



The first recorded Christmas tree was erected in Sorel, Lower Canada, in 1781 by Baron Riedeset and his wife, Baroness Riedeset. The Baron served with Burgoyne and after their troops were defeated at Saratoga, the Baron and his wife were taken prisoner. After two years of captivity, they were released in a prisoner exchange and went to Sorel. The Baroness wanted to celebrate their new freedom and ordered a balsam to be cut down and put up in their home. She decorated it with fruit and candles as was the tradition in Germany. This was the first Christmas tree in Canada. In 1981, on the 200th anniversary, Canada Post issued a 15 cent stamp to commemorate the anniversary. So, whether people know it or not, they are celebrating a Loyalist related tradition by putting up a Christmas tree.

Getting on to Loyalist business, the Board will be presented with our new privacy policy in early January 2026 by lawyer, Shane Morganstein, via a ZOOM meeting. We are seeking a location to hold our 2027 UELAC Conference. If any Branch would like to host the Conference, we will assist you with the preparation and finances. Please contact us ASAP.




CROWN LAND SURVEY FOR PETERBOROUGH COUNTY

In 2002 I visited the Crown Land office, then in the Ministry of Natural Resources Building, looking for any records relating to Sons or Daughters of United Empire Loyalists who received land grants in our county.

Settlement began in the townships before the official dates of settlement. The townships of Smith, Otonabee, Dummer, Belmont, Asphodel, and Monaghan were surveyed between 1818 and 1830. Some lots went to Loyalists and their sons and daughters as the lots along waterways in the south were already settled.

These were considered "back townships" and were newly surveyed as more land was needed as Loyalists and their families expanded. Loyalist farms were increased from 100 acres to 200 acres as per the new settlement laws, and as the children of Loyalists became of age to receive government Land Grants of 200 acres.

Not all lands granted were settled on by those who received them. Some were sold or traded for other land, better suited to the owner's situation. Not all records were complete but were copied as they appeared in the Land Grant records.



Samuel L. Wilmot was the Crown Surveyor in Peterborough County in 1817-18, and surveyed the Township of Smith that included Harvey at that time. His records show 37 lots laid out on 30 June 1818. The survey shows the name, the lot, concession and acreage and the designation as to how these land grants were awarded. The information was by lot and concession, and was not in alphabetical order.

There were other land grants surveyed by Sam Wilmot but not recorded until Richard Birdsall copied them in 1830. They appear at the end of this article.

The township of Monaghan was surveyed in 1818, probably by Sam Wilmot but not so recorded.

Also of interest in Monaghan was land granted to Sir Isaac Brock and Representatives, a large tract of land: lots 3-11, con 1, and the broken front, also lots 16, 17, 18, 19 in con 2 and 3.

There were also many lots granted to the King's College. It's a mystery what became of them.


If any of you are related to any of these UE ancestors, you will need to see and copy the original Petitions for Land Grants in the Ontario Archives. Land was granted by Orders in Council, by Fiats and by Warrants so you will need to look in all these sections.

You may also look in the Peterborough County land records knowing the township, lot and concession number for a detailed ownership of a known lot, including wills kept on file. Ask for the Abstract Land Records of a given township that contain the earliest settlement records.

To find a will look for a small "w" under the instrument number of the lot record. These may also be seen and copied.



Our Immediate Past Kawartha Branch President, and now the National President of the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada, Bill Russell UE, thought that you would enjoy reading this article:



"This is about my 6th great grandfather, John Munroe. It is a three-part series, with the third part in the Fall issue."

JOHN MUNROE: PATRIOT/LOYALIST PART THREE

John Munroe cleared and improved a piece of vacant wilderness land east of Camp Creek at Beaver Harbour, Pennfield, N.B., and applied on February 3, 1812 for a Land Grant in Charlotte County, N.B. (Petition 1812). John received this grant of land in 1815 for his service in the corps of the Queen's Rangers during the American Revolutionary War. John was granted 200 acres.

Beaver Harbour was originally called "Belle View" and had been settled in 1783 by Quakers fleeing the War. The area back from the harbour was later named Pennfield after William Penn, the Quaker leader.

They built the house on the northern portion of the property,

by which the present-day road passes. The neighbours stated it was a beautiful house.

The house remained in the family for almost 200 years and was destroyed by fire.

The cellar hole, showing the stone foundation, laid by John, and the barn, remain. The property remains in the Munroe family.

John and his wife, Hannah, moved to Pennfield with seven children. They all grew up to be adults and have families. The children worked the farm with their parents and records show that they had little schooling as they signed documents with an "X".

The Munroes raised cattle, hogs, and sheep and must have been profitable as John arranged in his will for each of his children to receive five pounds for the "rents and profits".

John and his boys supplemented their farm income from doing local carpentry, cutting logs and hauling hogs to market for neighbours.

John worked until he was 80 years old and became blind in both eyes.

He made his will on November 07, 1840, at Pennfield, "being sick and weak in body, but of perfect mind and memory."

John divided the farm and acreage amongst his children. His wife, Hannah, was to reside in the house and have control during her lifetime and, upon her death. revert it to his daughter, Martha.

As a result of his blindness, John became totally dependent upon his wife and children and, because of this, he was induced in 1841 to apply for a pension as an American Revolutionary soldier.

John, Hannah, and several family members travelled to Eastport, Washington County, Maine, to make application.






Figure 48: Cellarhole of Mauroe Homestead Pennfield, N.B.



Daniel T. Granger, Justice of the Peace, took his depositions on John's behalf:
Testifying to his honesty and integrity and that they had heard Munroe speak of his Revolutionary service. Also testifying were John Woodworth, a neighbour at Pennfield for 35 years, John Burgin of Eastport, with whom he had traded for 32 years, and Joseph Gunnison of Eastport, with whom he had traded for 16 years.

Testifying as to their relationship as his children and that they had heard their father's stories of his "service" were his sons, John and Samuel.

Royal Humphrey, of Athol, Massachusetts, was contacted. He was about the same age and testified to knowing him in Athol and that John had lived with James Lombard.

Hannah {Lombard} Young, daughter of James Lombard, also made an affidavit attesting to John's life in their family until he entered the army.

Earl Cutting, of Philipson, Worchester County, MA, testified that he had been born in Athol and knew John when he lived there. He also testified that they had joined the Patriot Army together and told of their service together.

On July 29, 1844, John received his pension for two years of actual service in the Massachusetts regiment. He was granted a pension of \$80.00 per year, and he received \$800.00 in arrears.

His pension application, Claim No. W24022, is on file in the National Archives in Washington, D.C. It contains a considerable amount of information about his military career and life.

John died in Pennfield on July 10th, 1846, at the age of 86 years. He was buried in the churchyard cemetery of the Penfield Baptist Church. John's gravestone was found at the cemetery and the inscription of the date of death seems to be blatantly in error as the date of death differs from that given by his wife, Hannah, in 1851.

The story does not end here.

John's wife, Hannah, applied for a widow's pension and was granted a pension on December 5, 1851, in the amount of \$80.00 per year. At the time of the petition, Hannah was a resident of Pennfield, N.B. but was visiting her daughter in Calais, Maine. This pension application is also on file in the National Archives in Washington, D.C.

Hannah also applied for a Bounty Land Grant on June 14, 1855, in Calais, Maine, as a widow of a Revolutionary soldier.

Hannah was granted 160 acres of land by the U.S. Department of the Interior on June 22, 1856, by Bounty Warrant 30929-160-55. On July 8, 1856, Hannah sold the land over to John Stickney.

Hannah moved in with her daughter, Leah Munson, in 1858, in Calais, Maine. Hannah passed away in September 1861 and was buried in Calais.

As you can see, John led a very eventful life, torn between being a Patriot and a Loyalist. However he wasn't shy on claiming his just due for serving both factions.

I am descended from John through his oldest son,

Andrew. Andrew left New Brunswick and settled in Hallowell, Prince Edward County.

His daughter, Leah Munroe, married William Blake in Consecon, Prince Edward County, Ontario.

They settled in Rednersville, PEC,

and are buried in the Albury Cemetery.

William Blake is descended from Susan Wannamaker from the Loyalist family

of Andrew Wannamaker UEL.

I wish to acknowledge the research

done by my cousin, Rachael Duffalo UE. She visited the Pennfield area, personally interviewed relatives and took pictures of the area in the 1970's.

A "NO PRICE TOO HIGH" TRIBUTE TO MEMBERS OF OUR CANADIAN ARMED FORCES

The photographs on these postcards represent Canadian Loyalist Re-enactors portraying those brave Canadians who repelled multiple American invasions of Canada during the war of 1812 – 1815.

The War of 1812 re-enactors on these postcards were students in an exceptional History program at Norwood High School in Ontario.

These students were present on June 19, 2007 at the official Kawartha Branch Flag Raising ceremony at Peterborough City Hall.

By their marching they portrayed a powerful historical truth:

Canadians defended Canada from American invasion, first in1775, and again in 1783, and again in 1812, and once more in 1865 in response to the Fenian Raids.

Think about it:

By Confederation 5 generations has stood up for Canada. For generations Canadians very strongly believed (and still do) that "Canada is founded upon Principles that recognize the Supremacy of God and the Rule of Law" –P.E. Trudeau, 1981, Past Prime Minister.

The beliefs of these early defenders of Canada are enshrined in the Preamble to our 1981 repatriated Constitution in the form of the Charter of Rights and Freedoms. It's clear proclamation remains our collective destiny as Canadian Citizens. However, it costs dearly to do so.

The first and second generations of Canadian Loyalists repeatedly "went into harm's way" to proclaim, protect and defend, the solid foundations of the Canadian Heritage that we enjoy today.

Over the centuries, Canadians have followed the examples of the heroes of the past by serving in our CDN armed forces. Their creed over the centuries was and remains today: "No price too high". (MP Barney Danson, 2002)

These principles serve as the Preamble to our Constitution and also continue to serve today as the "raison d'etre" as to why, in 2025 and beyond, loyal Canadians, both men and women, will continue to stand on guard from coast to coast to coast but most especially in the CDN Far North, to protect and defend Canadian Sovereignty at all costs. (PM Mark Carney 2025)





UNITED EMPIRE LOYALISTS' ASSOCIATION OF CANADA

Moncton resident, William (Bill) Russell, was elected as National President of the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada (UELAC) at the National Conference held last July in Saint John, N.B.

The Conference was attended by members from across Canada and the USA. UELAC has 2100 registered members and 3500 face book followers. Saint John Mayor, Donna Reardon, attended the Gala dinner along with Ralph Thomas of the New Brunswick Black Heritage Society of New Brunswick and the guest speaker was Dr. Bonnie Huskins, Professor of Loyalist Studies at the University of New Brunswick.

Members were treated to historical events at Loyalist House, Old Loyalist Burial Grounds and a drumhead church service put on by Delancy's Brigade at the Loyalist Church, Trinity Anglican Church. UELAC has branches in every province except Newfoundland and Labrador. Members also live in Great Britain, the Bahamas, Australia, USA, and Canada.

A Loyalist was an American colonist who remained loyal to the British Crown during the American Revolution. Also known as Tories or Royalist, these individuals came from all social classes and occupations, including farmers, merchants, clergy, Indigenous tribes of the Iroquois Confederacy and Black enslaved peoples who were promised their freedom after one year of service.

When Britain lost the war, the Loyalist's property was confiscated, and they were ordered out of the United States. The Loyalists gathered in New York City and it is estimated that 30,000 Loyalist refugees were sent to Canada.

When George Washington and Ben Franklin demanded the British turn over the enslaved people to their former owners, the British refused and offered payment, which was accepted.

The Black Loyalists' names were recorded, and the document was named the <u>Book of Negroes</u>, which was turned into a best-selling book and movie.

Loyalists landed in Parrtown which is now Saint John, that was part of Nova Scotia in 1783. The arrival of Loyalists fundamentally altered the demographic and political landscape of the area, leading to the creation of New Brunswick and Ontario. The refugees were given land and supplies to last them for three years.

The Loyalists were also granted the designation of the post nominal, U.E., which signifies they are direct descendants of a United Empire Loyalist. This designation was granted by Lord Dorchester, Governor of Canada, in 1789.

This post-nominal title uses the letters "UE" after the person's name to signify their ancestral connection to those who upheld the "Unity of the Empire" and is the only post nominal designation granted in Canada.

The present-day United Empire Association promotes the history of the Loyalists and their contributions to Canada, as well as giving out bursaries to colleges and universities across Canada.



JOHN MUNROE: PATRIOT & LOYALIST

I recently received my Loyalist Certificate for my 6th great grandfather, John Munroe UEL. While researching his life, I was surprised to discover that he originally served in the Massachusetts 9th Regiment during the Revolutionary War. He

later switched sides and served with Lt. Col. John Graves Simcoe in the Queen's Rangers and received land as a Loyalist in Pennfield, NR

Part 1 - The Patriot

John was born on Indian Island in the Passamaquoddy Bay, Massachusetts, in the spring of 1760, but he did not know his exact birth date. John's father died before he was a year old and his mother moved with him to Truro, Massachusetts, where she worked as a domestic for the Lombard family. His mother died before he was 10 years old and he was indentured to the Lombard family.

When the War broke out, James Lombard was called to duty. He took 16 year old John with him to the army headquarters in Athol, Massachusetts. James Lombard signed John up to serve in his stead, as was permitted by law, and returned home. John was assigned to the 9th Regiment of the Massachusetts Colonial Army with a local friend, James Hutchins. James kept a diary during the War and later wrote a book on his experiences and this is how John Munroe later recounted his war service.

On page 10, she included an article entitled:

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE BAGPIPES

Bagpipes are thought to have been first used in ancient Egypt.

The bagpipe was the instrument of the Roman infantry while the trumpet was used by the cavalry.

Bagpipes existed in many forms in many places around the world. In each country the basic instrument was the same, a bag with a chanter and one or more drones. Some of these were mouth blown while others used a bellows attachment to supply the air. The bag provided a sustained tone while the musician took a breath and allowed several tones to be played at once.

The origin of the pipes in Scotland is uncertain. Some say it was a Roman import. Others believe that the instrument came from Ireland as the result of colonization. Another theory is that they were developed there independently. Historians can only speculate on the origins of the Scottish clans' piob mhor, or great Highland bagpipe, but the Highlanders were the ones to develop the instrument to its fullest extent and make it, both in peace and war, their national instrument.

The original pipes in Scotland probably had, at the most, a single drone. The second drone was added to the pipes in the mid to late 1500s. The first written mention of the "*Great Pipes*" was in 1623 when a piper from Perth was prosecuted for playing on the Sabbath. The third drone, or the great drone, came into use early in the 1700s.

In the Lowlands of Scotland, pipers occupied well-defined positions as town pipers, performers for weddings, feasts and fairs. There was no recorded "master piper" nor were there any pipe schools. Lowland pipers played songs and dance music, as was expected by their audience. Over the mountains and glens, however, Highland pipers were strongly influenced by their background of the Celtic legends and the wild nature of the Highlands. The Highland piper occupied a high and honoured position within the Clan system. To be a piper was sufficient and, if he could play well, nothing else would be asked of him.

As bagpipe use faded throughout most of Europe, a new form of music was starting in the Highlands. Beginning with lain Odhar, who lived in the mid-1500s, the MacCrimmon family was responsible for elevating Highland pipe music to a new level, according to historians. This music is called piobaireachd (pronounced piobroch). This classical music is an art form which can compare to the music of any other country and most of it was composed 100 years before the piano and without written notation.

Clan pipers' titles were mostly hereditary and held in much esteem. The best known were the MacCrimmons, pipers to MacLeod of Dunve-gan; the MacAuthurs, pipers to MacDonald of the Isles; the MacKays, pipers to the MacKen-zie; and the Rankins, pipers to MacLean of Du-art.

As a musical instrument of war, the Great Pipes of the Highlands were without equal, according to historians.

The shrill and penetrating notes worked well in the roar and din of battle and pipes could be heard at distances up to 10 miles.

Because of the importance of the bag-pipes to any Highland army, they were classified as an instrument of war by the Loyalist government during the Highland uprising in the 1700s.

After the defeat of Bonnie Prince Charlie in 1745, kilts and bagpipes were outlawed, the pipes being classified as instruments of war.



The theme of our some of our meetings this year is defending Canada from American expansionist dreams.


On Sunday, 21 September, we held an in-person and hybrid ZOOM meeting at the Peterborough Activity Haven, 180 Barnardo Avenue,

the British must be able to move massive amounts of men and material from Montreal and Kingston to the battle front on the Niagara peninsula

in order to support the armies fighting to keep the Americans from invading the province. Every ship, no matter how large, would add to the effort.

Dan presented, for the first time, the story of George Gibson and his partner, Charles Selleck and their boat building business in Presqu'ile Bay at the turn of the 19th century. Dan spoke about why this particular schooner was being built, the American raiding parties, why a lot of the action on the lake was quite close to shore and why batteaux or smaller ships were used in raids on both sides of the American Revolution.



His talk was illustrated with power-point slides showing the geography of the Presqu'ile area, copies of hand-written accounts of the time, how the American raid progressed to the burning of George Gibson's schooner, and the attempt by the family to get compensation for their loss.




The question has always been "Why did the canal not get built until the 1880s?"


"The History Guy" of Brighton answers this question along with others about how the politics finally came together to have it built.

In fact, the Murray Canal is still there, providing a vital link between Lake Ontario and the Trent Severn Waterway, but you won't see many barges.








