leaders, Rupert's Land was to be regarded as a foreign country in which Canadians had no rights.

"The course taken by Stoughton Dennis in pressing for strong measures to be taken against parties interfering with his surveys was exceedingly injudicious," He wrote to the Governor-designate. "He is a very decent fellow and a good surveyor and all that, but he has got no head and is exceedingly fussy. He was in the country simply on sufferance, in anticipation of its future transfer to Canada; on finding any serious dissatisfaction amongst the natives or residents, he should have struck work and awaited your arrival."

As the originally planned acquisition date neared, Macdonald decided to tell the British Government and, through it, the Hudson's Bay Company the takeover could not be carried out until peace had been restored. He sent advice of this postponement off to McDougall, still waiting in frustration at the border, and urged him to keep his cool. But the patience of both the Governor-to-be and Dennis was running out. The Honourable Mr. McDougall ignored the postponement notice and took it upon himself to proclaim the annexation of Rupert's Land and his appointment as head of government of the territory. Designating Dennis as "Conservator of the Peace", he assigned to the eager colonel powers to raise an armed force of whatever loyal Canadians he could find in the area, surprise Stone Fort, a Métis-held Hudson's Bay Company post 20 miles south of Fort Garry, and quell the rebels. With this authority Dennis entered into what Macdonald later called "a series of inglorious intrigues", including gun-running to some full-blooded Indians and some of the 1,600 white settlers in the region in the hopes that they would join him. But six days after seizing Stone Fort and still able to muster only sixty whites to bear arms, he heard that Riel had sent a force to deal with McDougall. He gave up in disgust – and perhaps fright – and pulled out. The next day the 25-year-old Montreal-educated Riel proclaimed the creation of a provisional government under his leadership on the Red River and a sorry era in Canada's history was well underway.

The worst that Macdonald had feared had come to pass. "The two together," he wrote in despair of McDougall and Dennis to his old friend and former Finance Minister Sir John Rose in London, "have done their utmost to destroy our chance of an amicable settlement with these wild people." What had become of Dennis he did not know "but it is said he has abandoned Stone Fort and is lurking somewhere". Dennis had fled, it was later learned, to join McDougall in safety south of the border.

It was assumed by most that, after this and subsequent events, including the spilling of bloodshed on the prairies, Dennis had had his day in the government service. But such was not to be. In 1871, the man who had helped to incite the Métis to rebellion three years before was appointed Surveyor General of Dominion Lands. And from there he went to the post of Deputy Minister of the Interior. He dabbled in marine affairs as well. He authored a book on the practicability of establishing an ocean route for trade purposes between Europe and Canada's North West via the Hudson Bay – an idea whose time had not yet come. Upon his eventual retirement from government service in 1885, he was named a Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George. The grandson of the displaced Quaker shipwright and United Empire Loyalist from Pennsylvania had done well for himself, if not for the wars with the Fenians and the Métis. His son, also a Colonel John S. Dennis, became a Vice President of the Canadian Pacific Railways.³²²

DENNIS, JOHN STOUGHTON, surveyor, militia officer, civil servant, and entrepreneur; b. 19 Oct. 1820 in Kingston, Upper Canada, eldest son of Joseph Dennis and Mary Stoughton; m. 13 Sept. 1848 Sarah Maria Oliver, and they had several children; d. 7 July 1885 at Kingsmere, Que., and was buried at Kingston.

John Stoughton Dennis was born into a family of relative affluence in which military virtues and loyalty counted for much. During the American revolution his grandfather, John Dennis*, supported the British and left his home in Philadelphia, eventually settling on the Humber River near York (Toronto); during the War of 1812 his father, Joseph, a lake captain, was captured and imprisoned by the Americans. About 1822 Joseph moved his family from the Kingston area to York, and then in 1830 to Weston. Here the Dennis family were to play a prominent role in the economic life of the community.

John Stoughton was educated at Victoria College in Cobourg, Upper Canada, and, after apprenticing with Charles Rankin, he qualified as a land surveyor on 4 Jan. 1842. His surveying career was an active one. Over the next two decades he surveyed a number of town sites along the projected routes of the Grand Trunk and Great Western railways; he registered the plan for Weston on 18 July 1846. He surveyed the Bruce Peninsula in 1855, and townships and colonization roads in the Muskoka, Haliburton, Parry Sound, and Nipissing districts between

1860 and 1865. In 1861 he began laying out ten townships for the Canadian Land and Emigration Company in the Minden-Haliburton area. He also surveyed various Indian reserves on the shores of lakes Huron and Superior. His professional competence had been recognized when he was appointed to the board of examiners for provincial land surveyors in 1851.

Although he lived in Toronto, Dennis maintained a keen interest in Weston, helping to secure the passage of the Grand Trunk Railway through it; he was also a member of the first board of the local grammar school. His concerns extended beyond local matters, to the institution for the deaf, dumb, and blind in Hamilton and to the Canadian Institute. Dennis was especially interested in the militia, believing himself "descended of martial ancestors." In 1855 he was made a lieutenant of a cavalry troop, and in the following year commander of the Toronto Field Battery. In 1862 he was appointed brigade-major of the 5th Military District (with the rank of lieutenant-colonel), and he held the post until 1871. Dennis first saw active service in June 1866 during the Fenian invasion. Somehow he secured temporary command of the 2nd Battalion, Queen's Own Rifles [see William Smith Durie], which was sent on 1 June to Port Colborne where Dennis was second in command to Lieutenant-Colonel Alfred Booker*. Colonel George John Peacocke, the commander of the imperial troops on the Niagara frontier, instructed Booker to bring his force to Stevensville (now part of Fort Erie, Ont.) to await the Fenian attack. Dennis, believing the Fenians drunk and disorganized, beseeched Booker to attack immediately, but this scheme was rejected, though Booker later agreed to take independent action. Dennis commandeered the tugboat W. T. Robb, and began patrolling the Niagara River in an attempt to stop Fenian movements. On 2 June, Booker's force, proceeding towards Stevensville, was attacked and defeated at Ridgeway by a force of Fenians led by John O'Neill*. In the afternoon of the same day, Dennis landed 70 of his men at Fort Erie in an attempt to find out where the Canadians were and to dispose of the prisoners he had taken. Some 150 Fenians appeared, but, confident of victory and unaware that more Fenians were coming up, Dennis urged his men forward. Following an exchange of fire, he ordered a retreat; the tugboat cast off without him and he was forced to disguise himself as "a labouring man." He escaped, but 34 of his men did not.

An officer who had served at Fort Erie subsequently demanded an investigation into Dennis' conduct, and another, who had lost a leg in the battle, publicly labelled him "a coward" and a "Poltrooney scoundrel." Dennis requested a court of inquiry which examined charges by the officers, mostly of endangering his men unnecessarily but also of deserting them in the face of enemy fire. The court exonerated him completely but its president, George Taylor Denison* II, privately felt Dennis culpable of disobeying orders and published a dissenting opinion questioning his judgement.

After the embarrassments of 1866 Dennis returned to his surveying career. In 1869 he was sent by William McDougall*, Canadian minister of public works, to the Red River Settlement (Man.) as a temporary employee of the Canadian government to survey lots for prospective settlers. The Métis of Red River, who had not wanted the surveys undertaken in the first place, were doubly suspicious of Dennis when he stayed with Dr John Christian Schultz*, whom they heartily distrusted, after his arrival in August. The surveys, based on the American section system, seemed to threaten existing river lot holdings and, despite Dennis' reassurances to them, the Métis under Louis Riel obstructed a survey team on André Nault*'s farm on 11 Oct. 1869. Dennis attempted in vain to persuade William Mactavish*, the governor of Assiniboia and of Rupert's Land, to punish the perpetrators. Prime Minister Sir John A. Macdonald* deemed this pressure by Dennis "exceedingly injudicious." Dennis, he continued in a letter to McDougall, was "a very decent fellow and a good surveyor" but quite without a "head." Surveys in the Métis area stopped but those elsewhere continued.

McDougall, as lieutenant governor designate of the North-West Territories, arrived in Pembina (N. Dak.) on 30 October, and Dennis journeyed south to meet him. On 21 October the National Committee of the Métis of Red River had ordered McDougall not to enter the settlement and Dennis and McDougall were turned back to Pembina by a Métis patrol on 3 November. They remained at Pembina until 29 November when Dennis returned to the colony with two proclamations, one announcing McDougall's assumption of authority on 1 December, the supposed date of the transfer of the colony from the Hudson's Bay Company to Canada, and the other naming himself McDougall's "Lieutenant" and "conservator of the peace."

The colonel established his headquarters at Lower Fort Garry and attracted "a motley crowd of 300"; he tried to ensure order among the volunteers by prohibiting liquor, but the attempt collapsed when he exempted himself. On 6 December a call "to all loyal men" produced a few more volunteers. Then, the following day, Schultz and a band of followers, barricaded in his Winnipeg warehouse, were forced to surrender to Riel, who proclaimed a provisional government on 8 December. Dennis, without either seeing or paying his men, disbanded them on 9 December and fled the colony two days later. His surveyors, who had been brought into the fort, were instructed to go back to their work, one of them being told specifically not to survey "beyond the limits of the English portions of the settlement." Dennis returned to Ottawa with McDougall, leading Macdonald to reflect sourly that they had "done their utmost to destroy our chance of an amicable settlement" with the Métis. On 12 Feb. 1870 Dennis reported to Hector-Louis Langevin*, the minister of public works, that the people of Red River had not allowed the surveyors to proceed for fear of the Métis; he nevertheless took pride in the fact that they had surveyed 20,000 acres of farmland along the Red and Assiniboine rivers, ascertaining "present actual boundaries (but making no change whatever)." Two days later he assured Macdonald in a letter that he had "discharged" his duty "with prudence and judgment."

On his return to Ontario Dennis served for a time as Lieutenant Governor William Pearce Howland*'s private secretary, and on 7 March 1871 his professional qualifications secured his appointment as Canada's first surveyor general and head of the new Dominion Lands Branch. He made solid contributions as surveyor general. In March 1872 he produced a report which optimistically outlined the agricultural possibilities of the northwest. His office pushed ahead with the Manitoba surveys and after 1874 extended the base and meridian lines north from the 49th parallel to the North Saskatchwan River and west from Red River to the Rocky Mountains. For the most part Dennis remained in Ottawa, providing for corrections in the surveys already run, planning new and more detailed surveys, allocating the HBC lands, and trying to reassure the Indians and the Métis, as well as the few white settlers, that their rights would be respected. The possibilities of the west had clearly seized Dennis' imagination, and he busily formulated a grand scheme in which Hudson Bay was to become a great commercial artery, funnelling people and produce in and out of the west.

On 14 Nov. 1878 Dennis became the deputy minister of the interior under Macdonald as minister. He won the post on merit; he had been no party war-horse, for, as he later informed Sir John, "I have never upon principle, since I have been in receipt of a salary from the Government, either as a staff officer of Militia or since I entered the regular Civil Service, cast a single vote." Dennis did not toady to his minister, and in July 1879 they had a heated disagreement over the details of the disposition of the 100,000 acres of western railway lands. Macdonald proposed that the land be sold in 80-acre units, while Dennis argued for the new American system of 160 acres. Apparently Dennis carried the day, for the homestead units were raised to 160 acres. Macdonald praised Dennis' work, which the latter found almost as gratifying as "a compliment (if such a thing could be imagined) coming from the Queen herself."

As deputy minister, Dennis kept a sharp eye on the northwest; concerned over the depressed condition of the Indians and Métis, he urged the government to assist the Métis in becoming settled farmers by giving them cattle, technical training, and whatever else they needed, in the belief that they could then help civilize the Indians. His advice was ignored. In 1880 Dennis travelled to England with the Canadian delegation which was attempting to finance the Canadian Pacific Railway. The following year he joined Sir Alexander Tilloch Galt* on a tour of inspection of the west; it was a tiring journey for the ailing deputy minister who subsequently resigned his office on 31 December. He took comfort from the fact that he had helped to formulate public lands policy at a time "when the country was as a white sheet" and from the knowledge that his services were appreciated. On 24 May 1882 he was created a CMG.

During his retirement Dennis maintained close relations with his "dear old chief," even contributing to Macdonald's campaign fund in 1882. Although he had insisted that he had left office "poor and involved in debt," he was able to invest in several private business concerns, including a consumers' cooperative and a mining venture in what is now Alberta. His most cherished enterprise was Dennis, Sons and Company, established in 1882, with offices in England, to tender advice to prospective colonizers and immigrants. John Stoughton Dennis Jr, also a prominent surveyor, was a member of the firm, and the company became involved in surveys in the northwest; political influence helped secure contracts.

Dennis was active until his death in July 1885. Although he may be remembered as a militia officer who was prone to leap upon his horse and ride off in all directions at once, he should also be recalled as an able administrator who made significant, lasting contributions to Canada.

He married Sarah Maria OLIVER, daughter of George Henry OLIVER and Harriet Webb SADLER, on 12 September 1848 at St George's Church, Kingston, Kingston Township, Frontenac County, Midland District, Canada West, Province of Canada;

19 Sept 1848: At St. George's Church, Kingston, on Tuesday, 12th inst., J. Stoughton DENNIS, of Weston, near Toronto, to Sarah Maria, second daughter of George Henry OLIVER, of this city. (Arch. STUART).³⁴⁴

He lived on 12 September 1848 at Weston, York Township, York County, Canada West, Province of Canada.³²⁸ He was listed as head of household in the 1861 Canadian census at Weston, York Township, York County, Canada West, Province of Canada.⁴² He was Episcopalian / Church of England.²⁷⁶ He witnessed the Marriage of Dr Rudolph Caleb MARLATTE MD and Harriet Buss SCOTT on 29 April 1868 at Toronto, York Township, York County, Ontario, Canada.³⁴⁵ He was listed in the 1871 Canadian census at York Township, York County, Ontario, Canada.⁴⁷ He was a Land Surveyor, Surveyor-General of Canada (1871) Deputy Minister of the Interior, Government of Canada (1871-) on 2 April 1871.³⁴⁶ He was named in the will of Rev. Bishop James RICHARDSON on 23 May 1874 at Toronto, York Township, York County, Ontario, Canada.³⁴⁷ He was employed in the Civil Service on 4 April 1881.⁵⁴ He was listed as head of household in the 1881 Canadian census at Wellington Ward, Ottawa, Gloucester Township, Ottawa-Carleton County, Ontario, Canada.¹⁰

a) Mary Emma⁴ DENNIS was born circa June 1849 at Canada West, Province of Canada.³⁴⁸ She was Episcopalian / Church of England / Anglican.³⁴⁹ She was listed as a member of the household of Lieut.-Col. John Stoughton DENNIS in the 1861 Canadian census at Weston, York Township, York County, Canada West, Province of Canada.⁴² She was listed in the 1871 Canadian census at York Township, York County, Ontario, Canada.⁴⁷ She married Ernest George PULFORD, son of George PULFORD and Sarah Eliza HARVEY.¹²² Her married name was Mary Emma PULFORD.³⁵⁰ As of 28 April 1875, she was also known as Minnie DENNIS.³⁵¹ She was listed as a member of the household of Sarah Maria DENNIS in the 1911 Canadian census at 295 Cooper Street, Ottawa, Gloucester Township, Ottawa-Carleton County, Ontario, Canada.¹²²

b) Joseph⁴ DENNIS was born circa 1850 at Canada West, Province of Canada.³⁵² He was Attending School on 13 January 1861.⁴² He was listed as a member of the household of Lieut.-Col. John Stoughton DENNIS in the 1861 Canadian census at Weston, York Township, York County, Canada West, Province of Canada.⁴² He was Episcopalian.⁴² He died before 1880.³⁴²

c) Christina Maria Sadler⁴ DENNIS was born circa 1852 at Weston, York Township, York County, Canada West, Province of Canada.³⁵³ She was Episcopalian / Church of England.³⁵⁴ She was Attending School on 13 January 1861.²¹³ She was listed as a member of the household of Lieut.-Col. John Stoughton DENNIS in the 1861 Canadian census at Weston, York Township, York County, Canada West, Province of Canada.⁴² She was listed in the 1871 Canadian census at York Township, York County, Ontario, Canada.⁴⁷ As of 7 June 1876, her married name was Christina Maria Sadler CHECKLEY.³⁵⁵ She married Francis Stewart CHECKLEY on 7 June 1876 at Ottawa, Gloucester Township, Ottawa-Carleton County, Ontario, Canada.³⁵⁶ She and Francis Stewart CHECKLEY appeared in the 1881 Canadian census at New Edinburgh, Gloucester Township, Ottawa-Carleton County, Ontario, Canada.⁴⁸

d) Maud Margaret⁴ DENNIS was born circa 1854 at Canada West, Province of Canada.³⁵⁷ She was listed as a member of the household of Lieut.-Col. John Stoughton DENNIS in the 1861 Canadian census at Weston, York Township, York County, Canada West, Province of Canada.⁴² She was Episcopalian / Church of England.²¹³ She was listed in the 1871 Canadian census at York Township, York County, Ontario, Canada.⁴⁷ She was Going to School on 2 April 1871.⁴⁷ She died before 1880.³⁴²

e) Col. John Stoughton⁴ DENNIS Jr was born on 22 October 1856 at Weston, York Township, York County, Canada West, Province of Canada.³⁵⁹

Colonel John Stoughton Dennis was born at Weston, near Toronto, Ontario, on October 22, 1856 and passed away November 26, 1938 at the age of 82.

His father was John Stoughton Dennis Sr., who became the first Surveyor General in the Department of the Interior. J.S. Dennis Jr. was educated at Trinity College School and Upper Canada College and also attended the old Military School at Kingston.

In 1872 at the age of 16 years, he started to go West for the summer on land survey parties under different surveyors.

In 1877, after a year of study under the late Bolton Magrath at Aylmer, Quebec, Dennis received a commission as a Dominion Land Surveyor and a certificate as a Dominion Topographical Surveyor.

In 1878, he was appointed to take charge of a survey party sent out to establish the Fourth Meridian in the North-West Territories.

In 1879, at the age of 23 years, Mr. Dennis joined the service of the Hudson Bay Company as, surveyor and engineer for the Land Department of the Hudson Bay Company and during his three years of service with that company he surveyed and laid out their properties into town lots at Winnipeg, Prince Albert, Edmonton and Rat Portage (now Kenora). He was also in charge of the construction of the company's buildings and water and sewage systems. In 1884, he was engaged in surveying and locating mines in the Bow Pass of the Rocky Mountains.

When the Riel Rebellion broke out in 1885, Mr. Dennis was given command of the Dominion Land Surveyors Intelligence Corps, which became know as Dennis' scouts, with the rank of Captain.

Following Riel's collapse, Dennis joined the staff of the Topographical Surveys Branch of the Department of the Interior and remained in that service until 1897, when he was appointed Chief Inspector of Surveys.

Like William Pearce, J.S. Dennis became an advocate for irrigation. He even asked for and received permission to investigate irrigation development in different states in the USA and submitted a draft of a proposed irrigation act to the Deputy Minister of the Interior. Dennis' duties as Inspector of Surveys took him to Alberta and, while there, he shared Mr. Pearce's office in Calgary. From here on Messrs. William Pearce and J.S. Dennis operated pretty much as a team.

The need for irrigation legislation to apply to the Territories was brought to the attention of the Minister of the Interior, the Honourable T. Wayne Daly, during a visit to Calgary early in 1892, by Mr. Pearce.

In 1893, William Pearce was sent to Ottawa where he and a Mr. Fraser or the Department of Justice drafted an irrigation act. The act, called the North West Irrigation Act, was made applicable to the Territories and assented to by Parliament on July 23, 1894. It was amended several times and the name was changed to the Irrigation Act but it served satisfactorily until the natural resources, including water, were transferred to the prairie provinces and each province enacted a Water Resources Act similar to the Irrigation Act.

1893 marks the last year of Mr. Dennis' work as a full-time land surveyor in the technical sense. Between 1869 and 1888, over 71 million acres of Dominion lands had been surveyed by the organization set up under the Surveyor General.

In 1894, William Pearce and J.S. Dennis were named delegates to the International Congress at Denver, Colorado, and in 1895, they were both sent to Alberquerque, New Mexico, in the same capacity, where Pearce delivered an address on "Canadian Laws and their Administration." In fact, both men gave papers at the 1894 congress.

While Dennis and Pearce were at the International Congress at Denver, Colorado, in 1894, they learned that the United States Reclamation Service had investigated and was planning to divert water from the St. Mary River in Montana by a canal from the Lower St. Mary Lake via Spider Valley and drop it into the North Branch of Milk River at a point close to the boundary between Canada and the United States. From here, the water would run down the North Branch Channel to Milk River in Canada and thence by the Milk River through Canada and then south and east to land east of the Town of Havre in Montana. This project would take water that had been allotted to the Canadian Northwest Irrigation Company by the Government of Canada to be diverted from the St. Mary River at Kimbal near Cardston. Reports from Dennis and Pearce drew attention to the threatened loss of potential irrigation water from the St. Mary River and great concern was expressed by government officials and irrigation interests. The St. Mary River had been recognized from the first as the key to the future economy of a large tract of land south and east of Lethbridge.

Representations were made to the United States Government through diplomatic channels in 1896 suggesting the setting up of an international commission for the regulation of the various streams in the area for irrigation purposes, but to no avail. In the absence of a governing principle of international law or treaty between the two countries, it appeared that the United States intended to proceed without ceremony.

Meanwhile, Dennis and others continued with vigor the two courses of action most likely to secure favourable results; rapid expansion of water usage from the St. Mary River and intensive search for a checkmate to the American move.

A combination of private enterprise and government surveying and engineering achieved good results in short-order. The Alberta Railway and Irrigation Company established firm water rights on the St. Mary and Milk rivers and one of the surveys organized by Dennis in 1901 located a possible diversion of the Milk River.

No time was lost in reopening the subject with the United States Government and in tactfully pointing out that Canada could intercept any water taken from the St. Mary to the Milk before it regained United States territory. It appears that this hint was not at first accepted south of the border, and no official results were immediately forthcoming.

Dennis, however, strongly promoted the Milk River canal and by 1904, fourteen miles of it had been constructed by the A.R. & I. company.

It may be inferred that the canal was intended to serve in the first place as an instrument to bring the United States to the conference table and secondly, to actually recover at least 300 second-feet of the water taken from the St. Mary River if the American canal was constructed without an international agreement. At the 1915 hearing before the International Joint Commission at St. Paul, Dennis, by this time Assistant to the President of the CPR, asserted that the canal could still be put in service if required.

As events transpired, the canal was never used in a physical sense and in 1907. Elihu Root as Secretary of State submitted to Canada a draft of a treaty which after two years of negotiation developed into the Boundary Water Treaty of January 11, 1909.

The North West Irrigation Act provided for the appointment of the necessary staff to carry out investigation and surveys and to administer the provisions of the Act. Mr. Dennis was an able and active man and was highly regarded by the authorities in Ottawa. It was quite natural, therefore, that he was chosen to head up the new organization under the Act which was administered under the Minister of the Interior. In 1894, Col. Dennis' duties were described as "Inspector of Surveys" and in charge of the Canadian Irrigation Surveys. Under his advice and administration, the Government of Canada started surveys to determine the amount of water available for irrigation and the larger areas on which this water supply could be utilized. In making these investigations and surveys, the canal system heading in the St. Mary River, which was subsequently constructed by the Canadian Northwest Irrigation Company, and the Bow River canal system to serve the country on the north side of the Bow River east of Calgary, were located.

At this time, the Canadian Pacific Railway Company still had considerable acreage of land due to it as subsidies for the construction of railways. In 1903, as the result of recommendations made by Messrs. J.S. Dennis and William Pearce, it was agreed that the Government of Canada would turn over en-block to the railway company a tract of about 3,000,000 acres of land lying between the Bow and Red Deer rivers, together with the surveys and plans showing how it was feasible to irrigate a large portion of it.

In 1902, J.S. Dennis left the employ of the Government of Canada and joined the staff of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. Mr. Pearce left the government service in 1904 and, on May 1 of that year, joined the staff of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company at Calgary.

Mr. Dennis became chief engineer of construction of CPR irrigation projects. Later, he was appointed manager of the Irrigation and Land Branch and, in 1912, when the Department of Natural Resources was formed, he was appointed assistant to the president and head of the new department which office he held until he was made Chief Commissioner of Colonization and Development. On January 1, 1930, Col. Dennis retired from this position but remained a member of the advisory committee which deals with matters affecting the departments of Natural Resources and Immigration.

During World War One, he was appointed representative on the British Canadian Recruiting Mission in the United States, with the rank of lieutenant-colonel and was later promoted to the rank of colonel and proceeded to Siberia as director of transportation and intelligence on the general staff of the Canadian Brigade. During 1918, he acted as Canadian Red Cross Commissioner in Russia and a Canadian Trade Commissioner in the same territory.

Colonel Dennis received medals and decorations for his services during and after the War. He was awarded the Julien Smith medal for outstanding service for his country.

After retirement in 1930, Colonel Dennis moved to Victoria, BC, where he lived until his death on November 26, 1938.

In December 1879, Mr. Dennis had married Miss Mary Conroy, daughter of James Conroy of Aylmer, Quebec. They had one child, Mary Aileen.



The next or center portion I give and devise to my said daughter Sarah Jane her heirs and assigns forever, and the other in north western portion thereof I give and devise to my said daughter Margaret Isabella ROAF her heirs and assigns forever - My Village Lot number two in the Village of Weston I give to my said daughter Sarah Jane, her heirs and assigns forever, and my remaining Lot number three I give and devise to my said daughter Margaret Isabella ROAF her heirs and assigns forever. These lots, two and three I hold by deed of Bargain and sale from John Stoughton DENNIS dated the ninth day of December one thousand eight hundred and sixty two. To my said son James Henry I bequeath my two shares in the British American Insurance Company; also I give to him my shares in the Amber Oil Company with any other interest or shares I possess in any oil well or oil property whatever. I likewise give unto him my said Son, my mare, buggy and harness and Sleigh Robes and also my watch. To my said daughter Sarah Jane I give the Piano which she has in her possession, together with what other articles I purchased at the same of Robert H. BRETT's furniture. The Piano now in the parlour of my dwelling house I give to my daughter in law Mary M. RICHARDSON and my silver teaspoons I give to my grandson Robert D. RICHARDSON. All other manufactured articles of Silver or Silver plated furniture which I own I divide between my two daughters Sarah Jane and Margaret Isabella as equally as may be in the judgement of my Executors hereinafter named. My eight day clock in my parlour I give to my oldest surviving Granddaughter as a keep sake. My gold spectacles I give to my daughter Sarah Jane also to her I give the side Board now in my parlour. The Portraits of myself and my late wife in large Gilt frames now in my parlour I give to my son James Henry. I give the larger of my gold cased pens and pencils, I give to my Grand Son William ROAF and the other to my Grandson James Richardson ROAF as Keepsakes. My large quarto Bible I give to my dear[?] Grandson William Augustus RICHARDSON. My large quarto dictionary I give to my Grandson Charles RICHARDSON. My Encyclopedia Americana I give to my Grand Son Robert D. RICHARDSON. My Hebrew Bible, Lexicon and grammars I give to my Grand Son Robert D. RICHARDSON. My Bible Dictionary in three volumes to my daughter Sarah Jane.

The Residue of my Estate real and personal; to be divided, as equally as may be, among my surviving children in the judgement of my Executors hereinafter named, either by sale and dividing the proceeds thereof, or by dividing the articles; as may be deemed by them most expeditiously

To my faithful servant Maria HOWARD, provided she should be in my service at the time of my decease, I bequeath an annuity of sixty dollars per annum during the term of her natural life, to be paid her in quarterly payments; and I hereby direct and charge each of my surviving children to contribute an equal share to make up the said payment to her as above provided, so that she may receive the said sum quarterly.

Lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint my trusty and beloved friends Henry DENNIS and Clark BRIDGELAND, Esquire, both of the township of York and my beloved Son James Henry RICHARDSON Surgeon of the City of Toronto my Executors of this my Last Will and Testament hereby revoking all former Wills

In Witness whereof I have to this and the five preceding leaves of paper signed my name, and also to this affixed my seal at the city of Toronto this twenty third day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy four. (signed and sealed) Jas. RICHARDSON

She was named in the codicil to the will of Rev. Bishop James RICHARDSON on 26 January 1875:

This is a Codicil to the Last Will and Testament of Me James RICHARDSON of the City of Toronto in the County of York and Province of Ontario, Minister of the Gospel, which bears date the twenty third day of May in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy four

Whereas there is a piece of Land belonging to me which is not to my knowlede [sic] mentioned in my said Will; being a part of Lot number four south side of Adelaide Street in said city of Toronto, Measuring four feet along Bay Street be the same more or less and extending easterly from Bay Street on a line at a right angle thereto one Hundred feet with the Gate way adjoining thereto and which is Situate between the portion of said Lot which was owned by my late Wife Rebecca DENNIS deceased, namely one hundred and four feet southerly from the north west angle of said Lot and another portion of said Lot which I conveyed by deed of Bargain and Sale to my daughter Sarah Jane wife of Robert BRETT which is now occupied by the "Robinson House"

Now therefore I hereby will and bequeath the above described piece of Land with the Gate way adjoining and attached thereto with all and singular the appurtenances thereof together with any or every piece or portion of said Lot which I now own and which I may inadvertently not have devised by my said Will to my son James Henry RICHARDSON of said city of Toronto, Surgeon, the same to hold to him his heirs and assigns forever.

3. Dr. James Henry³ RICHARDSON MD, MRCS England was born on 16 October 1823 at Presqu'ile, Brighton Township, Northumberland County, Upper Canada, British North America.⁴⁴⁵

The medical profession in Upper Canada, 1783-1850: an historical narrative with original documents relating to the profession, including some brief biographies:

Dr JAMÉS HENRY RICHARDSON Was born at Presqu'Isle, October 16, 1823. His grandfather had served in the British navy and came to Canada, 1785, when he received an appointment in the marine service. Dr Richardson's father, James Richardson, for a long time bishop of the Episcopal Methodist Church, was born at Kingston. He married the second daughter of John Dennis, a well-known U. E. Loyalist, who came to Little York about the beginning of the century. His residence was on the north-east corner of King and Yonge Streets. He left large and valuable property in land, which is now the in heart of the city. James Richardson, afterwards bishop, served during the war of 1812 under Sir James Yeo, and in May, 1814, lost an arm at the shoulder, at the capture of Oswego by the British. He died at the advanced age of eighty-four, at Toronto, full of honours, and much beloved by all who had the privilege of knowing him. James H. Richardson began his medical studies in 1841, with Dr Rolph, then living in Rochester, N.Y., and remained with him two years. He then attended as a matriculated student the first course of lectures delivered by the medical faculty of King's College. In 1844, he proceeded to England and studied at Guy's

Hospital for three years, spending the summer of 1846 at the hospitals and in attendance on lectures in Paris. He obtained his diploma at the Royal College of Surgeons, England, 1847, being the first Canadian, we believe, to receive that honour. He then returned to Toronto and commenced practice. In 1848 he took the degree of M.B. at King's College. In 1850, he was appointed to succeed Dr. Sullivan as Professor of Anatomy, in the newly constituted Medical Department of Toronto University, having discharged the duties during the previous year, in consequence of the illness of Prof. Sullivan. That same year he received the degree of M.B. He held the Chair of Anatomy in the University until the Medical Department was abolished, 1853. Some years later he accepted the Chair of Anatomy in the Toronto School of Medicine, and at the organization of the medical faculty of Toronto University, he was again appointed Professor of Anatomy, which position he still holds (1893). Dr. Richards has taken great interest in the volunteer force, and was successively surgeon of the Field Artillery, the Merchants' Company and in the 10th Royal Regiment. After twenty years of continuous service, he some years ago retired, retaining the rank of Surgeon-Major. During the time of his service, he was an enthusiastic and successful rifle shot, receiving, in 1861, the first prize ever competed for in Toronto at long range. The prize was presented to him by Gen. Williams, afterwards the hero of Kars. He has all his life been a lover of out-door recreation and amusement, as yachting, curling, bowling and fishing, and to this he attributes the good health which he continues to enjoy. In the last named sport he has passed his summer vacations from place to place at almost every noted fishing camp in the Dominion, from Cape Breton to the rivers and shores of Lake Superior. Dr. Richardson, as an operator, has had unusually well-appointed surgical appliances in his practice; but that he would have achieved success under less favourable circumstances is attested by an incident which occurred in 1859, when he was on one of his fishing expeditions up the Ottawa. On such occasions he never carried any surgical appliances, and it happened that a French-Canadian, whom he came across, was in the most urgent need of relief by the use of a catheter. While the doctor was troubled and anxious to give relief, his eye rested upon a goose's wing, used for dusting, and a happy thought came to him, upon which he promptly acted. He took the quills of the wing, cut them in convenient sections, and uniting them together, end to end, fixed the joints with shoemaker's wax. In this way he fashioned a catheter, and by it the suffering of the now fortunate Frenchman was removed, whose life was thereby doubtless saved and whose gratitude was unbounded. The writer has lately seen this novel instrument, which is preserved by the Doctor as a memento, and which looks as if it might do similar service again. Dr Richardson stands in the foremost rank in his profession, especially as a sound surgeon and brilliant operator. He has for many years been on the staff of the Toronto General Hospital, also surgeon to the Toronto Gaol. He is an ex-President of the Ontario Medical Association, and has filled other important positions. He is one whom his medical confreres delight to honour, and one in whom a large circle implicitly trust as a physician. Dr Richardson married a Scotch lady, Miss Mary Skirving, who is now known as an active philanthropist. They have four sons and three daughters living (1893). One son, W. A. Richardson, entered the medical profession, and at the present time has charge of the Royal Jubilee Hospital at Victoria, B.C. The youngest son, G. H. Richardson, is a civil engineer. The other two are in business in Winnipeg.⁴⁴³ He was Indiv Note DR. RICHARDSON, Professor of Anatomy at the Toronto School of Medicine. His grandfather served in the British Navy under Lord Rodney, and came to Canada in 1785, when he received an appointment in the Canadian Marine. Dr. Richardson's father was James Richardson, who was born January 29, 1791. He married Rebecca, second daughter of John Dennis, a U.E. Loyalist who came to Canada from Philadelphia, where the family owned considerable property. The subject of this sketch began his studies in 1841, in Rochester, N.Y., with Dr. Rolph, remaining there two years. In 1844 he went to England, where he studied for three years in Guy's Hospital, London, and about a year in Bristol. He then returned to Canada and took his diploma. He afterwards was appointed Professor of Practical Anatomy at Kingston College, which position he maintained until the abolition of the Medical Faculty in 1853. He then practised his profession until his acceptance of his present position in the Toronto School of Medicine.444

Thomas EWART was married to the philanthropist Catharine Seaton SKIRVING, daughter of John SKIRVING and Margaret WARDLAW. John SKIRVING had been the Factor to the Earl of Moray and his family lived at Darnaway Castle in Forres, Morayshire, before emigrating from Scotland to Upper Canada in 1833, where John died in November of that year. His wife and daughters established a finishing school for young ladies in Toronto. One of his daughter, Ann Grace Stuart SKIRVING, married Henry DENNIS, son of Joseph DENNIS and Mary STOUGHTON. FUNERAL OF THE LATE BISHOP RICHARDSON.

Yesterday afternoon the funeral of the late Rev. James Richardson, D.D., Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, took place from his late residence at Clover Hill, the remains of the deceased being interred in the vault at the Necropolis.

The friends and mourners met at the late residence of deceased shortly before 3 o'clock, at which hour an impressive service was held by Bishop Carman, M. E. Church, assisted by Rev. G. Abbs and Rev. M. Benson.

The coffin, which was of polished walnut with heavy silver mountings, bore the following inscription: - "James Richardson, born January 29th, 1791, died March 9th, 1875."

The funeral procession, which was a very lengthened one, started from the house of mourning about half-past three o'clock in the following order: - First came the members of the York Pioneers Society, of which deceased was President, followed by Col. R. L. Denison, Col. R. E. Denison, Rev. Dr. S[?]edding, Archdeacon Fuller, Messrs. Philip Armstrong, A. Hamilton, Dr. Geo. Crawford, E. Edmunds, John Bell, Q.C., Rev. J. Carroll, J. McMullen, R. James, R. Lacre, J. T. Smith, James Gedd, J. Stitt, R. H. Oates, W. B. Phipps, J. Bostwick, D. Sampson, A. Heron, J. Bugg, J. White, D. O. Brooke, Dr. H. Wright, Dr. R. Hornby, A. T. McCord, S. Rogers, R. L. Smith, G. H. Holland, W. J. Coate, T. Burgess, W. Barnhard, J. Farrell, T. Meredith, S. Dodds, F. Milligen, Rev. S. Givens, S. Bowman, J. Jacques, J. W. Drummond, J. Paul, Dr. Jas. Next came the hearse followed by the ministers of the M.E. Church - Rev. F. M. Finn, of Percy; Rev. T. Agnew, of Brampton; Rev. J. Lynch, Rockwood; Rev. R. E. Lund, Cobourg; Rev. E. J. Pelley, Dundas; Rev. J. Sampson, Brighton; Rev. J. Miller, Colborne; Rev. W. H. Shaw, Ancaster; Rev. J. Carts, Weston; Rev. J. S. Williamson, Hamilton; Rev. E. Londesberry, Strathroy; Rev. M. Benson, Strathroy; Rev. Dr. Wyld, Brooklyn, New York; Rev. D. Webster, Newberry; Rev. J. MacLean, Hamilton; Rev. E. Benick, Pallme; Rev. J. Gilray, Toronto; Rev. W. J. Brown, London; Rev. S. J. Stone, Hamilton; Rev. R. Large, Whitterdale, Rev. A. Beamer, Ingersoll. The chief mourners were Dr. Jas. H. Richardson, deceased's son; Dr. Robert D. Richardson, deceased's grandson; Master W. Roaf, and Master J. Roaf, deceased's grandchildren; Mr. Henry Denis, of Weston. Next came the representatives of the Upper Canada Bible and Tract Societies, Messrs. J. K. McDonald, J. A. R. Dickson, Robt. Baldwin, Dr. J. J. Hodgins, and the representatives of the Toronto Temperance Reformation Society, which deceased was originator and for several years its President. Many friends also followed in the procession, among others Rev. J. Potts, Rev. W. H. Poole, Canon Baldwin, Rev. S. Rose, Rev. S. N. Jackson, Rev. F. H. Marling, etc. The procession preceded by way of Yonge-street, Carleton-street, and Winchester-street, to the Necropolis, where the burial service was performed by Bishop Carman, after which the coffin was placed in the receiving vault.

The funeral sermon will be preached in the Metropolitan Church, on Sunday, March 21st inst., and on Easter Sunday there will be funeral services preached in the several M.E. Churches in Canada.

THE LATE DR. RICHARDSON.

Separated by a very brief interval were the deaths of Dr. Ogden and Dr. Richardson, who had been for many years colleagues in the teaching of medicine in the former Toronto Medical School and the more recent Medical Faculty of the University of Toronto, in which the school had become merged. They both lived to extreme old age, enjoying to the last the undiminished esteem of a host of medical practitioners who had been their students, but are now widely scattered over Canada and the United States.

Nearly all of Dr. Richardson's long life was spent in this city, to which he came at the age of three in 1826. His father was Bishop Richardson of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Canada, one of the early Methodist preachers on circuit, a noble specimen of physical manhood, and a consummate preacher. Dr. Richardson, though shorter of stature, closely resembled him in personal appearance, and the resemblance, as is not unusual, become more pronounced with advancing years. The military ardor which prompted Bishop Richardson in early manhood to serve in the naval force under Sir James Yeo in the war of 1812-15 was throughout his life an outstanding characteristic of his son. It was one of the ways in which is abounding physical energy and restless temperament found useful, if not adequate, expression.

Implicated in the political troubles that culminated in the Rebellion of 1837-38, Dr. Rolph, who had been first a practising lawyer and afterwards a practising physician in Toronto, found it convenient, if not necessary, to remain outside of Canada. Living as near his own country as was practicable, he taught medicine in Rochester, and there young Richardson joined him as a student in 1841. He completed his medical training in London, England, and in 1847 he took up practice in Toronto. In 1849 the secularization of King's College involved the discontinuance of the faculty of divinity, but the faculty of medicine was retained till 1853 in the University of Toronto, as the institution was then called. During the three intervening years Dr. Richardson filled the chair of anatomy, and this position he held continuously till 1902 in the Toronto School of Medicine and in the University of Toronto after the re-establishment of its medical faculty, from which he retired with emeritus standing.

Dr. Richardson was exceptionally well known to his fellow-citizens. He filled for exactly half a century the position of surgeon to the Toronto jail; he was from its foundation in 1854 a member of the medical staff and the Board of Management of the Toronto General Hospital; he attended actively to a large medical practice, and he was very fond of such athletic amusements as suited his years. No man could be a more charming companion or a better conversationalist. Somewhat choleric in temper, but generous to a fault, he gathered around him without effort a wide circle of intimate friends, the great majority of whom have already gone over to the majority.

DEATH OF NOTED CANADIAN PHYSICIAN

Dr. Richardson, Well Known in College Circles, Passes Away.

In the early hours of Sunday morning the death occurred of Dr. James H. Richardson, M.D., M.R.C.S., emeritus professor of anatomy in the University of Toronto, at his home, Clover Hill, Toronto, after a brief illness, in his eighty-sixth year. The great respect in which Dr. Richardson was held is demonstrated by the following extract from the Toronto Globe of 1898:

"No other man has been so long and so closely associated with the University of Toronto as Dr. Richardson, whose recent resignation of the chair of anatomy brings to a close a professional career of nearly half a century. His father, the late Bishop Richardson, is still remembered by many Torontonians as a notable figure whose noble grey head and upright carriage and clerical coat with an empty sleeve made an impression not easily forgotten. He was the son of a naval officer who had settled in Kingston in 1793. **College Career.**

Dr. Richardson was the first matriculant in medicine in King's college, Toronto, which he entered in 1841. He was also the first graduate in medicine, having taken his degree as M.D., in 1843. He also studied in Rochester, London and Paris, laying the foundation of that thorough and intimate knowledge of anatomy for which he became famous. In 1849 on account of the illness of Professor Sullivan, he delivered a course of lectures on anatomy. In that year an act was passed changing King's college into the University of Toronto, and Dr. Richardson sat on the commission of visitation which was appointed by Mr. Baldwin's government to organize and regulate the new body. The other members of the commission were Chancellor Blake, Hon J. H. Cameron, Mr. Justice Wilson and David Buchan. In 1850 he was appointed professor of anatomy in the University of Toronto and curator of the museum, both of which position he lost in 1853 by the abolition of the

faculties of law and medicine. This was a great disappointment to Dr. Richardson, who had intended to devote his life to academic work, but he abandoned the idea and took up a private practice. As professor of anatomy on the Toronto school of medicine, he taught for over thirty years with great success and when the medical faculty was reorganized in 1887 he was appointed to his old chair as professor of anatomy. **Believed in Outdoor Recreation.**

For a long time Dr. Richardson was surgeon to the Toronto jail. He was successively surgeon to the Field artillery, the Merchants company (afterwards merged into the Q.O.R.), and the 10th Royals. For many years he was an enthusiastic rifle shot, and received in 1861 the first prize ever competed for at long range in Toronto. He was also in his younger days very fond of yachting. He stayed in the world of sport even after his youthful vigor waned, being to the end a skilled fisherman, a keen curler and a good bowler. He long ago captured the affections of the Granite club of Toronto, the members of which presented him with a handsome pair of gold-mounted bowls on his golden wedding day. Dr. Richardson always believed that the good health he has always enjoyed was chiefly due to the time he spent in outdoor recreations, and he believed that every physician should take a holiday once a year.

The golden wedding function before mentioned took place on August 20, 1900, when Dr. Richardson and his wife, formerly Miss Mary Skirvine [sic], surrounded by their children and others, after a family dinner party, received their friends from 4 to 10 p.m. in an informal way. **Revered by Old Students**.

On April 15, 1903, he was tendered a banquet by his old students in Toronto, to which medical men from all parts of the continent, as well as the old country, came to greet their old professor. This was given him on the occasion of his retirement from the professorship of anatomy of the medical faculty of the University of Toronto. In order to pay a lasting tribute to Dr. Richardson, the students asked and obtained permission to present to the university a portrait of him.

The doctor was predeceased by his wife, who died March, 1907, and leaving surviving four sons and three daughters – Robert D. and Charles S. Richardson, both of Winnipeg; Dr. W. A. Richardson, of Edmonton; George H. Richardson, C.E., of Toronto; Mrs. William Freeland, of Toronto; Mrs. W. R. D. Sutherland, widow of the late Dr. Sutherland, and Mrs. R. Ross Sutherland, of Winnipeg. **Proposed National Emblem**

The late Dr. Richardson has all his life been a loyal British subject, and he it was who first proposed for Canada her national emblem, the maple leaf. The occasion was the visit of the then Prince of Wales to Canada in 1860, when at a meeting of native Canadians held in the St. Lawrence hall to organize the royal procession he proposed the following resolution:

"That all native Canadians joining the procession, whether identified with national societies or not, should wear the maple leaf as an emblem of the land of their birth."

The resolution was adopted, and to this day the maple leaf stands for Canada and her sons, and it is meet that when we remember this we should also remember the man who first established it, Dr. James H. Richardson.⁴⁵⁷

He was a founding member, in 1879, of the Manitoba Historical Society. He was the first secretary of the YMCA in 1879, which he jointly organized with J. A. M. Aikins. He also helped to organize Scripture Union, an international Christian ministry organization, in Winnipeg. Returning to Toronto in 1914, he devoted most of his time to the Union and he eventually became honorary general secretary of its Canadian Division.

Pioneer Businessman, C.S. Richardson Dies

Prominent in business and sporting circles for more than half a century, Charles Skirving Richardson, died early Sunday in General hospital at the age of 82. Mr. Richardson resided at 144 Roslyn road.

He was born in Toronto, the son of the late Dr. James H. Richardson, and received his education at Upper Canada college. In 1881 he came to Winnipeg to join his brother, Robert D. Richardson, who died Jan. 12, of this year. Mr. Richardson was associated with the printing and stationery business for 63 years until his retirement in 1944.

During his residence in Winnipeg, Mr. Richardson took an active part in the early life of this city and was keenly interested in sports and social life. He was one of the founders and a charter member of the Winnipeg Tennis club. He was also a charter member of the old St. George's Snowshoe club and the Assiniboine Curling club. Other organizations of which he was a member were the Manitoba club and the St. Charles Country club. He was also the last survivor of the original 13th (Winnipeg) Field Battery.

His wife, Annie Harder Richardson, died in 1922, and a son, Alan (Kelly) was killed during the first world war.

Mr. Richardson is survived by one son, Bruce H., of Winnipeg; one brother, Dr. W.A. Richardson, of Victoria, B.C.; also two grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

The funeral service will be held Wednesday, at 2.15 p.m. in Gardiner's funeral chapel, with burial in Elmwood cemetery. Rev. T.D. Finlay will conduct the service.

Convalescent Haven for Children at Ponemah, the Gift of Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland.

The Lorna Convalescent home at Ponemah Beach, the beautiful gift of Mr. and Mrs. R. Ross Sutherland to the Childrens hospital was formally declared open Wednesday afternoon by C.H. Enderton, chairman of the advisory board of the hospital. Over 50 people from the city and the neighbouring beaches were present.

Mrs. Geoffrey Walker, president of the hospital board, was the first to speak. The following telegram from Mrs. R. Ross Sutherland from Victoria was read: "I wish I could be with you at the opening of the hospital, and send my love and heartiest wishes for a beautiful day. May God bless you in your work for the little ones and grant that we may live to see a fine big home at Nepawin."

Mrs. Walker went on to say that Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland had always been staunch friends of the hospital and expressed her deepest gratitude and appreciation for their magnificent gift. Mrs. Walker stated that the home was furnished by the Alexandria Guild of Winnipeg, of which Mrs. C. P. Sheppard is president and that no contagious or infectious diseases would be brought down to the home so the campers need have no fear of any danger to their families.

Mrs. Walker commended the home to the residents of the summer resorts and then introduced Mr. C. H. Enderton, chairman of the advisory board, who spoke briefly before declaring the home open.

On behalf of the board and advisory board Mr. Enderton extended his heartfelt thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland for their gift which has long been a keenly felt want in connection with the hospital, and said that as it was the charge and care of the ladies of the city he felt sure it would be run under as devoted, unselfish and wise a management as had always prevailed in the Childrens hospital of Winnipeg. They all had great expectations as to the benefit children would derive. Again, thanking Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland, Mr. Enderton declared the Lorna Convalescent home open.

R. Ross Sutherland in reply said he was very much impressed by the kind words of thanks and said that he had felt sure they would appreciate any help in the furthering of the work that had so long been carried on in Winnipeg and that he thanked God that he was able to give to the poor, sick little children this haven of rest. Mr. Sutherland spoke of his little daughter Lorna in whose memory the home was dedicated and in closing said: "As an inspiration to those taking part in this work in the helping of little children regain their lost strength I would ask permission of the advisory board to erect a tabled over the portals of the door bearing these words: 'In loving memory of Oure Deare Childe' (to be written in old English letters and spelling), for Lorna loved all sick little children and the children all loved Lorna." After the opening of the home refreshments were served by the ladies.

The Lorna Convalescent home is equipped for the accommodation of 12 children and the nurses. The children arrived on Monday night and already show a decided improvement with their sunburnt little faces and eager talk. They sleep outdoors as much as possible and all their meals when weather will permit are had on the sands. Miss Ramsay, the superintendent, and Miss Bradley, the head nurse, are in charge of the children.⁴⁴⁷

Manitoba Free Press, Winnipeg, Friday, August 29, 1913 p. 22 WILD OUTRAGES BY COAL MINE STRIKERS J. Roaf Tells of State of Anarchy he Saw on Vancouver Island.

Wild doings by the strikers in Vancouver Island, as told by J. R. Roaf, of Toronto, make a narrative of anarchy and civil strife probably unequalled in any former industrial disturbances in Canada. Mine officials forced to take to the woods, where they must lie in hiding for days; women and children of the so-called strike-breakers placed in situations of terrible hardship; assaults and incendiarism, have been common events during the last few troubled weeks, he says.

Mr. Roaf, who is treasurer of the Canadian benevolent Protective order of Elks, went to visit a son who superintends the South Wellington mine of the Pacific Coast Coal company. While paying this visit he witnessed many of the acts committed by the strikers.

"On August 12," he said, "we went up to the mine at Extension. There the strikers had wrecked the superintendent's house, cut his piano to bits, fired his outhouses, and driven him into the woods. In fear he had fled at their approach. For three days he wandered round in the swamps and forests, picking up such scanty subsistence as he could find. His wife did not know what had happened, and returned to her home a day after he had been driven away. When she saw what had happened, she set off for Ladysmith, but received early word that she was not wanted there. Weak-kneed, the Ladysmith authorities refused to offer her protection.

Hounded Women and Children.

"The strikers burned the house of another mine official, took out his automobile and started it down hill. It was wrecked at the bottom. They hounded the women and children of the strike-breakers into the woods, and I saw one poor woman, with a tiny child, who had spent a bitter night in the open. In my son's house, one day, four men, a woman and some children had injuries more or less serious, inflicted by the strikers bound up.

"Mr. Cunningham, the Extension superintendent, who was driven into the bush, escaped their clutches after three days. My son, for some reason, was not attacked. I have in my baggage now one of the clubs used by a striker. It is not a clumsy weapon, but is carefully made and polished, being about 2 ½ inches thick at the big end. Doubtless it has cracked more than one head. Most of the strikers were armed with similar clubs, and on Thursday six over-bold strike-breakers had their heads broken at South Wellington."

In Mr. Roaf's opinion, the strike is engineered by the Washington coal operators, who are charged with casting envious eyes on the Vancouver Island mines. "There seems to be little cause of real grievance," he said. "Strong evidence, moreover, has been adduced to show that the disturbance has been deliberately engineered in Seattle."

My said Wife having predeceased me I now in pursuance of all powers of any kind or nature vested in me do hereby appoint and direct that my son James Richardson ROAF be and he is hereby named as beneficiary in respect of all the said insurances on my life in the room and place of my wife Harriet E. ROAF, deceased.

My said son may divided such personal articles, trinkets and jewellery as I may have, amongst my children and grandchildren as he shall think best as mementoes of me, but at his absolute discretion, he being the sole owner thereof.
