

Kathryn Idell Pettes Crandall who turns 100 years young next March, has been nominated for her personal contributions and those on behalf of the Pettes family -- one of the founding families of the Village of Knowlton -- to the development and growth of a vibrant social and economic life in the Eastern Townships. The Pettes Memorial Library was the first free-lending rural English library in Quebec; it is sill in operation and remains a cultural and architectural landmark.



A life member -- past board member and Honorary Trustee -of the Brome County Historical Society since 1977, Kathryn has always taken an active interest in preserving both family and local history. Her remarkable memory makes her the "go to" person for historical details, often called upon to identify people and landmarks in old photographs, which she accompanies with rich anecdotal information.

Kathryn's community involvement includes decades of activity with the St. Paul's Anglican Church Ladies Evening Guild, I.O. D.E. and the Anglican Church women as well as extensive volunteering at church teas, bake sales, rummage sales, and church luncheons and dinners where her lemon bread is legendary.



A former teacher at Heroes Elementary School in Cowansville, **Mary Lachasseur** is a familiar face in the volunteer circle and is "known for showing love and devotion in all that she does." She has been a member of the Stephen Lewis "Township Grandmothers", Optimist Club, and Canadian Club.


