In later October our Membership chairperson, Glenn Smith UE sent a message to the executive members saying; "I want to share with you a poem that my Brother wrote this morning." Glenn went on to say that over the course of the past 18 months he has shared his research findings with brother Greg who took a keen interest. Greg lives in the Ottawa area and he has been able to confirm many of Glenn's findings by visiting cemeteries near where he lives and locating many of their Loyalist ancestor's burial sites. Greg took the photograph of the headstones.

Shortly before Glenn became a member of the Vancouver Branch he and wife, along with one of his 3 brothers and wife, travelled extensively throughout the Upper Canada area as well as upstate New York. At that time their strong Loyalist ties through their mother's side of the family were still

unknown to them.

Glenn has since proven his two Hanes ancestors and he and our Branch Genealogist are working on 5 more connections including cousin Colonel John Crysler UEL (1768-1852) and the Hartle Loyalists - which means Linda and Glenn also have a cousin connection!

Greg Smith lives in Russell Township in the United Counties of Prescott and Russell, Ontario

He gave permission for his poem to be published. It was his first attempt at storytelling.

Glenn was also willing to share a lovely family photo from 1966 as well as a recent photo of the four brothers.

Quaker Descendants

Like many others you may feel confused by the terms Quakers, Separatists, Puritans and Mayflower descendants. Vancouver Branch member Janet White UE has done a lot of Quaker and Mayflower genealogy. Her Loyalist ancestors, the John CARL family, were Quakers. John fought with Butler's Rangers. As Janet exclaims: "What on earth was a pacifist doing in a Regiment?" Someone nicely explained to her that he probably worked in the Stores. Lucky for Janet and other researches the Quakers kept wonderful records.

She mentioned in her email messages to the editor that they did not believe in headstones for graves. Names and dates were placed on the headstones in their new Friends Cemetery in Pelham, within the Niagara region near the city of Welland, when they moved bodies from the CARL, MISENER, BALL (UEL) Cemetery in Port Robinson, Ontario to make way for the first Welland Canal.

She said that the only whole stone left in the old Cemetery is a big one, about six feet long...for Barbara BENDER, wife of Leonard MISENER, with info on it about their trip up to Canada from New Jersey with their cattle. Although this old cemetery was on John CARL's land, his and his wife's bodies had to be moved as the new canal cut through his land. Many of the 75 bodies had to be moved.


Mayflower Descendants

Janet was in Plymouth in 2019, on a bike trip down the Eastern seaboard, and was VERY touched with the whole atmosphere there. She has found eight people from the MAYFLOWER that managed to survive and become her ancestors. She has proofs for all except one who died at sea... Her MAYFLOWER ancestors are:

1. **John HOWLAND** (born in Fenstanton, Huntingdonshire England); died 23 Feb. 1672/3 in Barnstable Co., Plymouth) who married (25 March 1623 in Plymouth, Barnstable Co. 2. **Elizabeth TILLEY** (born 30 Aug. 1607, Henlow, Bedfordshire, England and died 21 Dec. 1587, Bristol, MASS [now East Providence, Rhode Island.])

- 3.**John TILLEY** (born bef. 19 Dec 1571, in Henlow, Bedfordshire, England and died between 06 Dec 1620/1621, the first winter, in Plymouth Colony) and
- 4.**Joan Hurst ROGERS** (Elizabeth's parents) who was born before 13 March 1567/68, in Henlow, Bedfordshire, England and died in the winter between 1620/1621, Plymouth Colony)
- 5. **Stephen HOPKINS** (30 May 1581 in Upper Clatford, Hampshire, England Betw. 06 June and 17 July 1644, Plymouth MASS) who married (19 Feb 1617/18 in St. Mary Matfelon, Whitechapel, London, Middlesex, England
- 6. Elizabeth FISHER, born abt. 1585 in England and died between 1639 and 1644. Their daughter was Damaris II HOPKINS (born May 1628 in Plymouth, MASS and died before Nov. 1669). She married the son of Hester MAHIEU [a French Walloon, born in Canterbury, Kent; died 08 June, 1666 in [Burial Hill], Plymouth who was married 20 Jan 1603, in the French Walloon Church (Protestant) in Leiden, Holland to 7.Francis COOKE (with their son, the only three of my ancestors coming from Leiden). Francis' picture is in the Leiden MAYFLOWER Museum.

Their son Jacob COOKE, Sr. (born 18 Jan1647 in South Leiden, Holland - died before Nov. 1669) married (after 10 June 1646 in Plymouth) Damarius II (see above)

8. **Edward Planter DOTY** (14 May 1598 England - 23 August 1655 Plymouth, MASS) married (09 Jan 1634/35) Faith CLARKE (06 Jan 1618, Ipswich, Suffolk, England -21 Dec 1675(Winslow Cemetery, Marshfield, Plymouth Co., MASS)

The tree continues to grow for Janet and her family. She would be happy to hear from anyone with Mayflower connections.



Retirements from the Scholarship Committee

Vancouver is one of the UELAC branches that have made an annual commitment to scholarship through branch donations. In 2020 these branches also include Assiniboine, Bicentennial, Colonel John Butler (Niagara), Governor Simcoe, Grand River, Kawartha, and New Brunswick.



Vancouver Branch involvement in the UELAC Scholarship program has a long history. In her report to the October 2020 Board of Director's meeting Chair of the Scholarship Committee, **Bonnie Schepers UE** wrote: "This year **Peter Moogk UE**, Vancouver retired as a member of the committee. His insight and experience will be missed. Since 2010 the UELAC scholarship program benefited from his academic expertise and extensive knowledge of Loyalist history. We extend our thanks for Peter's contributions and wish him well."

Bonnie is also retiring as Chair of the scholarship committee effective December 31, 2020. She took on the role of committee chair in 2015 at the end of her term as Dominion President. Five years later we have seen the establishment of a growing scholarship program.

When Bonnie took on leadership of the scholarship committee there was just over \$200 in the scholarship fund. In the past five years we have raised over \$59,000.00 in donations to scholarship and established the **Scholarship Endowment Fund** ensuring future growth. We have also seen a growing rapport with the students supported by UELAC. It is a winning combination for our Association.
