## Military Muster in Commemoration of the War of 1812

The gold embossed invitation to a Military Muster clearly set the tone for a commemoration of the War of 1812 in the presence of the Prime Minister and Their Royal Highnesses, The Prince of Wales and the Duchess of Cornwall.

As explained in the programme, " a 'muster' is a general term for collecting soldiers or sailors together, and in this case, the only one that could describe the unique and spectacular array of regiments, both regular and reserve, represented at this event. Collected on the parade square of Fort York Armoury will be three bodies of troops, the largest being the Guard of Honour comprising



soldiers of regiments whose Colonel-in Chief is His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales or Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Cornwall.....Accompanying the guard will be a formation of soldiers from regiments that perpetuate the tradition of militia units called out on active service during the War of 1812, to whom the CDS awarded the Honourary Distinction DEFENCE OF CANADA – 1812-1815 – DÉFENSE DU CANADA. The third formation will be representatives of First Nations and Metis communities; in 1812 these nations were an essential part of the British alliance that defended Canada."



Prior to the arrival of the Their Royal Highnesses, there was a musical presentation by a composite band of the Canadian Armed Forces which in turn preceded the positioning of the <u>Guard of Honour</u>, representatives of First Nations' and Métis communities and the 1812 Regiments.

Following the Royal Salute, Prince Charles, accompanied by Chief of the Defence Staff General Walter Natynczyk and Minister of National Defence Peter MacKay, inspected the Guard of Honour, stopping to chat with individual members along both lines.

Information has been provided regarding the Commemorative medal, Commemorative banner, the five snare drums, the First Nations and Métis communities with a heritage linked to the War of 1812, Current Canadian Army Units to Perpetuate War of 1812 Militia Formations, Regiments linked to War of 1812 Fencible Units recruited in North America and the ceremony itself.



There followed the National Anthem, Royal Salute and the March Past. The Official Party then departed at the far end of the Armoury, retiring to a brief reception in the Officer's Mess.

A small gathering lingered outside the main entrance in anticipation of the departure of the Royal Couple.
