A Word from Our President Our New Brunswick Branch has been quite active since the last newsletter was produced in August, 2005. The Executive has met on three occasions since members received our August newsletter. Much work is done at these meetings where planning is done for our Branch prior to a general meeting.

Our first activity in the fall was a full day trip to King's Landing, where we were joined by a number of the members from the Fredericton Branch as well as our Atlantic vice president, *Andy Gunter*, and his wife. A number of our members took the opportunity to visit the Lord Beaverbrook Art Gallery following the visit & luncheon at King's Landing.

Our first regular meeting took place November 10th and our guest speaker was *Dr Greg Marquis* of UNB, Saint John, who gave a very interesting talk on the roles of women in late 18th century society at the time of the Loyalist immigration to New Brunswick.

Dr Steve Bolton, our vice president, has taken over the job of membership chair and is doing an excellent job. As of October, we had increased our membership by over 10% and we received a \$100 cheque from our national president, Doug Grant, in recognition of this increase.

Albert Button, our genealogist, has been setting new records with the number of UE Certificates that have been approved. The national genealogist, Elizabeth Hancocks, advised Albert she has never seen so many completed Certificates from the New Brunswick Branch in such a short time. At our Pot Luck Christmas Dinner & Auction Betty Button was presented with five Certificates confirming her descent

from five different Loyalists. New members, Don Flewelling & his sister, Ruth Lesbirel, received their UE Certificates as well. We have submitted a write-up to the Loyalist Gazette chronicling record numbers in membership & UE Certificates.

The Kingston Heritage Trust has agreed to set up a Loyalist Station in the John Fisher Museum in the basement of the MacDonald Consolidated School. We have \$500 from National Office to help with this project. Past President, *Frances Morrisey*, is working with Beth Quigley of the Kingston group to accomplish this.

One of the major projects ahead of us is the 2008 Convention of our National Association which is being held throughout the Maritimes to celebrate the 225th Anniversary of the landing of the Loyalists. Our Branch responsibility is to organize a portion of it. We have set up a small committee for this purpose made up of president *Jim McKenzie*, vice president *Steve Bolton* & treasurer *John Watson*. We hope NB Branch members from outside New Brunswick might take this opportunity to visit us.

Another big project is the restoration of the Amos Botsford Memorial that has fallen down in Fernhill Cenetery. Amos was a prominent Loyalist.

We participated in the New Year's Levee held at Loyalist House in Saint John. *John & Sylvia Watson* provided hot cider for guests.

We have more members this year than we have had for many years. Our total membership is 130 which is the highest in the last seven years. One of the newest local members, *Ruth Lesbirel*, has agreed to be our corresponding secretary. Our next regular meeting will be held on Thursday, April 6 at 7 pm.

This balance added to a mutual fund investment of \$3,720.00 brought the total to \$8,735.45. As at Oct 12/05 the bank balance was \$5,060.89 and on an executive decision the mutual fund was reinvested in the money market.

Membership reported a count of 130 members. Revised membership forms were put on our website & new letterhead was designed by *Steve Bolton*. Education reported that Loyalist history was being taught in local schools. Publicity reported that notice of our meetings was published on Roger's Cable, Telegraph Journal, Community Weekly Calendar & Alliant Net. Social Committee person was disabled and *Frances Morrisey* agreed to help. *Nadine Bolton* reported that she has Loyalist articles for sale.

It was decided to hold the Christmas Pot Luck Supper & Auction on Dec 8th. Speaker, *Dr Greg Marquis*, gave an interesting lecture on the work and position of Loyalist women in the late 18th and early 19th centuries.





Understanding the Loyalist Sacrifice

In a 1975 issue of National Geographic I came across an article entitled **The Loyalists: Americans With A Difference.** Hmm... a piece in an American magazine written by an American writer... I was sceptical that the Loyalists had been given a fair shake. Curious, I read on.

Outcasts, exiles, losers, pariahs... these were the founders of Shelburne, Nova Scotia...Their enemies had also called them other names. "Tories" was the kindlier term, "traitors" the more common. They called themselves "Loyalists" and many of them arrived from the young United States in 1783-84 at Shelburne, originally 'Port Roseway' & regarded 'the late troubles' as a time of persecution, deprivation and dashed dreams.

The writer was surprised at hearing that half the people in Shelburne were descended from Loyalists – and were proud of it. *Proud?* He wrote. *Pride of accomplishment* he could understand... but pride in being Loyalists? He admitted that to really grasp such a thing he had to delve into American history's shadowy side, beyond the popular myth that still cavalierly equates Toryism with treason - the myth that sprang from hate which had begun simmering several years before the American Revolution¹.

For their loyalty to the Crown they had lost sons, brothers, husbands, fathers, fortunes and decades-old friendships. Neighbours had changed into spiteful enemies who physically mistreated them & publicly taunted them. Patriots, as the rebels tagged themselves, confiscated Loyalist-owned property worth millions of dollars and vengefully hounded thousands of Americans out of their homeland.

The persecution started as early as 1765. The Sons of Liberty, spawned from the fateful Stamp Act, in a vendetta against the British-appointed secretary and the lieutenant governor of the Colony of Massachusetts, vandalized & destroyed their homes, bullied their families & eventually hanged the secretary in effigy. All of their lands were eventually confiscated on the

grounds that their children were dangerous and seditious.

In 1780 Loyalist Seagoe Potter was found guilty of treason and stealing arms from the Patriots for the Loyalist cause. He received the ultimate sentence... it is considered by the Court that you, Seagoe Potter, return to the prison from whence you came, from thence you must be drawn to the place of execution. When you come there you must be hanged by the neck but not till you be dead, for you must be cut down alive, then your bowels must be taken out and bumt before your face, then your head must be severed from your body, and your body divided into four quarters, and these must be at the disposal of the Authority of the State.

The writer wondered why then did the Loyalists pick the side they did? He offered that it must have been pure loyalty, their bounden obligation to the Crown. But he also felt economic factors may have played a role for some - especially for Crown officials & merchants doing business with England. Additionally, some Loyalists may have followed their leaders - where Tories held sway in New York City, for example, where Loyalists were numerous. Perhaps some of them had calculated the odds as Congregationalist minister & Boston Loyalist, Mather Byles² must have It was he who remarked "They call me a done. brainless Torv. but tell me... which is better - to be ruled by one tyrant three thousand miles away, or by three thousand tyrants not one mile awav?

Acknowledging the abuse they suffered at the hands of the Patriots but still not understanding the pride felt by their descendants, the writer concludes that *The Loyalists were honest and decent men – they were Americans, too ...* who *just guessed wrong.*

More accurately, most 'Loyalist Americans' didn't guess, they knew. They knew where their loyalties lay & were ready to sacrifice whatever it took. They had refused to be bullied into Treason. They had showed immense strength of character & tenacity in the face of persecution, which traits Americans tout as admirable today ~ and certainly reasons for Loyalist descendants to be proud.
