PROCLAMATION

"BC LOYALIST CELEBRATION AND DEDICATION DAY"

WHEREAS	As subjects in the new British Colony who had originally settled in the American Thirteen Colonies and maintained loyalty to King George III, that these settlers called "United Empire Loyalists" are considered Canada's first political refugees; and
WHEREAS	That on September 9, 1789, then Quebec Governor, Lord Dorchester issued an Order in Council that gove recognition to Loyalists and their Descendants forever, allowing them to afflix the initials "L.E." after their surnames in recognition of those who adhered to "the Unity of the Empire" and
WHEREAS	Descendants of Nova Scotia's Black Loyalists as allies to the British during the American Revolution became free men and women: their descendants migrated and settled on Salt Spring Island and the Victoria Colony, and
WHEREAS	The Victoria Branch members wish to convey their recognition of the contributions of the eastern Indigenous Six Nations as allies to the Crown during the American Revolution: and
WHEREAS	The Victoria Branch of the UELAC was established in 1927 and as the first branch established west of Ontario will celebrate its centennial in 2027: and
WHEREAS	July 22, 1793 is the date when sums of United Empire Loyalists Alexander Mackenzie and his lieutenant Alexander Mackay completed the first crossing of the continent by Europeans north of Mexico; and
WHEREAS	Our Lieutenant Governor in 2002, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, proclaimed that July 22nd shall be known as "Loyalist Day" in the Province of British Columbia; and
WHEREAS	That said Victoria Branch members wish to convey the significance, as descendants, of their loyalist history: that they be recognized as 'STEWARDS' of their ancestral heritage, and
WHEREAS	The Victoria UELAC Branch members wish to recognize that many Vancouver Islanders are descendents of the first Loyalist arriving in Canada in 1783 following the American Revolution; and
WHEREAS	The Victoria UELAC have identified that at least 1% of the approximate 30,000 buried at Ross Bay Cemetery are descendants of United Empire Loyalists, and
WHEREAS	The Victoria UELAC Branch members wish to bequest and celebrate the new headstone at Ro Bay Cometery in honour of William DeLong, the only known son of a Layalist buried in Britis Columbia.
NOW, THER	REFORE 1 do hereby proclaim Saturday, July 22nd. as "BC LOYALIST CELEBRATION AND DEDICTION DAY" on the HOMELANDS of the Lekwangen People. the SONGHEES NATION AND the ESQUIMALT NATION, in the CITY OF VICTORIA, the CAPITAL CITY of the PROVINCE of BRITISH COLUMBIA.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, 1 hereanto set my hand this 6th day of July. Two Thousand and Twenty-Three.

The "Kings Shilling" was presented as a token of thanks to Glenn Smith UE for all his hard work "volunteering" himself and others at the conference.

professional, volunteer service. Men were not "pressed" nor "sentenced" into the ranks, but were patriotic volunteers looking to serve King and Country and possibly find a little adventure along the way.

Glenn writes: At the beginning of the 2023 UELAC national conference planning process, I accepted a request from the Planning Committee to accept the role of Volunteer Coordinator to 'recruit' a number of UELAC Branch members to volunteer their services to ensure the planned schedule of conference events were delivered as seamlessly as possible.

As with any large event such as the 2023 UELAC conference, unexpected circumstances are sure to present themselves and this conference was no exception.

The Historical Society of Ottawa

Sir Guy Carlton, Lord Dorchester

With permission from The Historical Society of Ottawa, we are pleased to present this item, on why the name "Carlton" appears in so many places in Ottawa.

Sir Guy Carlton, who's declaration recognized the Loyalists commitment and created the title UE "Unity of the Empire" in 1789.



Who was this "Carleton" fellow so much has been named after in the Ottawa area? He was Sir Guy Carleton, a clever pragmatist who left an indelible mark on Canada's

past — and did much to shape the nation we know today . Carleton brought the Loyalists here. The Book of Negroes, that secured the freedom of thousands of former American slaves, was also Carleton's doing.

Before that, Carleton had ensured that the newly conquered habitants of New France would be able to retain their French language, civil law and Catholic religion. The promise to be able to keep the Catholic religion was remarkable during an era when the British (none more so than those in the American colonies) were virulently anti-Catholic. This commitment would contribute to Canada becoming a rare refuge for other Catholics, including the Irish, for many decades to come.

Sir Guy Carleton's many interventions would have numerous consequences for the future of Canada. Sir Guy's name does seem to be everywhere, doesn't it?

Many of us carry birth certificates attesting that we were born in Carleton County. We attended Carleton University or were students of Ottawa-Carleton school boards. The Queensway-Carleton Hospital offers us medical care — and we commute via OC (Ottawa Carleton) Transpo.

In addition to Carleton's other achievements, Sir Guy was injured in battle three times — in war in France, in war in Spain — and helping General Wolfe defeat the French on the Plains of Abraham in 1759.

A decade and a half later, at the commencement of the American Revolution, Carleton directed the defence of Quebec, including defeating Benedict Arnold (who, at the time, was still siding with the Revolution). Carleton was Governor of Quebec from 1768 to 1778 and 1785 to 1795 and Governor General of British North America from 1782 to 1783 — and he was famously incorruptible.

It was Carleton's recommendations that led to the Quebec Act's protection of French-Canadians' rights to their language, Catholic religion and code of civil law. (This may have actually helped precipitate the start of the American Revolution. In 1774, the members of the First Continental Congress were out-raged — bitterly denouncing the Quebec Act as promoting Catholicism, particularly perturbed that Catholics could now hold civil service positions.)

As British Commander-in-Chief at the conclusion of the American Revolution, it was Carleton who, seeing how Loyalists were being abused by their victors, made arrangements for land (with provisions) to be set aside for the them in what would later become Canada.

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As well, Carleton angered George Washington by insisting that former slaves who had sided with the British, not be returned to their "masters", but rather be granted their freedom and allowed to leave for new homes in Nova Scotia. Carleton directed the creation of a "Book of Negroes" where the names of the departing former slaves would be recorded, allowing the British to pay their former "owners" compensation in return. (It would seem that few accurate names were provided and little or no compensation was ever paid.)

Sir Guy Carleton had an immense influence on our nation's history. Carleton's initiatives after the fall of New France kept Quebec (and ultimately Canada) within the British Empire. (Not on Britain's terms, but those of the Québécois.)

Distrusting the rumblings of revolt emanating from the Thirteen Colonies, Carleton preferred the orderliness of the existing semi-feudal society he found in Quebec.

Carleton, in fact, pushed directly against his King's Proclamation of 1763 which had insisted on the use of English law, abolished the Catholic church, and promised an elected legislature, after the British model. In Carleton's mind, the best way to retain the loyalty of the Québécois was to let them live their lives their own way. He feared that an elected assembly would tilt power to the English minority to dominate the French-speaking majority.

Carleton had never been a favourite of King George III, but despite that had made his way through other strong connections. Carleton could be high-minded, autocratic and aloof. Sir Guy cared little for democracy. And of all those for whom Carleton advocated - North America's Indigenous peoples seem not to have been included.



Sir Guy Carleton's influence on our history (and our present) is, however, undeniable.
