In the second phase, of Data Input, we received additional assistance and access to equipment through David Enns, Director of the Reference Services Division. Funding for the project came in the form of a Bicentennial Grant in 1984 from the Secretary of State, student Summer Employment contributions from the Ministry of Employment and Immigration in 1984 and 1985, a Canadian Studies:

Research Tools Grant from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council and additional assistance from a Canada Employment Job Creation Programme.

Compilation of the index to the British Headquarters Papers was carried on periodically over four years by successive teams of researchers. Jaye Jarvis led the first two teams consisting of Mary Jane Armstrong, Donna Bekkers and Lorraine O'Donnell; followed by Cameron Campbell, Jeffrey Langille and Kevin Solomon. Ivan Mitchell managed the next group which included: Jade Belyea, James Phillips and Michael Way. The last two specialized on the Book of Negroes, and David W. States of Halifax, Nova Scotia, generously contributed an introduction for this document. Mr. Way and Mrs. Belyea began the data input. Branch volunteers who assisted by carding in 1984 were: Ina McGregor, Gwen Norminton, and David Webster. Branch members Lt. Col. Frank Cooper, Norman Crowder, Capt. Ivan Mitchell, the late Dr. Velma Rust, and Lt. Col. William Smy served on the Project Committee at various times; the late Thomas Chadsey and the late Ruth Williams assisted, and the late William Cornell gave invaluable financial advice.

During the interim period when no funding was available the input was carried on by part-time Branch volunteers co-ordinated by Dr. Edward Kipp. They were: George Anderson, Margaret Kipp, Edward Kipp and Russell Peters. In the final stage a Canada Employment Job Creation programme allowed us to employ and to train young people for input of historical research data thus completing the work. These young people were trained by Dr. Kipp in the database structure and the inputting of the data into dBase. These researchers were: Robert Blaine, Brian Carty, James Halls, Kristine Classen, Gary Rourke, and Karen Woods. Some final proofing of data was completed by the volunteers already mentioned. Further assistance in harmonizing the computer programmes was provided by Steven Vandereems and Margaret Kipp.

The final version of this program was produced by Edward Kipp including the installation instructions and the preparation of the first fifty copies of the program on diskettes. CD-ROM copies were prepared and produced by Edward Kipp. George Anderson, Edward Kipp, and Elizabeth Kipp served on the publication committee.
