morning ended on a positive note as everyone had the opportunity to openly share their concerns and offer suggestions.

We seized the day by visiting the Legislative Grounds where I hugged a tree - the Bur Oak planted in a joint project by Edmonton and Calgary Branch members to commemorate the visit of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in 2005 and celebrate Alberta's 100th anniversary as a province.
