Heritage Branch Charter Night Dinner

The 40th Heritage Branch Charter Night Dinner was held on Wednesday, October 23rd at the Officers' Mess of the Black Watch (R.H.R.) Armoury, on Bleury Street in Montreal. The guest speaker was Sam Elison who spoke on "The Scottish Loyalists and their Contribution to Canada". A graduate of the London School of Economics (BSC Honours) and McGill University (MA in Education), Sam Elison had a long career as a high school history and economics teacher. On retiring, he became an adjunct professor of education at McGill, teaching Canadian history to secondary teachers. He is the author of numerous works in history and economics and a frequent contributor to the Montreal Gazette.

Sir John Johnson Centennial Branch was well represented that evening. Among those present were: Roderick Riordon, Adelaide Lanktree, and Michel Racicot. Also present were Heritage Branch members Okill and Sylvia Stuart, Robert and Maura Wilkins, and Gary Aitken who are also Sir John Johnson Centennial second branch members.

Restoration of Sir John Johnson Family Vault

In 1967, the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada formed its first branch in the Province of Québec. And this new branch chose to honour both Canada's Centennial and Sir John Johnson, a great Loyalist, by naming the branch, Sir John Johnson Centennial Branch. Since the Province of Québec was the home of Sir John Johnson for so many years and many members of his Regiment came to live in this part of the country, it seems most fitting that this new branch be



named in his honour. Sir John died in January 1830 and was buried beside the remains of his wife and four of their children in the family vault on the south side of Mount Johnson (now known as Mont Saint-Grégoire, near the village of Saint-Grégoire). It is this crypt that was

accidentally bulldozed 56 years ago and that is now being restored. In 2011, the Restoration of Sir John Johnson Family Vault was accepted as a UELAC 2014 Centennial Project.

We are glad to report that the restoration is progressing well. The metal vault, with the original door attached, that will be enclosed in the stone facade is on site. Stones were excavated from the site to cover the foundation of the original vault (*photo 1*). The area of the interior perimeter of the base of the original vault has been filled with rocks, stone siftings and earth. This will be topped with flag stones and will form a



patio at the front of the new vault. The original metal door is attached to a metal chamber (photos 2 & 3) which will house two large urns or mini caskets in which the bones and bone

fragments which were excavated in two archeological digs will repose.


The foundation was poured around the steel vault (photo 3). You will note that the original foundations are now completely protected by a layer of stone dust which varies from six to 12 inches in thickness (photo 2). The base of the new footpath leading to the site from the entrance road was prepared and all of the vegetation was removed. A layer of stone dust will be added to provide a better base and to be consistent with the footpath. The flat



stones dug out of the ground are intended to reproduce the original foundations that are now buried and protected by the layer of stone dust which has been compacted. They formed part of the walls of the former vault; many still have traces of the mortar that was used in the original construction.

The facade of the vault (photo 4) will resemble the facade in the 1885 Henry R. Bunnett painting of Sir John Johnson's Vault (photo 5). The vault will nestle into the slope of Mont Saint-Grégoire. The site which is clearly visible from Chemin du Sous Bois will have good access.





Family History Road Trip – Eastern Townships

I was born in Granby and spent the first 12 years of my life there. The family of my paternal grandfather, Charles Savage, had lived in the Eastern Townships since our ancestor Edward Savage with his brother John and families came as Loyalists from New

York after the American Revolution. As a child I had been vaguely aware of this family history but father was particularly interested and it wasn't until I started doing research about 5 years ago that I began to fill in some of the details. By then I was living in British Columbia and I wished I had known more when I actually lived near the places associated with my family's history. My husband applied for his UEL certificate this year

and got me interested in doing this myself. It made sense to join a branch of the association located in the Eastern Townships and this is how I made contact with Michel Racicot, who was very helpful. We were already planning a visit to Quebec in October so it was fortunate that my application was accepted by then, he was available, and we were able to meet in person.

After doing a lot of research, I knew where quite a number of my direct ancestors were buried. Our first stop was the Shefford Mountain Cemetery where we found Edward's son John Edward Savage (1778-1856) and his wife Lucy Kilborn. It's a small cemetery and there were other relatives there as well. We then moved on to South Stukely, where John Alexander Savage (son of John Edward) (1814-1903) and his wife Margaret Todd are buried. My great grandparents Edwin Savage (son of John Alexander) (1848-1931) and Helen Johnson are in the Waterloo Cemetery,

along with her grandparents Gardner Eldridge and Hannah Fessenden. I had connected with cemetery supervisor Shirley Maynes online and discovered that she taught in Granby at the same time as my father and remembered him well. She kindly gave us a tour of the



cemetery and showed us where the grave markers were. My great grandmother Helen Johnson's parents Iram Johnson and Mary Eldridge are buried in the Duboyce Cemetery and we made a quick stop there as well, after finding it in what seemed like the middle of nowhere (our GPS was very helpful on this trip!) Shirley also told us about the North Shefford Cemetery because she thought there might be Savages there. She was right, but they were only distant relatives.

My paternal grandmother's family had one connection to the Eastern Townships. Her mother Maude Ashe was the daughter of Edward David Ashe who was born in England and when he retired from the Royal Navy set up the first observatory at Quebec City. He died in 1895 and was buried in Elmwood Cemetery in Sherbrooke. His wife Marcella Percy lived with mv grandmother's family in Port Hope, Ontario and when she died she was buried in Elmwood as well. It's a beautiful large cemetery and we were able to find the plot with directions I had been given some years before.

Our final stop was at St John's Cemetery in Bromont. I left this until last because it was the one cemetery I had visited before and it was right near the place we were staying. It is notable for being the burial place of Captain John Savage (brother of my Loyalist ancestor Edward Savage) and his wife Anne Pratt. The street between the cemetery and the church is named for him and there are many other Savage relatives buried there. It was interesting to read the historical markers both there and at the church, which were new since our visit some years before.

We spent less than two days finding a total of seven cemeteries, six sets of direct ancestors and many relatives. It was fortunate that we had beautiful weather and the

gorgeous foliage added to what was a wonderful experience.



Douglas Everett Page UE (1917-2013)

Born October 22, 1917, Douglas Everett Page passed away on October 20, 2013 very peacefully after a brief illness two days shy of his 96th birthday at the West Island

Palliative Care Residence surrounded by his family. Doug is survived by his sister Helen Page Smith; his wife Enid Gow; son Rick (Judy Frampton) and grandchildren Alison and Anthony; son David (Patricia Stewart) and grandchildren Jeremy, Dylan and Julia; and great-grandchildren Devlin and Yasmeen. He grew up in Fredericton, New Brunswick and spent all his summers at his cottage on nearby Grand Lake. He received a Bachelor of Arts (Music) degree from the University of New Brunswick and a Master of Science degree from McGill University. Doug was a meteorologist for Environment Canada in Moncton New Brunswick, Gander



Newfoundland, Goose Bay Labrador and Montreal from 1939 to 1981. In the last 15 years of his career, he was responsible for long-range forecasting for Canada. Among his many roles at the Anglican Parish of St. Andrew and St. Mark in Dorval, Doug was organist and choirmaster from the 1960s to 1993. In 1953 Doug was a founder of the Canadian Hemophilia Society and the first President of its Quebec Chapter. A member of Heritage Branch UELAC, Doug was for many years a second branch member of Sir John Johnson Centennial Branch.

Thelma May Soule died peacefully at her home November 1st, 2013, at the age of 87. She was the loving wife of the late Gordon Gage of Stanbridge East, Qc.
