# President's Report

There have been been lots of changes and developments since our last Newsletter so down to business.

I'll start by reporting that Valerie Teed, our long-standing **Newsletter editor**, has resigned. It was with sadness and reluctance that I accepted her resignation, especially since she has always done an outstanding job. I extend to Val my personal thanks and the appreciation of the Branch for a job well done. Fortunately for the Branch, Val continues to be involved in our activities so we are not entirely losing the benefits of her energy and experience.

The Executive immediately started a search for

new editor and subsequently reached the conclusion that we'd have to edit the Newsletter ourselves for at least one issue. Fortunately, we were able to persuade Gord Ripley, a member from Teeswater, Ontario, to take on the job.

Having an editor who does not live in the Saint John area will present some minor logistical challenges; however, it's gratifying to note that the major intellectual effort involved in editing a newsletter can be expended remotely.

The October general meeting featured a presentation by Rev. Dr. Paul Brown, a local Presbyterian minister, who discussed the role that his Patriot ancestor played in the American Revolution and the subsequent government of the United States. In fact, the diary of his Patriot ancestor is one of the best sources for inside information on the early operation of the US government. (Dr. Brown's Patriot ancestry did not influence his warm welcome and his presentation was received with enthusiasm.)

As you'll read elsewhere, the Branch's **Christmas event** represented a departure from our habitual approach. It tuned out really well and the organisers (Deborah Coleman, Ruth Lesbirel, Val Teed and many others) deserve a standing ovation.

Our **April meeting** was held in conjunction with the Saint John Branch of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society with well-known academic, educator and activist, Professor Andrea Bear

Nicholas, who presented a programme that explored the development of the relationship between aboriginal New Brunswickers and the Loyalists (and other European migrants).

Plans for our **Loyalist Day** activities on 18 May are essentially finalised. The ceremonies at City Hall Plaza will follow the pattern of recent years, with music provided by St. Mary's Band. The Mayor and other local politicians will be in attendance as will the Lieutenant-Governor, Graydon Nicholas. There will be a birthday cake to mark the anniversary of the city's founding and the usual noon-time 21-gun salute to the city.

Our Loyalist Dinner will be take place on the evening of 18 May. Details of the event are found elsewhere in this Newsletter; however, it is worth emphasising the fact that the Lieutenant-Governor will be our guest speaker.

Work on the **Loyalist Burial Site Project** has slowed a bit in recent months. The main thing worth noting is that we submitted a preliminary draft of a funding proposal to the Association's Dominion Council.

We informed Dominion Council that we have identified 48 cemeteries where we can confidently say that Loyalists are buried. More than one hundred Loyalists are known to be buried in these sites. Another twenty or so sites have been tentatively identified as containing the remains of Loyalists but more research is needed to prove the suspicion.

The proposal indicated that this would be our UELAC 2014 Centenary project – our way of marking the first 100 years of our Association. It also indicated that the total cost could be \$26,250 to \$35,000, which is clearly beyond the resources


of the NB Branch. The draft proposal then suggested the following funding formula:

- Branch contribution 30% of total cost to a maximum of \$10,500
- Local fund-raising 20% of total cost to a maximum of \$7,000
- UELAC 50% of total cost to a maximum of \$17,500

Dominion Council was reasonably receptive to our overture and we will be seeking guidance from Council on how our proposal should be improved in order to gain full support.

There's nothing to report on our **Loyalist Directory Update Project** and I suspect we won't see much action here until the next membership renewal season.

## Fredericton Loyalists Exhibit

Robert Dallison's 'Fredericton Loyalists' is now a permanent exhibit at the Fredericton Region Museum in Fredericton, New Brunswick. This exhibit tells the story of the Loyalists during and after the American Revolution: their struggle to survive, their exile in British North America, and their eventual settlement in Fredericton..



Mr. Dallison focuses on two Fredericton families, the **Ingrahams** and the **Robinsons**. Hannah Ingraham (1772-1869) recorded details of her family's life in a personal diary and was the focus of a National Film Board film, 'The World Turned Upside Down'. The Robinson family lived across the Saint John River from the Governor's House in Fredericton. The exhibit includes some of the archaeological findings from the Robinson home, which no longer exists.

The exhibit features a replica Loyalist New Jersey Volunteers uniform (courtesy of Marion Fleming, Shelburne Nova Scotia) which guests can try on and have their picture taken next to two life sized soldier cut outs from the Maryland Loyalists (courtesy of re-enactors Robert and Brendon Dobyns).

The last part of the exhibit to be installed will be a computer workstation in the center of the room. It will include an interactive quiz game, a video of a musket firearm being loaded and fired and a copy of the Atlantic Canada Virtual Archives Loyalist website.

The Fredericton Region Museum (formerly the York Sunbury Museum) was founded in 1934 by the York Sunbury Historical Society. The Society was formed in 1932 and now has members from all over North America, however, most are from central New Brunswick. In 1959, the Museum found permanent headquarters in the Officers' Quarters (571 Queen Street) in the heart of downtown Fredericton.

From April until June the Museum is open Tuesday to Saturday, 1:00 to 4:00 pm. During July and August it is open Sunday to Saturday, 10:00 am. to 5:00 pm.

Looking back over years of issues, I can see that Val Teed has done an excellent job with the *Newsletter*. In hindsight, it would have been possible —and probably advisable— to have copied her format exactly. The switch to a new editor might then have been smooth sailing, and *Spring 2012* would have been in your hands four weeks ago. But alas, as you can see, I have been seduced by Open Office.

So first of all, please let me know if you'd prefer the former look, or another look, or if you have comments, or criticisms. One of the great things about word-processing is that formatting has become easy, and easy to change.

Please allow me to introduce myself. I'm a librarian at Trent University in Peterborough, and I live in an old house in Teeswater, Ontario with my wife Jane McQuarrie and my children Alex and Susannah. Our Ripleys emigrated to

Canada from Battersby, Yorkshire in 1774, settling near Maccan, Nova Scotia and later moving to Cape Breton.

My loyalist ancestors include Benjamin Deyo, Matthew Phillips, Stetson Holmes, Cornelius Ackerman and Frances (Lawrence) Vanderbilt.

Matthew Phillips (1749-1823) arrived at Saint John with his wife Mary Ackerman in 1783. He settled first in Sunbury County but by 1796 had been granted land in Northampton, Carleton County. Cornelius Ackerman served in the Third and Fourth New Jersey Volunteers and was one of the founders of Fredericton. On his grant stands the present-day Beaverbrook Gallery. He died at Wakefield in 1846, in his ninety-ninth year. Frances Lawrence was a daughter of Colonel Richard Lawrence, 'of Revolution fame'. She married first John Vanderbilt of Richmond, Staten Island, and afterwards Cornelius Ackerman. As Fanny Vanderbolt (sic) she was one of the original grantees of Parrtown. Benjamin Deyo, a loyalist descendant of the New Paltz patentee Christian Deyo, settled near Kingston, Ontario. Like many other people with Cape Breton roots, I am descended from Henry Samson, a passenger on the Mayflower. His loyalist great-great-grandson Stetson Holmes (1753-1824) moved from Vermont to Cape Breton after the Revolutionary War.



# Loyalist E-books

Whatever you think of digital books, they are made to order for amateur genealogists and historians. While the ritual of a trip to a major research library or regional archive remains a pleasurable chore for most of us, a variety of resources are now available at home. On the kitchen table. Many out-of-copyright books about Loyalists are available free of charge via the Internet. All can be read on a computer, and better still, many can be down-loaded to an e-book reader like the Amazon *Kindle*.

At www.digitalbookindex.com, the site of the **Digital Book Index**, you can retrieve a list of e-books dealing with Loyalists, along with links to the texts. **The Internet Archive** (archive.org) is another useful source of free digitized books, and there are many more.
