To His Excellency Francis Gore Esquire, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Upper Canada, etc., etc., in Council.

The Petition of John Fetterly of the Township of Osnabruck,

Humbly Sheweth,

That your Petitioner was a Resident in the County of Albany in the State of New York when the unhappy war tooke place which severed the United States from the Crown of Grate Britain, and for his attachment to the British Government and protecting and feeding the British Scouts that came into that part of Country from Canada, he was sent to Albany Gaol by the Rebels where he suffered a tedious Imprisonment in Irons and the loss of a grate part of his property.

Wherefore your Petitioner prays that Your Excellency in Council will be pleased to have his name inserted on the U.E. List.

Cornwall in the Province of Upper Canada this 27th day of January 1807.

I do certify that Francis Otto of the Township of Osnabruck in Upper Canada, and maketh oath and sayeth, the he well knew the above Petitioner John Fetterly and that the facts as Stated in the above Petition is true, and that the Said John Fetterly came into the Province of Upper Canada in the Year of Our Lord one thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety Five and settled in the Township of Osnabruck in which place he has lived ever since.
