Michael Greguol 2011 UELAC Loyalist Scholarship Award Recipient

In 2011, a UELAC Loyalist Scholarship was awarded to Michael Greguol. As a graduate of Brock University, St. Catherines, Ontario, Michael received a Master of Arts, History (2011) for his Major Research Paper - "Class, Country, and Comfort: Place and Space in Early Niagara and Upper Canada."

As part of his graduate studies in the Department of History, Michael provided teaching assistance for four separate modules including Early Modern African history, the American Revolution, Latin American history, and Empires and Technology, all part of an experimental course titled "Empire and Revolutions".
