Trip to the Grand River Branch: 19 May 2013



Grand River Web Master and UELAC Central West Regional Councillor, David Kanowakeron Hill Morrison UE, presented his latest version of a pamphlet describing the heritage of the Branch and how the Loyalists came from all walks of life, united under the belief that Monarchy is the best policy. He also described how to search for one's Loyalist roots and how the Loyal Haudenosaunee, having lost their traditional homelands to the Americans, migrated with their fellow-Loyalists to the relative safety of Upper Canada at a tract of land along the Grand River so that today the Six Nations of the Grand River is Canada's largest Native community. Grand River is honoured to include descendants of those unique Loyalists among its membership.

Many stayed for the hot buffet dinner following the meeting.

It has been a pleasure working with the members of the Grand River Branch at both the Branch and National level as so many members are active supporters of current events in the Grand River area.
