

Treasurer's Report

We have budgeted \$6000 for contributions to education and to Loyalist building restorations in 2021.

Here are some of the highlights:

• We have given a grant to a Trent University graduate student (MA program) who is investigating computer software that will digitize genealogical materials so that it is available for use without handling.

- ♦ Victoria Cartwright has received half of a \$1,500 grant so far this year. She will use this software to study early Ontario Loyalist settlement history. Final payment will be made by year-end 2021.
- ♦ We have given \$2,000 to Fleming College to award four \$500 bursaries (2 to needy students) and awards (2 to students showing academic excellence) in the Museum Curator and Conservation Programs. Two were awarded in June at Fleming's virtual Convocation and two more will be awarded in September.
- ♦ We have given \$1,000 to the Old Hay Bay Church Restoration Fund, for the 3rd year, as they near their \$300,000 restoration funding goal. Regular reports can be found on line.
- ♦ We have given \$500 to the Friends of St. Albans Church in Adolphustown, ON, as they restore this 130 year-old former Anglican Church that was built by Loyalists in the 1890's. As the "Friend's of St. Alban's" non-profit organization plans their restoration needs and fundraising goals, we will be contributing to their Restoration Fund in future years.
- ♦ We have purchased, for \$400, two additional storyboards, to add to our present four, recognizing and paying tribute to Black and Indigenous Loyalists who came to Canada in the late 1700's along with other Loyalists escaping from the American Revolution. These storyboards are on display at all of our in-person regular meetings and at Heritage Fairs we attend.
- We will be giving \$1,000 to the UELAC Scholarship Endowment Fund later this year when the goals and timing are set.

If any of our Members see other education or restoration projects that you think might need funding, please bring your ideas forward to any Executive Board Member and we will investigate.


In the 18th century, just as it is today, the uniform a soldier wore conveyed the nationality, regiment, rank and years of service of the soldier, and set him apart from the ordinary people of his community.

Today, in order to make an authentic uniform of an 18th century soldier, consideration must be given to the colour, style, silhouette, and decoration of the uniform.









Rather than highlighting a Loyalist from our Branch in this issue, here instead is an article about Troy Easter UE:

Troy Easter UE is a very busy man! He left his job with the railroad to join his wife's family in the agricultural business in Trent Hills, Ontario.

The family has an organic milking farm, milking 165 cattle, along with growing crops.

When Troy gets some time off from his farming chores, he can be found at the Stone's Cemetery, south of Warkworth, Ontario, cleaning tombstones of strangers.

He first visited the cemetery to look for his wife's ancestor, David Glover, after he became interested in genealogy.

This wasn't as straight forward as he expected. A lot of the grave markers were unreadable. Time had covered these neglected markers with dirt, moss, and lichen.

Troy decided he would make it his special project to find out how to clean off these markers.

He contacted the Arlington National Military Cemetery in the United States to inquire how to clean these markers without damaging them. After receiving instructions from Arlington, Troy, armed with his cleaning supplies, headed to the cemetery to start his quest of restoring the markers so that they could be read.

While cleaning stones, he came across a unique marker: the tombstone of Michael Cryderman UE.

The marker reads

"Michael Cryderman, UEL,

1757-1837", and

"Jacob Cryderman"

1787-1867".



This is the only marker containing the inscription "UEL" in this graveyard.

However, this cemetery does contain the graves of Loyalist descendants such as Skinkle, Gerow, Babcock, and Wannamaker.

Michael Cryderman UE is a proven Loyalist. He served in the Royal Regiment of New York and married Mary Hicks, daughter of the Loyalist, Edward Hicks UE, who served in Butler's Rangers.

Troy Easter is the descendant of Joachim Barkley UE, Butler's Rangers, has submitted his application of proof and is awaiting his certificate.

Troy is a Member of the St. Lawrence Branch and has recently affiliated with Kawartha Branch.

Important Reminder of Dues

In November 2021, it will be time to renew your membership in Kawartha Branch and the UELAC.

Our Branch Constitution and By-laws state:

AR-16.06

The Treasurer shall, upon receipt of membership dues, provide a membership card of the year to each member the Branch and shall maintain records of the Branch membership in consultation with the Branch Genealogist and Branch Membership Chairperson. These up-to-date membership lists will be made available for distribution to the Executive upon request, with copies being supplied to the Branch Genealogist, Branch Membership Chairperson and the Branch Newsletter Editor.

AR-16.07 The Treasurer shall work with the Membership Chairperson who will record payments electronically using civiCRM. He or she will pay all appropriate per-capita dues to the UELAC on an annual basis by 01 February. Using data from all sources, he or she will complete the Membership form, as well as *The Loyalist Gazette* choice of paper or e-copy,

The Loyalist Gazette choice of paper or e-copy, and submit these to the UELAC for the up-to-date Branch Membership records.

The fee structure is such that the per capita fee to the UELAC is \$40 plus \$10 to the Branch for a single person: total \$50. For a family (two or more related people) the per capita fee to the UELAC is \$55 plus \$10 per family member for the Branch. Remember, the Branch Fee is still \$10 for each and every person. Dual Branch membership fees, if registered in another Branch, are \$10 at Kawartha Branch as your "home" Branch will have paid the per capita fee to Dominion Office. Per capita dues paid after July 1 are half the annual rate, i.e. \$20 for a single membership and \$27.50 for family membership.

Did you know ???

Five UELAC Branches: Bicentennial, Kawartha, Kingston, Sir John Johnson Centennial and St. Lawrence, received a bequest from the estate of the late E. John Chard UE.

As a tribute to John, plans were underway, before COVID-19, to unveil a plaque in his honour in the Spring of 2020 at the UELAC Heritage Centre, located on the scenic shores of the Bay of Quinte, along the Loyalist Parkway, Highway No. 33, in the historic village of Adolphustown, Ontario.

This unveiling event will be re-scheduled and representatives of all five Branches will be present for the unveiling ceremony, with press coverage. The plaque, on brass with a walnut background, has been created by a local engraving company here in Peterborough.





It states:

E. John Chard UE, B.A., M.Ed. 18 July 1922 – 17 May 2013

E. John Chard UE, B.A., M.Ed., was a life-long resident of Stirling, Ontario. Son of Harriet and Clarence Chard, he was raised on a farm in Sidney Township and completed his education at the University of Toronto.

His interest in promoting Loyalist history began before World War Two and continued to develop as he and his father attended the Bay of Quinte UELAC Branch meetings. John went on to become President of this Branch and then Dominion President in 1967. Seeing the need for communication among the few existing Branches of the United Empire Loyalists' Association, he began, largely at his own expense, to edit and publish *The Loyalist Gazette* in April 1963. He did, in his own words, quite a lot to start the Adolphustown Park Museum before leaving to teach in Ottawa. While there, he initiated and supported the Sir Guy Carleton Branch (1962) for three years before moving to Pickering to teach high school physics.

John had the gift of vision as he seemed to know intuitively how to promote the national Association and increase the extent of branches across Canada. John worked tirelessly to establish sixteen branches out of a total of twenty-eight in the years between 1956 and 1984. John also became the Patron of both Kawartha and Sir John Johnson Branches until his death on 17 May, 2013, age 90 years, 10 months.

In 1969, John contacted Sir Conrad Swan, York Herald of Arms-in-Ordinary to Her Majesty the Queen, to formally design the official Armorial Bearings that were granted in 1972.

With a large donation from Colonel R.S. McLaughlin, of Oshawa, a national headquarters was established in Toronto. Here he turned his attention to acquiring exceptionally informative books about Loyalist history, family lineages, and military events. Working with universities, he shared his knowledge and enthusiasm with all the branches across Canada from sea to sea and collected articles from history professors in many universities to share with the public.

This plaque is donated by: Bicentennial, Kawartha, Kingston, Sir John Johnson Centennial and St. Lawrence Branches of the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada.

This tribute is placed here to honour this unassuming academic visionary who did so much to promote a Canada-wide distribution of Branches and resources, headquarters and Armorial Bearings, lending library and national magazine: a major accomplishment for a special man, E. John Chard UE, B.A., M.Ed.

1934 NEW BRUNSWICK LOYALIST COMMEMORATIVE STAMP

This stamp was issued for the 150th anniversary of the founding of the province of New Brunswick, by King George III. New Brunswick was part of Nova Scotia until separation in 1784. New Brunswick was being mainly inhabited by the new Loyalist immigrants expelled from America after the American Revolution.

The stamp was issued on 16 August 1934 with 5,050,000 issued.

The face value of the stamp was two cents.

The stamp depicts The Great Seal of New Brunswick with the letters patent on 21 February 1785. The design shows a ship sailing down the St. John River. On the borders, are the new settlements, with lofty pines lining both sides of the river, the pines representing the wood that would be used for the shipping industry.

The Latin inscription reads "Sigil Provincia Nov Bruns", that translates into "The Seal of New Brunswick". The motto in Latin "Spem Reduxit" translates into

"It Brings Back Hope", that relates to the circumstances the Loyalists faced when having to flee their native country.

The value of the stamp ranges from \$2.00 to \$460.00 depending on the condition and current demand.




WHAT'S NEW IN MEMBERSHIP AT KAWARTHA BRANCH UELAC

"Peterborough's Pathway of Fame announces 2021 inductees







VIEWS IN AND AROUND KAWARTHA BRANCH

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, all of our planned meetings and events were cancelled, except for our 20 September meeting that was held at the farm of Grietje and Bob McBride, to celebrate the retirement of Joan Lucas UE, our Branch Genealogist for the past thirty-two years.



Bob Ough was the guest speaker at the virtual ZOOM meeting on Sunday, 21 February 2021, his topic being "The 1962 Cuban Missile Crisis: RCAF's unheralded FINEST HOUR."

Graham Hart UE introduced his good friend, Bob Ough, a Peterborough native who was a helicopter pilot with the RCAF working in the north. At the time of the Cuban Missile Crisis in 1962, he and his fellow-pilots played a significant role in the response from Canada. Mr. Ough is honoured to be remembered on the Peterborough Pathway of Fame.

Mr. Ough explained the Crisis took place from mid-October until the end of the month in 1962. The Soviets and Cuba were placing nuclear arms for the potential for a nuclear war. NATO countries, including Italy, Turkey, and Canada, were working to end this.

Mr Ough and his team flew observation flights. The Crisis came to a head on 22 October 1962 when President Kennedy moved to have the missiles removed from Cuba and, by 20 November 1962, all missiles were gone. Mr. Ough pointed that the








Canadian participation should not be downplayed.

Grietje McBride thanked Mr. Ough for his insight that put the event into perspective for those who lived through it and might not have realized the significance of the events.

UNITED EMPIRE LOVALISTS MEMORIAL CHUIICH, ADOLPHUSTOWN ONT.

The Gothic Revival limestone church was built with the patronage of Loyalist descendants, who commissioned tiles memorializing their Loyalists families.

The commemorative tiles, the elaborate stained-glass windows, and the handcrafted interior woodwork all contribute to the architectural and historical significance of this rural church.





The fall of 2018 saw the closing of St. Alban's as an Anglican Church. The Friends of St. Alban's, a not-for-profit charity,

has been established to preserve this significant heritage site.



FRIENDS OF ST. ALBAN'S ADOLPHUSTOWN

Bill Russell introduced the speakers.

Mr. Thesberg outlined the goals of the Friends: "To transform the former St. Alban's Church into a vibrant community hub while continuing to preserve, commemorate and

celebrate its unique heritage." This group is a non-profit registered charity who currently lease the property from the Anglican Diocese of Ontario with the goal of purchasing the property. Major repairs and restorations are being carried out. Diane Berlet, with accompanying slides by Jane Lovell, outlined the history of the area and the church. The first Loyalists landed in the area on 16 June 1784. They began a settlement and, in due course, built the first church in 1822. After some years the current rector at the time, Rev'd Forneri, felt that there should be a Memorial Church for all Loyalists and began plans to have a neo gothic cathedral building erected, the corner stone being laid on 17 June 1884. The building was completed at a cost of \$8,000.00 that was entirely paid by pledges and subscriptions. The interior features stained glass windows

and inlaid tiles on the walls surrounding the nave featuring names of the original Loyalists. They were made in Stoke-on-Kent, England. The only other place in North America known to feature such tiles are in the Senate Chamber, in Washington, DC.

The group then answered questions.

They explained how they were planning to fund this project and how one might support it. They also outlined things and events that they might plan for the future.

They are hoping to partner with the Hay Bay Church and the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada.

Anyone wishing more information, should contact Bill Russell.

Graham Hart thanked the presenters for the excellent, informative talk. He pointed out that, for him personally, the church ceiling, reminding him of a ship's keel, was very impressive. Graham then, on behalf of the Kawartha Branch UELAC, donated a gift of \$500.00, for their restoration fund.

The world bids adieu to His Royal Highness, The Duke of Edinburgh, Prince Philip

Prince Philip, age 99, was admitted to King Edward VII's hospital in central London, England, on 16 February 2021 after feeling unwell. After being admitted to King Edward VII hospital, Prince Philip

was transferred to St. Bartholomew's hospital for specialist treatment and underwent a heart operation on 03 March.

WE HERE IN KAWARTHA BRANCH UELAC
WERE DEEPLY SADDENED TO HEAR OF THE PASSING
OF PRINCE PHILIP ON 19 April 2021
AND WE EXTEND OUR SINCERE CONDOLENCES
TO HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN AND THE ROYAL FAMILY.

The Duke of Edinburgh was born on the Greek island of Corfu on 10 June 1921, the only son of Prince Andrew of Greece and Princess Alice of Battenberg.

He therefore also held the title Prince of Greece and Denmark.

Prince Philip joined the Royal Navy as a cadet in 1939, following in the footsteps of his grandfather, Prince Louis, who was Admiral of the Fleet and First Sea Lord. He had a long and successful career in the Navy



and rose to the rank of Commander.

He was mentioned in dispatches for his bravery at the Battle of Cape Matapan during the 1941 German invasion of Crete.



Probably the most dramatic aspect of his wartime experiences was his participation in the Battle of Cape Matapan, the relevant portion of which was a night action between units of the British and Italian fleets in 1940.

His battle station was as a midshipman commanding a searchlight on the battleship HMS Valiant. His recollections of this experience, given several decades later in the foreword to a book about the battle, were: "I reported that I had a target in sight and was ordered to 'open shutter'. The beam lit up a stationary cruiser and at this point all hell broke loose, as all our eight 15-inch guns, plus those of the flagship, plus HMS Barham's, started firing at the stationary cruiser, which disappeared in an explosion and a cloud of smoke. I was then ordered to 'train left' and lit up another Italian cruiser, which was given the same treatment."

Philip was mentioned in dispatches for this service and received the Greek Cross of Valour as well.

Later in the war he saw action again during the invasion of Sicily, by which time he was a First Lieutenant aboard the destroyer, HMS Wallace. The ship was attacked at night by German aircraft, and Philip's contribution was to help throw together a decoy, made of smoke floats, an idea he described to one later interviewer as "a frightfully good wheeze" that drew off the enemy attack.

According to one shipmate, Harry Hargreaves, who may have been over-stating the case: "It had been marvellously quick thinking. Prince Philip saved our lives that night. I suppose there would have been a few survivors, but certainly the ship would have been sunk. He was always very courageous and resourceful."

By the end of the war, Philip had been transferred to another destroyer, HMS Whelp, in the Pacific Theatre and was present in Tokyo Bay for the Japanese surrender.









In 1947 Philip renounced his Greek and Danish titles before marrying Princess Elizabeth.

Following the death of her father in 1952, Elizabeth became Queen Elizabeth II.

Prince Philip was also a qualified pilot and was the first member of the Royal Family ever to fly out of Buckingham Palace in a helicopter.

The Duke of Edinburgh was patron or president of some 800 organizations, with special interests in scientific and technological research and development, the encouragement of sport, the welfare of young people, and conservation and the environment.

The news of Prince Philip's death was announced by a statement from Buckingham Palace.

It said: "It is with deep sorrow that Her Majesty The Queen announces the death of her beloved husband.

"The Royal Family join with people around the world in mourning his loss." Boris Johnson said the Duke had "inspired the lives of countless young people".

Following the announcement well-wishers began leaving flowers outside Buckingham Palace in London.

During his life, Prince Philip made more than 70 visits to Canada, including 20 royal tours with Queen Elizabeth II.

Other visits without the Queen occurred in 1960, 1962, 1978, 1979, 1980, and 1998, as he was chairing the Commonwealth Study Conference, hosted in Canada during those years.



My husband, Dr. Richard Staples, has had a lifelong interest in HRH Prince Philip, together with the royal family.

Since 1947, when the Prince, also known as the Duke of Edinburgh, married Queen Elizabeth II, Richard has followed HRH Prince Phillip's pursuits in aviation, the Royal Navy and equestrian activities, especially carriage racing. He has watched many of the Royal Canadian tours and has admired and followed the Prince's initiatives in conservation practices since the early 1970's.

For two years in the 1980's, Richard was on an official Duke of Edinburgh's Awards program committee in Thunder Bay. This committee mentored and encouraged both young men and young women to participate in a demanding challenge of leadership training based on the Duke's own life.

Richard believes that HRH Prince Phillip was an exemplary role model. The Prince Consort had remained completely human throughout the twenty-two thousand, two hundred and nineteen royal appearances that he made during his lifetime.

At a yard sale, a few years ago, Richard had found a large portrait of Prince Phillip dressed in the military dress uniform for the 1952 Coronation.

On the day we learned of Prince Phillip's death, Richard assembled the following display on our front porch, and left it there for the week.

18 to 22 May 1989: Heritage
and Sir John Johnson Centennial Branches
held the United Empire Loyalists' Association

Quebec, where J. Okill Stuart UE,
President of Heritage Branch in Montreal,
(Dominion President, 1994 - 1996),
invited Prince Philip to join him at
the five-day conference, the two having been
classmates, 1936 - 1939, at the Gordonstoun School
in Moray, Scotland, Prince Philip having first attended
the school when he was 15 years old.

Gordonstoun School is a co-educational independent school for boarding and day pupils in Moray, Scotland. It is one of the last remaining full boarding schools in the United Kingdom.
