Where in Canada has there been a graveyard tour exclusively about United Empire Loyalists for over ten years? One answer is in Weymouth North, Nova Scotia at historic St. Peter's Anglican Church and Cemetery which is located on land donated by renowned United Empire Loyalists Lieut. Col. James Moody and his wife Jane. He had been an Officer in the New Jersey Volunteers.

Retired school teacher Roberta Journeav has provided a tour of the cemetery which is preceded by a presentation about the United Empire Loyalists who founded the community when they arrived after the American Revolution. She started doing this in 2008 with the support of local Anglican Church Minister Reverend Donald Ruggles. He himself was descended from General Timothy Ruggles, a United Empire Loyalist refugee from Massachusetts.

On August 25, 2021, I attended the presentation and tour. Here are three photos taken, as well as a link (above) to a video with Roberta Journeay, inside St. Peter's Church. One of the photos shows an impressive altar chair inside the church donated in memory of Col. James Moody. A second photo is of a few of the headstones in the church yard, and the third is with Roberta Journeay, presenting her with a copy of my book "Loyalist Cemeteries of Nova Scotia: Annapolis & Digby Counties".

Old St. Edward's Church & the Loyalists



On the Bookshelf:

"Old St. Edward's Church & the Loyalists" is the first book to tell the history of one of the few remaining Loyalist churches in Nova Scotia by using primary sources as well as colour photographs. The Church was completed in 1795 and consecrated by Bishop Charles Inglis in 1797. The book is dedicated to the memory of Adrian Ruggles Potter, a descendant of General Timothy Ruggles, renowned Loyalist leader from Massachusetts who settled near Wilmot, Nova Scotia. Adrian was proud of his Loyalist heritage and was a former curate of the Church.

In September 2016 he provided a tour to the Nova Scotia Branch of the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada, and his photo, along with others taken inside the Church with its museum are included.

The Loyalists of New York Province

Todd W. Braisted's recorded presentation to Gov. Simcoe Branch was played for the Vancouver Branch meeting on September 28th. Mr. Braisted joined the branch online from New Jersey, USA to say hello ahead of the video.

At the time of the American Revolution, New York was one of the most heavily populated colonies in America. Then, as now, it had a diverse population, ethnically, racially and politically.

It also provided more soldiers for the British Army than any other colony, making New York's battles a true civil war. Mr. Braisted examined the roles of New York's Loyalists in their attempts to subdue their rebellious countrymen and their fate at the end of the war.

Todd Braisted is an author and researcher of Loyalist military studies. His primary focus is on Loyalist military personnel, infrastructure and campaigns throughout North America. Since 1979, Braisted has amassed and transcribed over 40,000 pages of Loyalist and related material from archives and private collections around the world. He has authored numerous journal articles and books, as well as appearing as a guest historian on episodes of Who Do You Think You Are? (CBC) and History Detectives (PBS). He is the creator of royalprovincial.com, the largest website dedicated to

Loyalist military studies. Braisted is a Fellow in the Company of Military Historians and a past-president of the Bergen County Historical Society.

The King's Colour: A Broadside of Early Upper Canada

Introducing "The King's Colour: A Broadside of Early Upper Canada" a micro-periodical that explores historical aspects of the colony that later became the Province of Ontario. Military, settlement, and the early development of the region are its main themes.

Published as a two-page, monthly broadside, free of charge, "The King's Colour" mimics the aesthetic style of early colonial printings. Each issue contains a single article, embellished with period illustrations, that addresses a narrow topic. Supported by primary and secondary sources, the articles delve deeply into the subject matter.

The inaugural issue has been published. It contains the article titled "Beehives and Honeycombs: The Canadian Secret Weapons of 1813."

In the late autumn of 1813, partway through that war, the largest antebellum army formed by the United States began its descent down the mighty St. Lawrence River, eastward from Lake Ontario. The specific objective of their invasion of British Canada was Montréal. Little did they know that their Canadian adversaries were about to deploy secret weapons to retard their progress: beehives and honeycombs. Stuart Manson UE

I had the privilege of being invited to speak to a meeting of the St. John Branch of the NBGS on Wednesday, September 29th at 7:00 pm Atlantic time. The topic they requested was "Proving your descent from a Loyalist".

As all my loyalist connections are from New Brunswick, I was pleased to be asked and to explain the process required and the need for primary documentation. Where primary

documents can't be found use the Genealogy Proof Argument to make your case. My Loyalist application example for Captain William Hutchinson UE included a Genealogical Proof Argument. This document made my connection to the next generation. As in this case, it is often the son or daughter of the loyalist connection that is the most difficult to link. Both New Brunswick and Nova Scotia can present difficulties when searching for records, but there are many helpful resources available, and lots of keen people to offer help. Attendees were encouraged to join the local branch of the UELAC, and a membership application was included with the handouts.

The following page represents the GPA to link my 3rd Great Grandmother to my 4th Great Grandfather. Thank you to the NBGS for having me. I really enjoyed being with you all. Such a great group and I got to see a distant cousin that I met in New Brunswick for the first time in July of 2016 when I was on my way to the conference in P.E.I.

GPA continued on the next page:

Agnes Hutchinson is my 3rd Great Grandparent, and this is how I connected her to both her husband and her father. The actual GPA submitted was five pages to explain each item chosen and where the information was obtained. This is just the recap of those items.

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GPA to show the relationship between Agnes Hutchinson as the wife of George A. Morton and the daughter of Capt. William Hutchinson Loyalist.

- 1. Arrivals 99: First Families of New Brunswick name Agnes Hutchinson as both the wife of George Morton and the daughter of William Hutchinson.
- 2. Information from Robert Mutrie's compilation "Hutchinson of Walsingham Township", confirms the name of William Hutchinson's surviving daughter as Agnes.
- 3. Daniel F. Johnson Newspaper Vital Statistics from the Provincial Archives announces the 1839 death of Agnes Morton names her the wife of George Morton and the daughter of Capt. Wm. Hutchinson.
 - 4. Gravestone from the Pioneer Cemetery in Penobsquis, NB. of Agnes Morton names her as the wife of Capt. G. Morton.
- 5. Personal family records of Butler Hutchinson Morton, grandson of George and Agnes Morton including family bible, papers and letters say that Agnes is the wife of Geo. Morton.

CONCLUSION:

Agnes Hutchinson is the wife of George Morton and the daughter of Capt. William Hutchinson – Loyalist.
