

VANCOUVER BRANCH - Charter – 18 May 1937

1932 August

On March 30, 1932, a meeting was held for which notices had been sent to all known Members of the United Empire Loyalists' Association in this City. At this small informal gathering it was decided to organize a branch of the Association in Vancouver. It was thought that the best way to communicate with the families of U.E.L. descent was to insert an advertisement in a local newspaper.

A second meeting was held on April 18th. It was gratifying to observe a marked increase in the attendance of Chartered and Proposed Members. The result of the advertisement was reported. It was found that there had been more than thirty-five replies. These had all been duly answered and applications together with a letter of explanation were enclosed. A discussion followed as to whether we should organize, firstly, through becoming members of the Toronto Branch, and, then being subsequently transferred to Vancouver as a new branch. The alternative to this procedure was to obtain the necessary minimum membership of fifteen Chartered Members. These Members would then issue a Petition to the Central Council of the Association. This latter method was most emphatically decided upon.

At the meeting held on May 2, it was decided to postpone our previous intentions of forwarding a Petition to the Central Council. It was found that many desiring to become Chartered Members were unable to supply their necessary genealogies in a complete state at the present time. It was proposed that a meeting be held early in June to which several speakers would be asked to give short addresses pertaining to the United Empire Loyalist migration and settlement.

A most successful social evening was held on June 15, at the home of Mrs. (Prof.) R. H. Clark. Two addresses were delivered during the evening. The speakers were Dr. W. N. Sage and Judge Forin. Dr. Sage spoke on the Original U. E. Loyalists of New Brunswick, while Judge Forin chose for his subject, the Hay Bay Settlement. Refreshments were served at the close of the meeting.

1933 November

On October 6th, 1932. the Vancouver Branch was formally organized, the meeting being held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Kirk. It was very well attended and after the election of officers, Colonel W. S. Buell, U.E., gave a most interesting address on the founding of the City of Brockville and its historical association with his family. This paper commenced the initial collection for official records of this kind by the Branch.

In November the meeting was held at the home of His Honour Judge and Mrs. T. A. Forin, when the address of the evening was presented by Professor M.Y. Williams, his subject being "Original Settlers of Prince Edward County, Ontario."

The January meeting was held at the home of the President, Professor and Mrs. W. N. Sage. Dr. Dudley J. Bell gave a descriptive paper on the "Early Settlers of New Brunswick."

Professor Sage addressed the February meeting, which was held at the home of Rev. Professor and Mrs. H. R. Trumpour. The President spoke on the "American Revolution."

In March the monthly meeting was held at the home of Colonel and Mrs. W. S. Buell when a paper was read by Miss B. P. Choate on "The Pre-Revolutionary Influences in the New England Colonies."

A dinner in commemoration of the 150th Anniversary of the first landing of the Loyalists at St. John, was held on May 18th. in the Spanish Grill of the Hotel Vancouver. Seventy-one Loyalists and their friends participated and the whole affair was a great success, particularly as it was the first attempt of the new Branch to hold anything of this sort. It was most opportune that this occasion should have marked the twilight celebration of the Pacific Province, begun so early in the morning by the wonderful commemoration in the Province of New Brunswick.

The interest which has developed during the year is a wonderful stimulant to any 'effort on the part of the Executive to strengthen the organization. Letters have been received from practically every part of the Province enquiring as to the organization and what would constitute membership. Our list of membership now stands at thirty-five, with an additional list of nearly sixty whose applications will be passed.

Meetings for the ensuing year have already commenced and further success is looked forward to during this season.

1963 November

The Annual Commemoration Dinner of the Branch was held May 16. The Vancouver organization has always honoured the 18th of May, being the anniversary of the arrival of the first Loyalists at Parrrtown, later to be known as Saint John, N;B., on that date in 1783.

Our first dinner held on May 18, 1963 was the 180th anniversary of that notable day. There were 21 members and their friends present and after the Toast to Her Majesty and the conclusion of the dinner, Mr. Donald Sage, President, gave a very interesting paper on Simon Fraser, Explorer, whose name is so vivid in the annals of this province. Apropos also of the fact that the new University to be established on Burnaby Mountain is to be known as the Simon Fraser University, and we think it opportune to make it known that this distinguished explorer was a U.E.L. born in Canada and not Scotland as has been deviously reported over radio broadcast.

We extend our every good wish for the progress in the resumption of this publication which keeps Loyalists throughout Canada mindful of their traditional; loyalty which should ever be uppermost in the minds of true-hearted Canadians today.

1965 April

The Vancouver Branch continues to hold three meeting" during the year, the first being in October on or about the 13th of October commemorating the Battle of Queenston Heights, the second in Feb-

ruary and the annual dinner on or about the 18th of May, commemorating Loyalist Day 18th May, 1783. Since 1935 and until this year, the Vancouver Branch has made an annual award to a winning undergraduate at the University of British Columbia for an essay set originally by the late Dr. W. N. Sage, Professor of History who was our first President. With the establishment of the Simon Fraser University on Burnaby Mountain in a picturesque setting of 1,000 feet above sea level, overlooking Burrard Inlet on one side and the City of Vancouver on the West, we have decided to terminate our inducement of a medal to the University of British Columbia and to establish it with the Simon Fraser University which opens in September of this year. Later we also hope to dedicate a plaque when opportunity presents itself. We feel with a smaller institution there may be a keener interest taken amongst the students and as Professor Allan Cunningham is already in residence in the City we shall be able to look forward to considerable assistance from both him and the Faculty in the realm of history.

Our annual dinner will be held in the Burnaby Centennial Pavilion on 18th May, adjacent to the University buildings. Professor Cunningham has already consented to be the guest speaker.

We recently recorded the death of one of our Charter members in the person of Larry Hutchison Morton Breadon, who had for many years taught school in the City and whose family came from Norfolk County in Ontario.

1965 November

Our annual Loyalist Day dinner was held at the Burnaby Mountain Pavilion on the evening of 18th May, which date we have always observed as the day on which the New Brunswick Loyalists arrived at Parr town, later to be known as Saint John.

We were particularly fortunate this year in having as our guest speaker for the occasion, Dr. Allan Cunningham, A.F.C., D.F.C., M.A., Ph.D., F.R.H.S., F.R.G.S., who has come from Oxford, where he was teaching history, to become head of the History Department of the new Simon Fraser University, situated on a one thousand acre area not far from the Pavilion on Burnaby Mountain. This is a most beautiful site-located one thousand feet above sea level overlooking Burrard Inlet and the north shore

mountains on the north, and the City of Vancouver on the West, the lights making a veritable fairyland after dark. Dr. Cunningham's address consisted largely of plans for the University in his department and lamenting the great lack of teachers for Canadian history. Lord Lovat, head of the Clan Fraser, came to Vancouver for the formal opening of the University on 9th September and while the Vancouver Branch had hoped to have had a plaque dedicated to Simon Fraser for that occasion it was considered expedient to delay for the time being until the confusion of opening had subsided.

A press announcement has also disclosed that the 3,000 volume library of the late Dr. Walter N. Sage, former Professor of History at the University of British Columbia and first President of the Vancouver Branch of the United Empire Loyalists' Association, has been presented to the Simon Fraser University by Mrs. Sage, Donald Sage and his sister Mrs. Margaret Haywood. The Library will be known as the Walter Sage Library of Canadiana and will be continuing; its value is set at \$30,000.

Our next meeting will be held on or about 13th October, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Sage.

1967 Spring

The United Empire Loyalists in Western Canada are at a great disadvantage in respect to visual evidence since we have no specific locations with Loyalist traditions, no monuments, or churches which have been revered for many years almost as shrines. Consequently, we find it exceedingly difficult to perpetuate Loyalist traditions amongst the younger generation.

On Saturday, November 19th, 1966, British Columbia marked the One Hundredth anniversary of the union by Proclamation, of the two original colonies of British Columbia - the mainland and Vancouver's Island. They were united under the governorship of Sir James Douglas, and in 1871 the province joined Confederation.

Fort Langley on the Fraser River, named after Simon Fraser, was founded by the Hudson's Bay Company in 1827. By concentrated effort on the part of the pioneer residents, and the assistance of the late Dr. W. N. Sage, some time Professor of History at the University of British Columbia, the Dominion Government re established the old fort with its massive barricades and hand hewn timbers. This is the "Big House" where official acknowledgment is made each year of the amalgamation of the two original colonies.

The Commemoration service and opening of the "Old Machinery" Museum adjacent to the regular museum, was attended by the Lord Mayor of London, the Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia, Premier Bennett and other dignitaries who signed the official records.

For many years we have held our annual Loyalist dinner at which we remember our forebears who landed at Parr-town in New Brunswick, May 18th, 1783. This year, at the invitation of Colonel and Mrs. Oscar Orr, a large attendance of members enjoyed a buffet supper at their delightful home. This is situated in view of the Spanish Banks, so named because of the meeting in this area between Captain George Vancouver and the Spanish explorers and navigators, Galiano and Valdez in June, 1792.

On the anniversary of the Battle of Queenston Heights in October we gathered at the home of our president, Mr. Donald Sage and Mrs. Sage. These two anniversaries mentioned are the two special dates we commemorate.

During the year we have been pleased to welcome three new members, Mr. William Searles, formerly of the Bay of Quinte Branch, and Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Ross.

In October our first treasurer, Mr. William Blakely Stanley Bamford, died after a long illness. Mr. Bamford was born in Cornwall Ontario and came to Nelson, British Columbia, with his parents as a child. He retired from the service of the Bank of Montreal some ten years ago. Mr. Bamford is survived by one son William.

In August of this year, one of our very well known members Mr. Gordon Scott died very suddenly. A member of an old pioneer Vancouver family, Mr. Scott saw service in the First Great War with a Vancouver battalion and was chief City Magistrate, succeeding Colonel Orr upon his retirement.

1967 Autumn

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS SERVICE

Having been a member of the Toronto organization for a few years prior to 1932 it was through the persistent endeavour of the late Mr. Horace H. Van Wart that the Vancouver Branch was formed. At his suggestion we advertised in the local press regarding the possibility of forming a Vancouver Branch of the United Empire Loyalists. The results were astonishing and most satisfactory. A preliminary meeting held in September, 1932, in the old Hotel Vancouver was attended by several interested persons including His Grace, Archbishop A. U. DePencier, of the Anglican Diocese of New Westminster who like myself was a member of the Toronto Branch; Professor W. N. Sage, of the University of British Columbia and head of the History Department, and Judge J. A. Forin, who while not eligible for regular membership, was nevertheless a keen student of history and possessed an extensive library of Rare Canadian records.

Under the circumstances I was asked to act as organizing Secretary. Notices were immediately dispatched with enthusiastic response from various parts of the Province - Mr. Allison from Quesnel in the north, Mr. Leon Mallory from Kamloops in the interior of the Province and many more names less remote from the city. On the 6th of October 1932 an open meeting was called and twenty eligible persons became charter members, (two of whom are still living) with the following Executive elected to office:

President, Professor Walter N. Sage
Vice-President (deceased) Professor M. Y. Williams
Treasurer, Mr. W. B. S. Bamford
Secretary, Miss B. P. Choate

Being aware that the first Loyalists arrived in New Brunswick on May 18th, 1783, it was unanimously decided to honour that date as our official day of commemoration and for years this date was recognized with a memorial service at St. Helen's Church, Point Grey, with the Rector and Principal of the Anglican Theological College, the Rev. Dr. H. R. Trumpour, taking the service.

On the 18th May, 1933, we celebrated with what was perhaps the largest and most eventful dinner held in all the years. The gracious Oval Room of the Old Hotel Vancouver was brilliantly lighted with its beautiful crystal candelabra and tables generously decorated with masses of coloured blossom. Guests included members of the military, diplomatic service and many from out of town, including the late Mrs. Colin Campbell, from Winnipeg, well known woman of outstanding service to Canada.

In 1934 my sister donated a silver medal to be given to the winner of an Essay contest in the History Department of the University. This was duly accepted by the Faculty and plans inaugurated for an annual event plus a small cash prize for books. A replica of the medal was presented from year to year. Some splendid essays were submitted and passed along to the Society representing the efforts of some brilliant students. This contest was pursued continuously from the years 1935 to 1963 by which time interest was lagging amongst the students who found the compensation not worth the effort and it was consequently terminated in 1964 -two years having been without an award owing to lack of submission.

Professor M. Y. Williams became our second President and over the years has been most generous with his interesting addresses and pictures of the beautiful Bay of Quinte area from where he came. The late Colonel W. S. Buell whose family was closely allied to the Brockville area, became successor to Professor Williams as President and in turn was succeeded by the late W. C. Ditmare who came from the St. Catharines area.

With the great change in the mode of thinking during the last few years and the somewhat lessening of pride in Canada's past, locally we have experienced less of enthusiasm in the historical background we have been so proud to remember and revere. The younger generation tend to look forward instead of backward to the past and must mature before they have regard for tradition. However, we manage to retain the warm association of a closely knit family and have three meetings during the year.

Television and other news media are full of American propaganda which too often displays none too dependable details of the revolution.

1973 Autumn

On November 23 our respected member Mrs. Hazel E. Scott passed away. She was a native of New Brunswick, and widow of the late Magistrate Gordon Scott, U.E.L., native of Saint John, New Brunswick. Mr. Scott served as magistrate in Vancouver.

1976 Autumn

In June Mr. Donn Langford, our branch genealogist, moved to Kelowna and the Vancouver Branch lost an esteemed member. It was with regret that the executive accepted Mr. Langford's resignation. Over the past few years he has made helpful contributions to our Branch and through his initiative many new

members were gained. We all join in wishing Mr. Langford and his wife a happy relocation in Kelowna and hope he will be able to attend some of our future meetings.

Our Bicentennial goal is to find new members to bring into our Vancouver Branch. Only a few years ago the Vancouver Branch almost folded due to apathy, but we are on the upsurge once again. If each member brings in one new Loyalist we could quickly reach a membership of 100 before the bicentennial of the Loyalists' arrival in Canada. There are hundreds of potential U.E.L. members who may not even know of our existence.

Since the May meeting the new branch executive has been active. After Mr. Langford's departure Mr. Gerstner, who has had many years' experience, graciously accepted the position as branch genealogist. Mr. Gerstner is well qualified to take on this added task. He has long been interested in family research and has been very active doing genealogical work. Anyone needing assistance with his/her Loyalist proof or anyone knowing of potential U.E.L. members can contact Mr. Gerstner. Members are also reminded that Mr. Gerstner now has the branch library books which contain a wealth of Loyalist information. Anyone wishing the use of these books can contact Mr. Gerstner.

The executive has also initiated a joint publicity historical committee to advertise and promote branch activities and to preserve and collect branch historical data.

Plans are under way to publicize our local association in the newspapers and information concerning our association will be displayed in appropriate spots in the Public Library, the Genealogy Library, Mormon Church, and the meeting room of the B.C. Genealogical Society. A scrapbook of Loyalist news, past and present, has been started. Unfortunately, a fire several years ago at Miss Choate's home destroyed a great deal of historical data and we are starting with very little.

1977 Spring

On December 5, 1976 a Loyalist tea was held at the home of Maureen Hewlett. Some members wore costumes from the Loyalist era. We are grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Hewlett and their delightful family for a lovely afternoon. In passing was contrasted the cosy fireside Christmases of today with those first few Christmases our Loyalist ancestors spent in Canada.

We have been most fortunate in obtaining a meeting room. Mr. Burton Slough has arranged for a large well furnished room and adjacent kitchen in the Fairview Baptist Church at 16th and Pine Sts. We held our February meeting there and our Branch Genealogist, Mr. Robert Gerstner announced he would hold U.E.L. oriented genealogy classes on the third Thursday of every month at his Church. Mrs. Hewlett and Kathy Peters have offered their help. We have several new people who have indicated their interest in joining and these classes will be a great boon.

All of us were delighted to meet Mr. Slough's bride, an Island girl who knew Mr. Slough years ago as a girl. A bouquet of tulips was presented to Mrs. Slough.

Our president, Miss Howden, led the discussions on the acquisition of the new flag, the purchase of new books, and the raising of fees. Our present library is really a mini-library and is housed in a cardboard box. All agreed on the policy of purchasing one or two new books a year to be decided on by the genealogist.

The best laid plans of mice and men -- yes, we had a film, painstakingly arranged and a projector borrowed from the school board, but a light had burned out and the projector did not work. Sandwiches,

cakes and tea were promptly served and the meeting ended after much genealogical discussion and trading of information.

Mr. Gerstner called the meeting to order at 11.40 a.m. and welcomed the members to the annual meeting and luncheon. Mr. Gerstner then called on Mr. Bessey to read the minutes of the last annual meeting and also the correspondence. Mrs. Maureen Hewlett then gave the annual treasurer's report and a motion by Mr. Gerstner to file the treasurer's report was carried unanimously.

Mr. Gerstner then gave the Genealogist's report and informed the membership that there were six new members who received their certificates: Mrs. H.T. DeLong, Miss Marion Kidd, Mrs. Maureen Hewlett, Mr. E.C. Peters, Miss Kathleen Peters and Mr. Lloyd M. Brown.

The President's report was read by Mrs. Hewlett and Mrs. Hooker read the nomination convener's report and the executive for 1977-1978 are: President, Mr. Robert K. Bessey; Vice-President and Secretary Mrs. Joan DeLong; Treasurer, Mrs. Maureen Hewlett; Genealogist, Mr. Robert Gerstner; Assistant Genealogist, Miss Kathy Peters.

About our new President: Mr. Robert K. Bessey is a direct descendant of Jacob Bessey who served in Butler's Rangers at Fort Niagara and later settled at what is now St. Catharines, Ontario. Mr. Robert K. Bessey is 37 years old and the father of four children and has two granddaughters. He is an active member of the Monarchist League of Canada.

He works on his book that he is writing about the history and genealogy of the Bessey family.

The Vancouver branch had a very quiet summer with no meetings held since the annual meeting in May. However, an outing to the Vancouver Planetarium on July 6th to see the film "Royal Palaces of a Queen" was well attended both by the Vancouver members of the U.E.L. Association and their guests the members of the Vancouver branch of the Monarchist League of Canada. A cocktail party was held after the film at the home of the President Mr. Bessey.

The Vancouver branch was the recipient of two gifts this year, Miss Howden very kindly donated a copy of "Robert's Rules of Order" and Mr. Bessey donated a mahogany flag pole and stand with a brass maple leaf for the top and a gold cord with tassles.

1978 Autumn

Once again we have weathered the storm that apathy bred - we are still a functioning Branch of the Loyalists' Association. On 25 April, our Annual meeting, the motion to dissolve the Vancouver Branch was defeated. The Dominion President, Mr. D. Stuart Gilmor, in his talk said it was easier to dissolve a Branch than to get together and form one. Mr. Bessey, our outgoing President, said that if the present volunteers for executive office had come forward before, the measure of dissolution would not

have been necessary. We feel we have learned something from this experience and are working to make the Vancouver Branch grow.

The following members have volunteered and were duly elected to hold office for the ensuing year: President, Mr. Beverley Smith, Vice-President, Mrs. Audrey Hanshen, Treasurer, Mr. Smith, acting, Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Doreen Todhunter, Recording Secretary, Mrs. Lucile Hooker, Genealogist, Mr. Robert Gerstner.

As part of our program of public awareness we have sent out a "press release," have put 'posters up in the Greater Vancouver branch libraries, and have even had ourselves written up in the Vancouver Province as to how we were celebrating Canada Week - on July 1st "the Loyalists will fly their flag (the Union Jack as it was under King George III), toast the Queen, and commemorate the 200 years they have 'guarded the preservation of Canada.'" The Vancouver Branch had a luncheon at Grosvenor Hotel at which sixteen members and guests were present.

Ten of our members were invited to attend a reception on 7 August at Government House to honour the visit of Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh. It was a grand adventure going to Government House. Those who attended were Mrs. Audrey Hanshen, Vice-President; Mrs. Lucile Hooker, Recording Secretary; Mrs. Doreen Todhunter, Corresponding Secretary; Bishop Robert Gerstner, Genealogist; Mr. Robert Bessey, Jr. Past President; Mrs. Maureen Hewlitt, Jr. Past Secretary-Treasurer; Mrs. Joyce Gerstner; Ms. Judy Todhunter-Bowman; Mr. David Bowman; and Miss Linda Todhunter. Mr. Bessey, Bishop Gerstner, and Mrs. Todhunter wore U.E.L. jewels. True to stories about the Royal family, they do notice medals, decorations, etc. Each of us was singled out and spoken to by the Princes. Prince Andrew stopped and asked Mrs. Todhunter what the medal was. She replied, "United Empire Loyalist. He then looked to Premier Bennett who was walking with him for an explanation. Premier Bennett is of Loyalist descent and explained who the U.E.L.'s were to Prince Andrew who then turned and said "There are quite a few of them still down in the States aren't there? Mrs. Todhunter went on to explain that we are descendents of approximately 50,000 who left the States and came to Canada. Bob Bessey and Bob Gerstner had a similar experience answering questions for Prince Philip since he noticed the jewel on each of them.

Our branch wrote to His Honour the Honourable Henry. P. Bell-Irving, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of British Columbia on 1 June to tender Honorary Membership in our Branch, which he graciously accepted in a letter from Government House of 9 June. We are currently designing an Honorary Member's Certificate to be presented at such times. In the same vein we have written to His Royal Highness Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, and following are excerpts from this letter:

... We are descendents of approximately 50,000 Loyalists who left the Thirteen Colonies and settled in what is now Canada. Full membership in our organization requires that an individual have documented proof of his descent from his Loyalist ancestor, which is proven by Dominion Headquarters before the person is able to write with pride "U.E." after his name. George III bestowed a title of honour in recognition of the loyalty of the early Loyalist settlers. On 9 November 1789 Lord Dorchester, Governor-General of Canada, created the Noble Order of Unity of the empire and proclaimed the hereditary title of U.E. Loyalist to be conferred upon those who had fought for the Crown and had suffered and sacrificed so much.

The motto of The United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada is ducit amor patriae, "let love of Canada lead you," and if it were not for these Loyalists, the Canada that we know would probably not exist. The Association was incorporated by Act of the Dominion Parliament on 27 May 1914, and the Vancouver Branch was formed on 6 October 1932.

Our Loyalist bicentennial is in 1983. We are Canadians which have been guarding the preservation of Canada for almost two hundred years.

1979 Spring

The Vancouver branch received two very nice gifts last year, namely a flagpole with a gold silk cord and tassel, gold maple leaf pole top, and stand, from Mr. Robert K. Bessey UE, Jr. Past President. This gift makes it possible to display our flag with the dignity it deserves. We also received a gavel and sounding board presented in memory of Victor Norman Pattullo U.E., the grandfather of Mrs. Phyllis J. Sutton UE, Mrs. Doreen G. Todhunter UE, and great grandfather of Ms. Judith A. Todhunter UE. This gift was presented on behalf of these families and Mrs. Todhunter assured us that the gavel and sounding board were manufactured in Canada of Canadian wood!

In our last branch news we neglected to mention that our guest speaker at our Dominion Day luncheon was Dr. Leslie F.S. Upton, Honorary Vice-President of the U.E.L. Association of Canada and Honorary Member of the Vancouver Branch. Dr. Upton favoured us with a very thought provoking talk on "Some of the possible aims and objects of the present day Loyalists after they have proven their descent". He showed what further use can be made of this research, as for instance: preparing comparative tables, trying to reconstruct the Loyalists' thoughts in those early days and why. they did some things and not others, etc.

A regular meeting of the Vancouver branch was held Tuesday, 17 October 1978. We welcomed a new member to Vancouver -- Mrs. M. Carolyn Boyd UE, transferring from the Calgary branch. One of our new "regulars," Mr. Gary Worth UE, was presented with his certificate. A brief from Headquarters, for presentation to the Joint Committee of the Senate and the House of Commons, was read and discussed. The meeting was told that a copy had been submitted to our local paper with a request that it be printed. The following members were appointed to act as liaison between the branch and Headquarter's Committees: History Committee Miss Florence Howden UE; Costume Committee - Mrs. Maureen Hewlett UE; Bicentennial Committee Bishop Robert Gerstner UE. These names have been sent to Toronto.

We have other new members: Mr. George Thomas Sutton UE. and Mrs. Margaret Lucy (Sutton) McIntyre UE; Miss Karen Lesley Todhunter UE, Mr. Ronald Stanley Todhunter UE, Miss Linda Doreen Todhunter UE, and Mr. Stanley Caswell Todhunter, Associate. These are all descendants of Mr. Victor Norman Pattullo through his daughter Mrs. Mae Agnes Powell and granddaughters Phyllis and Doreen. This group of ten members from the same family and all members of the Vancouver branch must be somewhat of a record. We have two other new Associate Members: Mrs. Joyce Gerstner and Mrs. Mary Worth. Previously we welcomed Mrs. Alice Slough and Mrs. Donald Smith as Associates. We currently have two more applications in the mail. Come on Canada, if you have relatives in B.C. let the Vancouver branch know and we will contact them and hopefully gather them into the branch.

The branch received Christmas greetings from our newest honorary member, the Honourable Henry P. Bell Irving, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of British Columbia, and Mrs. Bell-Irving.

The Vancouver branch sent out news of a Christmas Open House to be held Sunday, 17 December 1978, from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. Our Loyalists rallied behind the plan and made our festive gathering a rousing success. We had thirty-nine present consisting of regular, associate, and prospective members, as well as a few friends thrown in for good measure. The Todhunter house was decorated in the old fashioned manner, and the warmth and spirit of Christmas was apparent to all. Mr. and Mrs. Todhunter were in Loyalist costume as were the three Todhunter daughters. Delicious refreshments were served: canapes and fancy sandwiches donated by Robert K. Bessey U.E., Jr. Past President, and Daniel K. Hellman and made by Sous Chef of the Terminal City Club. Mr. Hellman gave unstintingly of his time, and took charge of preparations and servings The French pastries, homemade eggnog and wine were donated by the Todhunters. A table of home baking was featured in the dining room with the sale items described as "Old fashioned baking at old fashioned prices." The baking was donated by our members who opened

their kitchens to help the branch. Our Loyalist flag was prominently displayed, as was our charter. The commemorative Loyalist plate was also displayed and all twenty-three plates have been sold. We also had a number of enquiries about the Loyalist pin. Miss Florence Howden UE, our Life Member and Past President, poured. Servings were by the Gerstner children: Stephen and Carole, and the Todhunter daughters: Judy, Karen and Linda; as well as various members of the branch. All members present were most helpful in answering enquiries from interested parties and numerous Associate Membership Applications were handed out.

As of 31 December 1978, we have thirty-five members in good standing and another nineteen who are inactive, but we are hoping to triple our membership by 1983.

1979 Autumn

The Annual Meeting of the Vancouver Branch was held on 18 May at the Yorkshire Inn, preceded by a traditional English dinner of Roast Beef and Yorkshire Pudding. Four officers were in appropriate Loyalist costumes. President Smith explained the significance of the date, Bishop Gerstner said grace, and Mrs. Hulda Clark our charter member, gave the toast to the Queen. Two past presidents were introduced: Col. Oscar Orr (1954-58) and Mr. Bob Bessey (1977-78).

The following were asked to serve for the ensuing year: President Robert Gerstner UE; Vice-President Gary Worth UE; Recording Secretary Lucile Hooker UE; Corresponding Secretary, Doreen Todhunter UE Treasurer M. Caro Boyd UE; Genealogist Robert Bessey UE; and Assistant Genealogist Mary Worth.

The membership was informed that we now have a permanent meeting place and meetings would be held on the fourth Tuesday of every month with the exception of July and August. The meetings would be at 7:30 p.m. following which genealogical assistance would be available until 10:00 p.m.

Pamphlets prepared by the Secretary were given out explaining the history of the branch.

The regular meeting of the Vancouver Branch was held on 26 June in the Board Room of the Kitsilano Community Centre. Discussion of officers' duties, future committees, prospective speakers and the purchase of made-to-measure blazers took place. A suggested Bicentennial project was approved: a float in the PNE parade complete with costumed members, followed by a tent on the grounds including appropriate food and information.

One of our members, Judy Todhunter UE, has had an article entitled "The Griffins of Smithville, Ontario, and the Hights of Connecticut" accepted by The Canadian Genealogist. Judy is also working on an article about the Robert Campbell UE family of Chinguacousy and is preparing a book on the Caswell family of Palmerston and Saskatoon.

A system of public awareness is being followed and the Vancouver Branch is strengthening and growing.

1980 Spring

The Vancouver Branch has continued to hold regular monthly meetings and is steadily growing. Our progress is attributable to our program of "public awareness" adequately handled by Mrs. R.E. Schafer UE.

One of our new members, Mr. Jonathan Walford, gave a very interesting talk on antique clothing. He brought an eighteenth century man's hat, complete with leather hatbox, to the meeting (rather Quaker in

design) and passed it around for all to see. He also presented the members with illustrations and descriptions of clothing worn by our Loyalist ancestors. Mr. Walford has donated his time to present an "Antique Clothing Fashion Show" at our Annual Meeting on May 24th.

The Branch had a very successful Christmas Open House and Tea held at the home of our charter member Mrs. Hulda Mills Clark FE on December 9th. We had a record turnout of approximately fifty people for the event with two people, Mr. Paul Monlezun, a new member, and his father Mr. Jacques Monlezun, flying in from Dawson Creek which is in northern British Columbia. As usual we offered "old fashioned baking at old fashioned prices" and found this was a successful money raiser for the branch. Again this year the event was catered by Mr. Daniel Hellmann, chef of the University Club who worked tirelessly creating canapes and fancy sandwiches, to say nothing of the piece de resistance, a croqu-en-bouche which centred the table. Another table showed the various commemorative items for sale which was most appropriate for Christmas giving.

The Vancouver Branch is honoured to have another complete family as UE members--Mrs. Vona E. Smith UE and her husband Mr. Gilbert D. Smith UE, and their four children: Mrs. Cori E. (Smith) Stevens UE, Mr. Gilbert I. Smith UE, Miss Ada L. Smith UE, and Miss Julie E. Smith UE. In addition Vona persuaded her brother Mr. I. George DeWitt UE to join the Vancouver Branch.

The Secretary, Mrs. Doreen G. Todhunter UE, prepared a booklet "North American Redcoats, Military Clothing, Headgear, and Flags" to be distributed to various branch members and a copy for Gavin K. Watt, Lieutenant Commanding, Colonel's Company, First Battalion, King's Royal Yorkers. The booklet was well received and Mr. Watt passed on first hand information as to how one gets recreated military clothing to fit and the approximate cost for outfitting personnel.

Our Vice-President, Gary Worth UE, was congratulated by the branch on the birth of his daughter on February 16th. It was moved by Robert K. Bessey UE, and seconded by Lucile Hooker UE, that we send a certificate of membership to Joanne Meredith Worth, the baby daughter of Gary and Mary Worth--the first baby born to accredited members of our Vancouver Branch.

The branch is researching funding avenues to bring to fruition the plans for a float in the 1983 Pacific National Exhibition parade and staffing a booth during the course of the fair. We are a long way from the centre of Loyalism and the funds for such events are hard to come by.

1980 Fall

Mrs. Doreen Todhunter, Secretary of Vancouver Branch is honoured at a Ceremonial Dinner and receives an award from Mr. G.L. Van Koughnett of Heritage Branch, Montreal.

CEREMONIAL DINNER

The Ceremonial Dinner was held on Sept. 23 at The University Club of Vancouver, suitably adorned with Canadian flags, Union Jacks, Association banners, the Loyalist flag, and the British Columbia flag, and began with a social hour followed by the piping in of the head table, by Hector Turnbull and Colin Cameron wearing the Buchanan tartan. The kilted pipers are members of two bands: the band of Gizeh 'temple A.A.O.N.M.S. and the Vancouver Police Pipe Band.

The assemblage was called to Order by Robert K. Bessey UE, Dinner Chairman, and everyone rose as the colour party entered, composed of the two pipers and a standard bearer; Kenneth D. Bessey, UE. Mrs. Joyce Gerstner favoured us with a solo entitled "Our Pledge to Our Heritage" (adapted from an old military air) with words and melody by G. Van Koughnett, UE (CMH), arranged by D. Page, UE.

The Branch President, Bishop Robert Gerstner, UE, asked the blessing, followed by a superb gourmet meal prepared by Chef Daniel Hellmann. A word of welcome was extended to all present by the President. He then introduced visitors from other organizations and those coming from a distance as follows: Mrs. Vida Bessey, St. Catharines, Ontario; Mrs. F.Elva Borgerson, Past Queen, Zarah Temple, Daughters of the Nile; Dr. Jane Fredeman, Senior Editor, University of British Columbia Press; Professor W.E. At the conclusion of the dinner the Chef and Daniel Hellmann, Chef of The University Club of Vancouver, was given a hearty round of applause for such a sumptuous repast.

Robert Bessey, UE, substituting for the Branch Genealogist Vona Smith UE presented a membership certificate to our youngest member Joanne Meredith Worth (ancestor Captain Benjamin North) aged seven months, who was at home asleep. Gary Worth UE then addressed a few words to those assembled asking for their support of our organization. Officers of the Order entered followed by the Master-of-Exchequer Joyce Bradford carrying the leather tooled presentation chest. She, in turn, was followed by Chancellor George van Koughnett. They assembled at a special dias, opposite the head table, under and elegant floor-to-ceiling Indian wood carving. The evening closed by a hearty singing of O Canada.

Mrs. Todhunter was not called upon to speak but she felt the occasion warranted a special thank you and has written the following letter to Mr. George van Koughnett, Mr. E.J. Chard, and Mrs. Bradford.

"When our President, Bob Gerstner, phoned to tell me I had been chosen, I was overwhelmed and very pleased. In the ensuing days I began to formulate my thoughts into just what this meant to me, personally, and began to think of a reply if I were called upon to speak. Since a speech was not necessary, and I do want to tell you how much your trip to the west coast for the induction ceremony has meant, I thought the words put together at the time of notification would express my feelings. Please accept them on that basis.

Mr. van Koughnett, Mr. Chard, and Mrs. Bradford, Companions Officers and Members of the Vancouver Branch, and Friends :

It is with deep humility that I accept this honour. I feel the knowledge of one's Loyalist ancestors explains the inner source of feelings that is the fibre of our soul--it is the moving force of our thoughts and actions. I am proud of this heritage.

I feel the receipt of this honour is one of the great moments of my life and I would like to thank my co-workers and friends in the Vancouver Branch for making it possible. Thank you.'

I am still 'in awe' of the happenings of Tuesday, the 23rd, your ceremony was so simple and dignified--its simplicity made it most impressive. I cannot tell you how much it has meant to me, and to have the beautiful collar and lapel jewel, in addition to the framed warrant, and application form, they will be treasured by me and my family for many years.

Thank you again for making such a memorable evening possible. With kindest personal regards,

The evening will be long remembered by those seventy people attending the dinner and will go down in the history of the Vancouver Branch as truly a "night to remember."

Mr. Walter Robinson, Potentate of Gizeh Temple, presented Mrs. Todhunter with a commemorative book published in 1975 entitled: "G" for Gizeh: the 'Life Story of a Temple" because she is the daughter of the late George S. Powell, Potentate of Gizeh Temple in 1954. Mrs. Todhunter is a Past Honoured Queen of Bethel No.1, International Order of Job's Daughters; and a charter member of Zarak Temple Daughters of the Nile.

Mr. Gary Worth closed this outstanding and memorable occasion with a hearty vote of appreciation to Mr. Robert K. Bessey, Past President, who was responsible for all of the arrangements.

1981 Spring

The Vancouver Branch is continuing to hold monthly meetings, but it is currently locked out of its meeting hall because of a civic workers' labour dispute. Miss Ruth Schafer UE and Mrs. Sarah Schafer UE are keeping up their publicity campaign for public awareness and it appears to be working.

Our Annual Christmas Tea and Open House was again held at the home of our charter member Mrs. Robert C. Clark on, Sunday, December 7, and was well attended. Chef Daniel Hellmann of the University Club, created canapes and fancy sandwiches and also provided us with a croqu-en-bouche as the table centre.

A Bicentennial Cookbook Committee has been set up, chaired by Mrs. Norma McGuire UE with the assistance of Mrs. Kay Leonard. The branch is looking at various fund raising projects in preparation for 1983.

1981 Autumn

The Vancouver Branch is continuing its efforts to make itself well known in the Greater Vancouver area and is still holding monthly meetings except for July and August.

Gordon Leonard UE and his wife Kay worked very hard to have a successful picnic in August at old Fort Langley, a reconstructed Hudson's Bay Company fort. It is called the "birthplace" of British Columbia and is located in Fort Langley National Historic Park. Mr. Jonathan Walford U.E.L. displayed his private collection of antique clothing from the Loyalist period and gave a short talk. He is Costume Curator at the North Shore Museum. The success of the day was due to the efforts of the Convener, Mrs. Mary Worth.

The Bicentennial Cookbook Chairman, Mrs. Norma McGuire UE has done an excellent job of hand printing and illustrating the cookbook, but the project has stalled because of a lack of publishing funds.

A visit to the Vancouver Centennial Museum was arranged for the members to view an Undergarments exhibit which included all kinds of clothing of the Loyalist period and was much enjoyed.

A campaign of supplying "search" information at branch meetings is being conducted by the Genealogist, Mrs. Vona Smith U.E. She brings many useful books and pamphlets which might be of assistance to

others. Vona is a very knowledgeable researcher and willing to share this knowledge and assist those who need help.

The February meeting was cancelled due to a freak Vancouver snow storm. However the branch continues to meet the fourth Tuesday of every month, except July and August. at the Kitsilano Community Centre.

The members continue to praise Mrs. Doreen Todhunter for her remarkable organization, leadership and greatly detailed work over recent years in rebuilding this fine expanding branch that had previously declined to the point of closing.

1982 Autumn

The Vancouver Branch continues to explore other areas of interest as well as holding monthly meetings. In February a group of us visited the Vancouver Centennial Museum to see a display of garments, some dating from Loyalist times.

The election of officers at April's meeting were the following: President, Mr. Gordon Leonard UE; Vice-President, Mrs. Maurice Walford (Ann) UE; Secretary, Mrs. Gary Worth (Mary); Treasurer, Miss Ruth Schafer UE; Genealogist, Mrs. Gilbert Smith (Vona) UE.

A special meeting was called for May 3, to meet the Dominion President, Mr. John Eaman, who spoke to us about "The Loyalists and the Future". In May we rented a table at a Flea Market and plan to do this project twice a year. Our Annual Luncheon was held on May 29, 1982 at the Dogwood Room (P.N.E.). Our guest speaker, Professor Peter Moogk of the Department of History at U.B.C., spoke about "The Limits of Loyalism: Canadian and Great Britain". We also had the ever popular Antique Clothing Fashion Show under the auspices of Jonathan Walford.

We have been unsuccessful to date in coming up with a workable Bicentennial project, but we continue to search for one, We encourage our members to make themselves Loyalist costumes and plan to foster an awareness of locally available U.E.L. material.

1985 December

"The Loyal Americans," a collection of sixteen slides and commentary was prepared by Peter N. Moogk UE, Professor of History at The University of British Columbia. The production of these slides was supported by the Vancouver Branch as a second bicentennial project and is offered as a teaching aid to keep our Loyalist heritage alive.

President Doreen Todhunter UE and Genealogist Vona Smith UE attended the first night's dinner of the "Ninetieth Year of Service" Conference, Washington State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, in Tumwater, Washington, on March 20th. Doreen and Vona went in costume and when Doreen concluded her few words of greeting by saying "like our Loyalist ancestors we came in our one good dress" she received much applause.

The Annual Luncheon was held May 18th at the Faculty Club at UBC. It was a costume event and Ivan Sayer, Curator of History at the Vancouver Museum, was guest speaker. Mr. Sayer told us girls were laced into corset stays at the age of 1-1/2 years and when adults many of these women could not stand erect without their stays! The wearing of stays from such an early age also contributed to many childbirth deaths. He exhibited two period dresses and took us step-by-step through its wearing.

"Hands Across the Border" Third Annual Tour was held July 27th. A busload of Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution, sponsored by the Greater Seattle DAR Regents' Council once again "invaded" Canada. They visited the Physick Garden (a typical sixteenth-century herbal garden) at UBC, had a brief "windshield" tour of the campus, and stopped for luncheon at the Faculty Club. They were then guided to other UBC gardens, the museum, library, and regrouped to continue their day touring the Expo 86 site.

Benjamin Worth UE (named for his Loyalist ancestor) is our new Life Member. We must have set something of a record with such a young family holding Life memberships: father Gary, daughter Joanne, and baby Benjamin. Mother Mary is an Associate member. Unique in Vancouver is Andrew Webb UE with four certificated Loyalist grandparents: Richardson Webb, Richard Currie, Jacob Segee, and Richard Jones. Congratulations to both families for such loyalism. Kudos for an unusual wedding go out to Past President Robert K. Bessey of Vancouver and Mrs. Marjorie Bessey of Ontario. They were married May 11th in the intensive care unit of the St. Catherine's General Hospital. The groom wore a lovely green gown and was surrounded by yellow mums! After a less than auspicious beginning Bob has regained his health and the newlyweds are living in Vancouver - congratulations!

A Christmas Tea is planned for December 8th at the home of Vice-President Peter Moogk UE and Mrs. Moogk. This is another costume event.

Obituary: **Miss Florence Howden UE**

Life member Miss Florence Howden, Vancouver Branch Past President, passed away October 27th. She was a long time benefactor of Dominion Headquarters and will be sadly missed. She was a pre-1910 UE and claimed Loyalist Jordan Post of York County, Ontario, as her ancestor.

Two long time members of the Vancouver Branch passed away this year, both were pre-1970 UE's. Major C. Bertram Huyck VE, born in 1889 in Tweed, Ontario, died March 8th. He saw service in both World Wars and went overseas in 1914 with the Sixth Field Company Engineers from Kingston. Major Huyck leaves his wife, sons, and their families in Vancouver. He claimed descent from Loyalist Isaac C. Huyck of Tweed, Ontario. Life Member Miss Florence Howden UE died October 27th. She was a Vancouver Branch Past President and a long-time benefactor of Dominion Headquarters. Miss Howden is survived by nieces and nephews. She claimed descent from Loyalist Jordon Post of York County, Ontario. Both of these "old" members will be sadly missed.

1986 June

Over two hundred years after their ancestors went into exile, members of the Vancouver Branch of the U.E.L.A.C. gathered on Sunday, December 8th, for their annual Christmas Tea and Old Fashioned Bake Sale. Thirty - some in eighteenth century costume came to the home of Dr. Peter Moogk in West Point Grey for the tea. President Doreen G. Todhunter introduced the new executive for 1986: Peter Moogk UE, President; Norma Raynor UE, Vice-President; Mary Worth UE, Secretary; Ruth Shafer UE, Treasurer; and Vona Smith-UE, Branch Genealogist - a post she has filled with great ability over a number of years. Newsletter Editor and past President, Robert K. Bessey UE, was there in a Butler's Rangers uniform. Doreen Todhunter poured tea and coffee while those present discussed the history of their families. Five year old Joanne Worth of Burnaby, one of our youngest members, attended in long dress and poke bonnet while the oldest members present were Lucile Hooker, a charter member, and Sadie Shafer, who are both in their nineties.

1986 December

The Vancouver Branch though far away from original Loyalist settlements is presenting some very realistic ways of recapturing those early times. The latest branch newsletter, edited by Mrs. Doreen Todhunter, carried a Loyalist recipe for kedgeriee and another for spruce beer! There were also instructions for knitting a pioneer shawl. The October meeting included an exhibition of artifacts brought in by the members and the Annual Costume Event was held in December at the home of the Branch President, Professor Peter Moogk and Mrs. Moogk.

The branch has discontinued selling the needlepoint kit for making the member's badge but still has the charts for this at \$5 and for the Armorial Bearings at \$12. To order write to Miss Ruth Schafer, Treasurer at 3363 West 39th Avenue, Vancouver, B.C. V6N 3A3. The same issue of the newsletter indicates interest in the original settlements by informing members that the Kingston Branch of the Ontario Genealogical Society has completed all the cemetery records from Kingston to the Bay of Quinte.

There is also a documentary of Loyalist days carried in the diary entries of a young officer, taken from A Journal of Thomas Hughes, 1778-1789, published in 1947. This describes what it was like to be a prisoner in the rebels' hands and what kind of treatment was meted out to Loyalists who found themselves behind rebel lines. Later entries recorded the remarkable progress made in settling the upper St. Lawrence area.

1998 Fall

The Vancouver Branch of the United Empire Loyalists' Association held its annual luncheon at the UBC Faculty Club. This event is held close to the anniversary of the 1783 landing of American Loyalist refugees at the River Saint John, New Brunswick. Guests of Honour at the luncheon were North Vancouver's mayor, Jack Loucks, who has Loyalist ancestors, and his wife, Olive. After the meal, Dr. Ronald Hatch, of the UBC Department of English, gave a talk on literary perceptions of life in early Canada. Mayor Loucks spoke of his pride in his Loyalist heritage. Dr. Peter Moogk, the branch president, concluded with the hope that the group's awareness of Canada's past would make them better Canadians. Many of those present were dressed in eighteenth century costume.

AN EXTRAORDINARY LIFE: LCOL. OSCAR ORR by Peter Moogk

On November 1st, 1992, the Vancouver Branch lost Cot. Oscar Orr, who had just marked his one hundredth birthday. Oscar's Loyalist lineage came from his mother; she was a descendant of Benjamin McConnell and Elizabeth Haines of Rye [Long Island], New York Province, who settled at Shelburne, Nova Scotia. Both came from active "Tory" families. The Loyalist connection was strengthened when Benjamin's son Elijah married Elinor, the daughter of Deacon David Shook, UE, from Lancaster, Pennsylvania. The Shooks and McConnells had been fellow passengers on a refugee ship from Boston. Elijah and Elinor had a son named after his father. More Loyalist ancestors came from Elijah McConnell II's wife Kate, daughter of Dennis Schoff or Shaw of Butler's Rangers. Oscar was also connected with the De Cous or Corsons of Upper Canada. His grandfather McConnell, born in Digby, N.S., moved to Elgin County, in Ontario. The Orrs were of Irish stock; Great-grandfather William observed that if William had caught the "little rebel" William Lyon Mackenzie, as he had hoped, we might have been spared Prime Minister W.L. Mackenzie King, the rebel's grandson. The Orrs have served as officers in the Canadian armed forces, whether as reservists or career servicemen, for six generations.

Oscar's son Alexander was a Flying Officer with the R.C.A.F. when he was killed in an air crash in Burma in 1943. That was a dark moment in Oscar's eventful life.

Oscar was born on 27 July 1892 on the Red Pheasant Indian Reserve, some thirty miles south of the old town of Battleford, in the former North West Territories. His father had farmed in Manitoba and had been a mounted policeman. When Oscar was born, his father was employed as an agricultural instructor to the Indians, because he spoke Cree and knew about farming.

At the age of five, Oscar was sent to live with his grandparents at St. Thomas, Ontario. He was not happy there and ran away from them in May 1903 when ten years old, to join the Sells & Downs Circus. It was his third flight from their home. Being a farm boy, he knew all about haying and other chores, such as the feeding and tending of livestock.

For three months he cared for the circus camels. He was briefly employed as a cabin boy on a ship in New York harbour. Oscar next found work on a farm in Michigan State, but decided that "it was too cold for me," so he went to Galveston, Texas. "I was getting money and my keep, and I was just a kid. [...] I will never forgive myself for not writing my mother for two years." After two years and seven months in the United States, the fugitive was persuaded to return to Canada. After a Christmas dinner at Syracuse, N.Y., courtesy of the Salvation Army, he boarded an empty freight car of the Michigan Central Railroad going north with only a bag of boiled candy for food. He arrived at St. Thomas on December 27th, 1905, at 2 a.m.

Back in Ontario, Oscar attended high school until the age of sixteen, when his mother in British Columbia sent for him. She was working as a hospital nurse in New Westminster and had not seen her son for ten years. He arrived in the Pacific province in April 1908 and continued his studies at Columbia Methodist College in New Westminster. His maternal uncle was a barrister in St. Thomas. Oscar's cousins persuaded him to write the entrance examinations for the informal law school in Vancouver. There was not yet a University of British Columbia, not to speak of a Faculty of Law. Leading lawyers volunteered to give lectures to paying students. Oscar passed the test and was studying law when the First World War broke out in August 1914.

Oscar served briefly with the navy, but went overseas with Vancouver's 29th Battalion ("Tobin's Tigers") of the Canadian Expeditionary Force's Second Division. He had been in the militia in 1908-1913 and was enrolled as a private. He was commissioned in the field as a lieutenant in May 1916. Subalterns were then said to have a life expectancy of 90 days. He was with the 29th in the Ypres Salient when, on 16 July 1916, a three ounce piece of German shrapnel passed through the bridge of his nose and down into his throat. His optic nerves were damaged yet, miraculously, he survived what should have been a fatal wound. Oscar kept the fragment of steel on his mantelpiece with the plaque "From Fritz to Oscar" attached to it. He was "still amazed" by his survival and on the fatal 190th day as a lieutenant, he was invited to have tea with the King and Queen at Buckingham Palace.

Oscar Orr was invalided back to Canada and, after "they patched me up," he resumed his law studies and then took the Law Society entrance exam at Victoria. He was called to the bar late in 1916. "Some colleagues used to say that was not the only one called to the bar with a hole in the head."

In 1921 he was hired to be Assistant City Prosecutor for Vancouver. He was City Prosecutor by 1939, when the Second World War began. Oscar could not pass the medical examination for active service overseas, and was taken on by the army as Assistant Judge Advocate General of Canada's Pacific Command. In 1946, after the war, Oscar was appointed to serve with the War Crimes [investigation] Section for the Far East under Lord Mountbatten. This appointment lasted for fourteen months. In Asia he learned about atrocities against civilians and the maltreatment of Allied military prisoners captured at Hong Kong and Singapore. "Most of the prisoners buried in Yokohama Cemetery died of starvation and cruelty," he recalled. Oscar was Canadian prosecutor of some fifty Japanese war criminals tried at Tokyo. In October 1948 he spoke to the Vancouver Branch of the UELA about his experiences as a prosecutor for war crimes. He had given talks at Branch meetings in 1937.

Back in Vancouver, Co!. Orr was made King's Counsel in 1947 and became a Police Magistrate in 1953. When he retired in 1962, he was chief magistrate in Vancouver and a member of the Police Commission. He revisited Ypres, the scene of his injury, in 1955; despite this wound, he mused "I think I may have preferred being a soldier." Until his death, he lived quietly in the West Point Grey house he had built for

himself in 1926. His wife Marjorie died in 1977. He was surrounded by an extensive library in which Loyalist and military history were well represented. He was an expert on the notorious 1894 trial of Captain Alfred Dreyfus; "I am still in doubt that Dreyfus was not a spy" he observed, "the second court martial, years after the first, still found him guilty and the President of France finally pardoned him." The Orr family papers that he had inherited and other historical documents he had acquired are now in the Archives of Ontario.

The Law Society of British Columbia honoured him with the Judge Begbie Award in 1988. Oscar was already the recipient of the Order of British Columbia and had been made a Freeman of the City of Vancouver. Col. Orr attended Vancouver Branch May luncheons in the late 1980s and was at the 29th Battalion reunion in May 1992. On his one hundredth birthday he received congratulations from the Queen, Governor General, and Prime Minister as well as from family and friends. When interviewed by a newspaper reported in July 1992, Oscar said that he had no secret formula for a long life: "I just go from day to day. I don't worry about anything. I enjoy my memories here; I sit in my window and look out at the bay, the yachts and the garden and recall my boys growing up there."

LCol. Oscar Orr is survived by his son Oscar F. Orr and daughter-in-law Ethel as well as by three granddaughters Carole, Denise, Candace and two great granddaughters who live in Alberta. Col. Orr was a source of pride to all of us.

From Vancouver's Archives... Rev. Dr. U.R. Trumpour, UE, Vancouver Branch President from 1937-39

Of United Empire Loyalist stock, Harry Ralph Trumpour was born in Napanee, Ontario in 1879. He graduated from the University of Toronto with first class honours in Classics in 1900 and was granted an M.A four years later. His theological course in Wycliffe College, Toronto, was equally distinguished. By ordination he spent two years as tutor at Wycliffe and assistant curate of the Church of the Redeemer, after which he became headmaster of Rothesay Boys' School, New Brunswick. Mr. Trumpour, in 1908, was appointed rector of All Saints', Peterborough, Ontario.

In 1911 he married Miss Helen Frink and came west to Vancouver, as Professor of New Testament in the new College. He held the post until his retirement in May, 1947 Dr. Trumpour's knowledge of New Testament Greek was profound, there were few his equal as a student of writings of the early fathers of the Church. He was often in demand as a teacher and speaker. For two years he served as President of the Vancouver Branch of the UELAC

In 1912 he organized an Anglican congregation in West Point Grey and in the following year became the first rector of the new parish of St. Helen's. In 1933, in recognition of his work, the Union College of British Columbia conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity.

For many years college students from both institutions attended his lectures. Wycliffe similarly honoured him in 1937. Dr. Trumpour was also a member of the Leonard Foundation and represented the College on the General Synod Board of Examiners for degrees in divinity.

He retired from the College in 1947 and died in November of that year, after a short illness.

1994 Spring

The Annual Banquet in May was at the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club. All savoured a delicious meal and enjoyed listening to speaker Archie Miller on "Conditions and Experiences of Travelling on the Fraser River, 1850-1880." Archie is Curator of New Westminster's historic "Irving House Museum" which overlooks Simon Fraser's mighty river. A Christmas Tea at the home of Rebecca and Robert Fraser

closed out the year. It was a congenial occasion where members had a chance to visit and wish each other a Happy Holiday.

It has been a busy year for the Vancouver Branch, especially with the organization for Convention 94 - "Loyalists from Sea to Sea," - coordinated with the Chilliwack and Victoria branches. Our monthly meetings have been innovative and interesting, with members as well as guests speakers. Programs of great interest and variety were presented.

Dick Mackey recounted his travels researching his Palatine (German) ancestors in the United States and Canada. Their movements from Germany to North America by way of many European countries are very well recorded.

Barbara Rogers, a member of the B.C. Genealogy Society, presented a informative talk on her research into the Haldimand Papers. With much persistence and hard work source material was found, and subsequently a great wealth of information was uncovered. We are fortunate to be able to take advantage of Barbara's guidance.

Marjorie Gibb spoke of her family and its connection with the history of the Gaspé Peninsula. Marjorie outlined the geographic aspects of the peninsula, different towns and their historic interest, the arrival of the Loyalists, and referred to some of the notable people of the Gaspé who were well known figures in Canadian history.

Rebecca Fraser introduced her Ancestor Ephraim Jones and her Loyalist family, as well another branch of the family which goes back to 16th century France. She related the story of one family artifact called the 'Jones Shovel.' This shovel, designed by Ephraim Jones, was still in use during the construction of Canada's trans-continental railway.

Ann Corcoran, a local publisher, spoke on the subject of self-publishing. This was very informative and of great interest to those who would like to publish their family histories.

Vona Smith spoke on the value of carefully studying all available records. Researching family histories, health records, death certificates, etc., can give great insight into various conditions or diseases which might have a connection with, or give an understanding of, the health of past and present descendants. Several book nights were organized by Vona Smith and Joan Fishleigh, where we discussed resource material. On another occasion they gave us a demonstration of costumes for 'Convention 94' and suggestions of how they could be made.

A memorable way to celebrate the 1994 Victoria Day Weekend would be to attend Convention 94, and B.C. members are looking forward to greeting members from the rest of Canada. An exciting program is planned, and several unique locations have been arranged for the social occasions.

1994 Fall

After registration for the 1994 Convention, a reception was held at the Vancouver Museum where a Parks Canada exhibit "The Loyalists" was on display.
