The Branch's annual general meeting in June was brief and largely uneventful due to the

absences of some key members of the Executive. As is typical, the major item on the agenda was the election of new officers. Unfortunately, the Nominating Committee had not been able to identify a candidate for the president's position. (I had already served more years than our constitution permits).

It was agreed therefore that the new Executive Committee would adopt a shared leadership model and attempt to operate without a president.

Carl and a colleague are organizing a Genealogy Centre at the event, which is scheduled for Saturday, 1 August to Sunday, 9 August 2015. As part of the Genealogy Centre, they are asking NB Branch to participate in the week-long festivities.



Carl feels this would be a good opportunity to place Loyalist Burial Site Plaques at a couple of Loyalist cemeteries in and around Tabusintac, namely, the Stymiest Cemetery and the Riverside Cemetery. In fact, Carl had already nominated both of these cemeteries for the plaque project and provided information about some of the Loyalists buried there.

He has also suggested that New Brunswick Branch should host a display of artifacts and family information during the Old Home Week. Indeed, this might be an opportunity to attract some new members.

Sunday, 2 August 2015 will be the Cemetery Service for Riverside Cemetery and it is suggested by the Old Home Week organisers that this would be a an opportunity to do the Plaque unveiling as hundreds attend this event. We could then move down Hierlihy Road to The Stymiest Cemetery to unveil the second plaque.

The UELAC-NB Executive Committee has agreed to participate in the event and, obviously, August 2nd would be the best day. We thus encourage all our members to include this event in your calendars. We will also need volunteers to assist with the display. Loyalist costumes would be particularly appropriate. ■

Loyalist House Dining Room

Sunday, May 11, 2014 was such a wonderful occasion for Loyalist House, when the newly refurbished dining room was unveiled.

Following the annual Loyalist Church Service at Trinity Anglican Church, Saint John, members of the UELAC (NB) and Trinity Anglican's congregation joined members of the New Brunswick Historical Society at Loyalist House for a lovely luncheon and celebration.

The details and even the colours of the new décor had been carefully kept under wraps until this big day arrived. The dining room looked spectacular in its new tone-on-tone ivory paisley damask wallpaper sourced from England and its burgundy and ivory silk jacquard draperies, in a pattern called "Belagio", by Cretex of Toronto, with coordinating tassel braid from Unique Fine Fabrics, all work done under the direction of Albert's Draperies, Saint John.

Everything about the interior decoration of the room looked so fresh and bright as sun streamed through the windows that fine spring day, since the dining room woodwork had also been repainted, the Axminster carpet cleaned and back in place, and the entire room had been given a thorough housecleaning.

There was no hint of the upheaval which had taken place over nearly two years, from the time it was first discovered that the chimney was leaning outward, its support wall fracturing away from it, and collapse a real possibility. Previous articles have detailed the structural

Financial Report

On August 1, 2014 we had investments of \$ 21,815.00. Included in this is \$ 3,000.00 that we received from the Dominion Office for our Cemetery Project.

On August 14th we withdrew \$ 4,442.91 from a super savings Account.

Withdrawal, November 2014	\$ 3,000
Current Balance	\$ 14,404

Note: We made \$ 1,056 to the end of August and we have \$ 3,000 in the account that Dominion Office gave us for the Cemetery Project. Our Bank Account Balance at the Royal Bank of Canada is \$ 2,467.54 plus we will receive the \$ 3,000.00 from the Investment Account which will bring it to \$ 5,467.54.

The twenty Loyalist Cemetery Signs cost us \$ 5,313.68 including taxes and shipping. We paid \$ 2,000.00 with the order on September 1st and on November 14th we paid the balance of \$ 3,313.68. This left a balance of \$ 2,153.65.

Loyalist Burial Sites Project



Many of you will be wondering about our Loyalist Burial Site endeavor, especially since this was intended to be a Centennial Year project. With the year almost over an update is overdue.

As you may know, the original price for the burial site plaques was around \$180. We had always purchased our plaques from a company in Ontario that was also supplying the plaques to other UELAC branches. However, when we were ready to place a new order for the 20 plaques we wanted to install this year, we learned that the price had climbed to \$269. This increase in price was, to put it mildly, a bit of a shock so we decided to shop around for local alternatives, thinking that even if the price was the same we could save the shipping costs. We then visited four local companies in an effort to find somebody who could provide similar plaques. Surprisingly, only one of those companies said they could do the job. An even greater surprise — they came back with a price of slightly more than \$400.

Meanwhile, Jim McKenzie, our Treasurer, had reported that the plaque he had installed to mark the grave of his Loyalist ancestor, Malcolm McKenzie, had weathered quite badly. More specifically, the sign itself was fine but the paint had faded markedly. It was clear to us that the paint used on the most recent batch of plaques was not standing up to the elements. We then spoke to an auto-body shop to inquire about applying automotive clear-coat to the plaques to

preserve the paint. We were told that the clearcoat would have an adverse chemical reaction with the paint.



As the discussion with the automotive paint experts continued, we asked what type of paint should be used on the plaques. We learned that we should probably use acrylic urethane, which comes in two-part kits — the paint plus a hardening agent.

Armed with this information we then contacted our original plaque manufacturer to ask for a new price without any painting. They told us that their original quoted price included \$40 for painting and they would be willing to supply unpainted plaques to us at \$229 each.

The disadvantage of this approach is that we will have to buy the paint kits and then apply the paint ourselves. We'll end up spending about \$10 per plaque on paint, assuming that we can find volunteers to do the work.

In any event, the plaques have been delivered and are now ready for painting, which we hope to have done before the end of November. Then we can start the actual job of installing the plaques at the selected cemeteries.

As you will recall from previous reports, we have already identified more than 50 cemeteries that are the final resting places of known
Loyalists. Clearly, we will not be able to place plaques at all of these cemeteries. Our approach will be to seek the approval of the managers of the highest priority cemeteries to place markers there. Cemeteries known to contain multiple Loyalist burials and those in prominent locations will be at the top of our list. However, once we have approval from the managers of 20 cemeteries it is likely that our efforts to contact managers will slow down until we have funding in place for more plaques. In effect this means that first come will be first served.

On a final note, we are not in a position to identify the managers of all the cemeteries that have been located. We are relying on our members – those who actually proposed the various cemeteries – to discover the names and contact details of the various managers. So, if you've nominated a cemetery and provided proof that a known Loyalist is buried there, we urgently implore you to send us the details of the manager.

Beaver Harbour Report

The autumn meeting of the New Brunswick Branch was held September 14, 2014 at the Museum and Archives in Beaver Harbour, NB. Our meeting was held in conjunction with the N.B. Black History Society.

We celebrated the arrival of the *Camel* and passengers, which came with the Fall Fleet in September of 1783. The *Camel's* passengers consisted of Quakers, Anabaptists, indentured servants and black settlers. They established a Quaker colony in Beaver Harbour that was known as Penn's Field Colony.

Kings Landing representatives brought artifacts belonging to Joshua Knight, the Colony's leader, to put on display.

Ralph Thomas of the N.B. Black History Society welcomed the capacity crowd. Ralph made note that the Penn's Field Colony was the only place in all of British North America at the time where slavery was not permitted.

Deborah Coleman of NB Branch gave a talk on the Quaker colony and the hardships they endured.

Following the talk there was a question and answer time.

The old Quaker Burial Ground is across the street from the museum. The early Quakers did not believe in the use of tombstones, yet a large stone donated by the late Mrs. Arthur Hawkins marks the place where many of the Quakers are buried.

The Reverend Phillip Williston, UE spoke at the cemetery with moving words that many in attendance close to tears.

The Reverend Ron Curtis, UE placed a pot of harvest-coloured flowers in front of the stone and offered the blessing over the food.

The tables were laden with sweets and savouries prepared by Deborah Coleman, UE and the ladies of the Beaver Harbour Community Club.

There were 74 persons in attendance, coming

from Maine, Nova Scotia and all over New Brunswick.

Descendants of seven families of the original forty-nine signers of the document to settle together in Nova Scotia were in attendance. The families represented were Joshua Knight, Joseph Tomlinson, Benjamin Brown, Gideon Vernon, Samuel Fairlamb, Elias Wright and Jesse Walton.

It was an afternoon filled with hugs, tears and laughter and a deep sense of pride in our Loyalist ancestors, who endured and overcame so much that we can live such abundant lives in Canada. We have very large shoes to fill. ■

However, as usual, these applications contain some valuable genealogical information, which may be of interest to other researchers. Following is a list of the applicants along with some high-level details from their respective applications.


Marilyn Keller proved her descent from the Loyalist Thomas Wheaton. The line of descent looks like this:




Even the Branch Genealogist submits the occasional application. Mine, in respect of the Loyalist Joel Edgett II, shows the following descent:




Nathaniel Howe was the Loyalist proved in Christopher Horseman's application. His descent from Howe lines up as follows:

UELAC Strategic Planning Workshop

This is a summary of the October 24, 2014 UELAC Strategic Planning Meeting as prepared by Dominion President Bonnie Schepers, UE. Action items arising from the Strategic Planning Meeting were:

- 1. Mission Statement. Review and update of the Mission Statement to reflect more current language and support the 2013 By-law and policies. An ad hoc Mission Statement Review Committee was formed, consisting of Sue Hines, Marlene Dance, Dave Laskey, and Bonnie Schepers. Deadline for report with recommendations to the spring DC is January 23, 2015.
- **2. Membership**. Review of the relationship between Dominion Council and the branches. What are the responsibilities of the Dominion executive to the branches and vice versa?

An ad hoc Branch President's Manual Review Committee was formed to review branch governance, branch responsibilities, branch relationship with Dominion. This will include access and use of shared information and resources. A suggestion was put forward that branches share their membership application forms as a sample for information to include.

Committee Members: Roy Lewis, Jim Bruce.

Deadline for report with recommendations to the spring DC is January 23, 2015.

3. Communication. We are in agreement that there needs to be a better flow of communication between Dominion executive and the branches. Areas to investigate include the use of communication technology and web conferencing of Council meetings so branch members and branch executive can participate. The findings of the Branch Presidents Manual Review Committee will be of use in making improvements to communication within the organization.

Tied to the topic of communication was reaching out to youth using school programs and teacher resources. Ensure that Education and Outreach information is readily available on the UELAC website.

Options will be explored by the ad hoc Communications Review Committee. Committee Members: Sue Hines agreed to research options with the assistance of Doug Grant.

Deadline for report with recommendations to the spring DC is January 23, 2015.

- **4. Leadership**. Every individual currently holding an executive position on Dominion Council needs to be actively searching for members with an interest and skills to move into positions of responsibility. Build relationships, ask for assistance and act as a mentor. Recognize and acknowledge a 'job well done'.
- **5. Genealogy**. Discussion about what UELAC has to offer its members focused on Loyalist genealogical information collected in Certificate of Loyalist Lineage applications. Review and recommendations will come from the ad hoc Genealogists Review Committee.

Areas of concern include -

- Keeping data safe, keeping it available, retrievable and search-able
- 2. Appropriate privacy policy
- 3. Work-flow, storage, and access

Areas highlighted for review include -

- Storage and maintenance of existing information
- 2. Accessibility to current and future information
- 3. UE Certificate application process

Committee Members – Jim Bruce, Mette Griffin, Marlene Dance, Gerry Adair, Myrtle Johnson with the assistance of Linda Nygard, John Mackay, and Michele Lewis.

The Committee will review current data storage and accessibility practices and recommend improvements. The Committee will review the current UE Certificate application process. The Committee will review the role of the Branch Genealogist in the application process.

The Committee will revise the UELAC Privacy Policy, investigate Freedom of Information and Publication, and develop an End User License Agreement for future use. Deadline for report with recommendations to the spring DC is January 23, 2015. ■

New Brunswick Branch as a Book Publisher

In the Spring 2014 issue of our newsletter I reported on the evolution of the Branch's foray into the publishing business. An update seems appropriate.

As you know, Graeme Somerville, a noted New Brunswick genealogist, donated to NB Branch the publishing rights to his book *Some Burial Records of the Loyalist Burial Ground.* We have since gone to print with this book and it is available on our website.

A bit later we were asked whether we would consider publishing Glen Wiche's manuscript, *Their Loyalty They Kept*. Since then we have negotiated and signed a publishing agreement with Mr. Wiche and the job of preparing the book for printing is almost done. In fact, the text had already been copy edited and has since been formatted for printing. The application for an ISBN has been submitted and the application for Cataloguing in Publication is ready to go as soon as we get the ISBN. Our graphic designer is currently working on the front and back covers and the whole package should be going to the printer by early December.

We have also had numerous discussions with Stephen Davidson, UE, about the possibility of publishing one of his books, *The Burdens of Loyalty*. This book has been available electronically but has never appeared in print.

We have reached an agreement in principle and the next step is to prepare a publishing

agreement for signing by both parties. That work should happen shortly after Glen Wiche's book goes to the printer.

Meanwhile, the preparation of *Loyalists All*, Vol. 2, is still proceeding, albeit at a very slow pace. The main issue continues to be the lack of contributions from our members. Eric Langley, the editor, is very willing to work with contributors to develop and refine their stories about Loyalist ancestors but he cannot create these stories out of whole cloth. So, we find ourselves once again appealing to our members to look at material they've collected about their Loyalist ancestors and the stories that have been passed down through their families and then to put pen to paper (or fingers to keyboard) to create the first rough draft. Contact Eric and he will happily provide the editorial input these stories need to make them worthy of inclusion in the book.

In any event, it will soon be time to stand back and review our efforts as a book publisher. Members of the Branch Executive all agree that this is an important initiative but it's the buyers who will determine whether we've been successful. Maybe we'll have an idea of where we stand by the time our next newsletter is ready to go.

Postscript

Last month in Digby, Nova Scotia there was a flurry of interest in a possible replacement for the 43-year-old *Princess of Acadia* on the Digby to St. John run. People have been googling the words 'Blue Star Ithaki' to look at pictures of a ferry currently in service among the islands of Greece.

The *Ithaki* is one of nine ferries now operated by Blue Star Ferries.

Ed Gray is not a Digby resident, but his ancestors were Loyalists who settled in New Edinburgh and Digby Neck, and then migrated to 'the great metropolitan area of Digby'. Some of his forebears, including Dr. Azor Betts and his wife Glorianna Purdy, put down roots in St. John in 1783.

One branch of his family by the name of Turnbull (writes Mr. Gray) came directly from Scotland, and they started the Digby-St. John passenger service in a schooner named *Sarah*.

It is understandable then that Ed (who is also an Associate Member of the United Empire Loyalists Association) has an interest in the proceedings. He would like to have the new Digby-to-St. John ferry renamed as the *Fundy Loyalist*.

He hopes that UELAC-NB and the Nova Scotia Branch will support the naming campaign, and he asks that members contribute by contacting their MLAs and Ministries of Transport.

Initiatives like this are never smooth sailing, but *Fundy Loyalist* seems to me a good idea on several counts, and worth a try.
